Appendix 8 – How our LOIP meets the statutory requirements

Section 8 of the Community Empowerment (Scotland) Act 2015 describes the requirements of a local outcomes improvement plan. The corresponding guidance gives additional detail of what approach should be taken.

A clear, evidence-based and robust strong understanding of local needs, circumstances and aspirations of its local communities	Taking the Areas of Family Resilience research as a baseline we have refined and updated our profiles both through the publication of the Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation and a subsequent profiling exercise in 2017. As these profiles relate to each of our six localities they give us a picture of the different strengths and challenges our local community's experience.
	These profiles are date-led but have been consulted upon with our local communities to ensure that they recognise their local area within this representation.
	To complement this there has been local engagement on local priorities. This ties in with our Locality Partnership approach. Tools such as the Place Standard were used to help illustrate local perceptions of what it is like to live in North Ayrshire, and agree priority themes for improvement. This is has been done at a Locality Partnership level and within smaller geographies.
