Subject: Participatory Budgeting – Grounds Maintenance

Purpose: The purpose of this report is to provide the Locality Partnership with the plan for engaging with communities with regards to participatory budgeting for grounds maintenance.

1. Introduction

- 1.1 At its budget setting meeting on 1 March 2017, the Council approved part of the grounds maintenance budget be reserved for participatory budgeting to take effect 1 April 2019. This will allow communities the opportunity to influence how a portion of the grounds maintenance budget is used.
- 1.2 A pilot was carried out in the Three Towns locality to trial the concept of grounds maintenance participatory budgeting. This pilot took effect from 1 April 2018 and will help to shape the full implementation across all localities from April 2019.

2. Current Position

- 2.1 The 3 Towns pilot has been very successful with excellent engagement and innovative ideas received though the process.
- 2.2 A key driver for its success is informative community engagement. This resulted in the 3 Towns local communities influencing how the grounds maintenance budget is used for areas such as grass cutting, flower beds and planting, weed control, wild flowers, provision of fruit trees and additional food planting, creation of a Best Garden competition and provision of gardening clinics.
- 2.3 This process will be replicated for the remaining localities and fine-tuned, as needs be, dependent upon individual localities' wishes and aspirations.

3. Proposals

3.1 A consultation mandate will be prepared for Kilwinning with the aim of setting out how we will engage and consult with members of the public.

- 3.2 A poster will be developed to raise awareness of the participatory budgeting for grounds maintenance. The poster will highlight headline Streetscene activities across the localities and detail the dates, times and venues inviting residents to attend a local information session and public consultation event. The venues and dates for the events are to be finalised.
- 3.3 The Kilwinning events will be publicised through community groups and social media channels, as well as through widespread distribution of the poster in relevant locations. Officers from Streetscene and Economy & Communities will be present at the events to answer any questions.
- 3.4 At the consultation event, a template will be issued to all attendees requesting initial feedback on grounds maintenance activities to help identify priorities.
- 3.5 It is proposed that Streetscene take the comments and priorities on board from the public consultation events, and develop a list of proposals to meet the aspirations of the communities. Further consultation will be held early in 2019 to discuss the proposals in more detail and to help plan for the implementation of participatory budgeting in April 2019.
- 3.6 It is proposed that the Locality Partnership notes (i) the progress made and proposed arrangements to introduce grounds maintenance participatory budgeting within the locality area and (ii) receives an update report at a future meeting.

4. Conclusion

4.1 The development of a grounds maintenance participatory budgeting approach will enable the local community to influence how the grounds maintenance budget is used and will provide environmental benefits to the Kilwinning area.

5. Recommendation

Kilwinning Community Events are a local constituted organisation who coordinate Picnic in the Park, Kilwinning Fireworks, plus support to V in the Park, and ad hoc Community litter-picks and Clean-Ups.

Kilwinning Community Events has been operating for 6 years.

The groups constitution is to support and encourage community spirit in Kilwinning. This started with the fire works to provide a safe community display around November 5th each year. Picnic in the Park developed and is now approaching its 2nd year.

The committee is open to all who wish to apply and currently stands at 10 members.

The key outcome is a reduction in health inequalities through upgrade of environment and facilities at McGavin Park and provision of free access to outdoor play and gym equipment, with supporting information and volunteer programme.

The link with the Kilwinning Locality Partnership's priorities is through the Local Environment priority. This project fits with the National Priorities, CPP Fair for All Strategy and North Ayrshire's Active Communities Strategy.

The proposal for the Community Investment Fund is to work with other funders in the first phase of transforming the former tennis court area at Kilwinning's McGavin Park into a community play park and outdoor gym to encourage health and wellbeing.

This proposal is the first phase of a new community health and wellbeing regeneration project addressing health inequalities in Kilwinning by improving key environment asset McGavin Park. It builds on the long-established facilities at McGavin Park which was formally gifted to Kilwinning in 1884, 3 years after the death of its benefactor John McGavin. His £7000 bequest saw the establishment of a public park in Kilwinning.

The Kilwinning Locality Partnership has worked closely with Kilwinning Community Events and Kilwinning Community Council to develop this proposal. Kilwinning Community Events has agreed to lead the partnership so there is no requirement to establish another local organisation. There is an opportunity to further develop the partnership with local sports organisations and heritage groups.

The project came for Locality Partnership discussions about the success of Picnic in the Park in 2017 which attracted in excess of 7000 people to the venue. Yet, it was recognised that on many days the Park is underused and opportunities to fully use this local asset to achieve health outcomes is being missed.

In recent public consultation carried out by Kilwinning Community Council and Kilwinning Locality Partnership public support for better facilities at McGavin Park to encourage improved physical activity and community wellbeing.

Recently North Ayrshire came top of the UK's list of places with 'avoidable deaths per 100,000 population. Kilwinning has one of the widest health disparities in North Ayrshire, with a 21 years difference in life expectancy between men in Whitehirst Park compared to men living in Kilwinning West and Blacklands. Kilwinning has the lowest population of over 65s in North Ayrshire.

The proposal is directly linked to two of the CPP's Fair For All Strategy's overall pledges:

- All North Ayrshire residents have access to and enjoy a safe, quality environment, and are given the opportunity to be included in the key decisions made about their community;
- North Ayrshire residents will have improved health outcomes across their life course.

Our approach is to reduce health inequalities by encouraging people to be more active more often (one of the FFA specific pledges). Targets have been set for a 2% increase in physical activity with a long term target of a 10% increase in physical activity by 2026).

The project aims and objectives are to:

- unlock the potential of McGavin Park as a community health and wellbeing asset
- develop volunteering opportunities for the Kilwinning community to meet up and pass on their knowledge and in turn, give young people the confidence and skills to lead more active lives;
- develop McGavin Park as a centre of Kilwinning community life;
- reduce social isolation by using McGavin Park as a focal point;
- offer a pathway for communities to maintain their skills, e.g. fitness and wellbeing, and volunteering in conjunction with community organisations

Children and their families

The link with the Kilwinning Locality Partnership's priorities is through the Local Environment priority. Using the Scottish Government's Place Standard toolkit a public workshop identified local environment within the Housing and Community theme. The public consultation during the action planning workshop indicated that there was a need to focus on working with the partners to improve McGavin Park and Eglington Country Park as they are key local assets and have a significant impact on the quality of life.

The public consultation has attracted nearly 900 responses and 69% in favour of installing gym and play equipment. This took place online led by the Kilwinning Community Council and face to face at the Kilwinning Participatory Budgeting event on Saturday 3rd March 2018. This was attended by around 600 people.

Consultation on the equipment is continuing through Kilwinning Community Council and at events like Picnic in the Park on 9th August 2018 at McGavin Park and Community Organisations' event at Kilwinning Library on 29th August.

Kilwinning Community Events have also been working closely with Kilwinning Sports Club as to re-establish football training in the park. Goal posts have been provided and KSC cut and line the pitch. This allows locals to use the pitch again to train and practice as well as local youth groups during the summer months.

A Project Team will be established with the support of the Locality Partnership and they will meet regularly throughout the project to ensure that the aims and objectives are completed and to mitigate any risks.

The finances will be managed through Kilwinning Community Events and reported through the Kilwinning Locality Partnership.

Kilwinning Community Events would oversee the contract on receipt of the Councils commitment to the project and arrange payment to the contractor on conclusion of the works. All receipts would be provided to the Council to confirm spend in line with the terms of grant.

The partners recognise that they need to encourage the most effective use of the equipment and have included in their request funding for attractive. This will go some way to providing guidance in the best use of the equipment for a few fitness programmes. The ambition is to develop a local volunteering programme with the third sector interface, represented on the Kilwinning Locality Partnership, and to harness wider network through the local sports groups, community organisations and Active Communities Partnership. There is no set limit of volunteers but the target is 50. Kilwinning is rich in volunteers active in Eglinton Country Park, community sports clubs and heritage organisations.

There are no plans for additional staff posts. The Locality Partnership has worked closely with colleagues from Streetscene to discuss the ground works and future maintenance of the equipment.

There is clear evidence of strong partnership working relating to the Park already in the successful staging of events from 2014 and the Queen's Baton Relay to the planned Picnic in the Park 2018. Partners include local food suppliers, the Corra Foundation, as well as CPP Partners as well as a myriad of community organisations and volunteers. In a wider sense Kilwinning has a well-established track record of volunteering and participation in partnership working through its heritage, local organisations, community sports and community associations.

In order to improve free local access to fitness equipment and encourage health and wellbeing and active outdoor play, Kilwinning Community events propose a series of ground work improvements to improve McGavin Park's drainage and paths.

It is proposed to invite tenders for the provision and installation of 'green'/outdoor gym and all-ability play equipment. The type of equipment is listed below

The Council's Streetscene Team have agreed to include the new equipment in their regular inspection for health and safety and cleaning regime. The repair or replacement of any broken equipment would be the responsibility of the community group.

Kilwinning Community Events has enjoyed grants towards Picnic in the Park and Kilwinning Fireworks.

The specific funding for improvements to McGavin Park and this wider project was restricted to one recent grant of £1094.80 for Goal posts. These are currently being installed.

The outcomes will be discussed and adopted. The over-arching outcome is a 2% increase in physical activity and longer term improvement in health outcomes.

In the short term, Kilwinning Community Events will be monitoring

- An increase in organised events held in McGavin Park;
- An increase in people visiting McGavin Park;
- An increase in physical activity amongst young people and local communities;
- A reduction in inequality by giving people free access to gym equipment;
- A improvement in HSCP health statistics;
- An increase in volunteering.

After many years in planning and preparation, in Summer 2013 the board of Kilwinning Community Sports Club ('KSC') reluctantly accepted handover of the 3G synthetic football pitch, now known as "E5" to many of our members.

We say reluctantly as the Board were not satisfied with the quality of installation or finish as it did not meet the original specifications set. The Funders (SportScotland, Scottish Football Association, North Ayrshire Council and Social Investment Scotland) agreed and decided to take the contractor (who performed the installation) to court with the aim of securing a replacement pitch. Ultimately, and after court proceedings had commenced, the Funders agreed to settle out of court with the contractor. This left KSC with a pitch that was not at the standard we had paid for. Understandably, the Funders reasons for an out of court settlement was to limit incurring ongoing legal costs without guaranteed success of a positive conclusion in their favour.

Since this settlement, the KSC board have pursued a replacement with the Funders in order to upgrade and renew the pitch to the level befitting of our club and our many members who use it regularly. To that end, the Club obtained three independent reports from

North Ayrshire Council has a number of Charitable Trusts for particular towns and villages which are intended to provide assistance to those in need. The areas covered by these trusts and the purposes for which funds are held within each trust are determined by the terms of the original bequests made to the Council or its predecessors. Any organisation providing assistance to persons in these areas, or any individual living in these areas, may apply for assistance from the relevant trust.

Areas Covered by the Town Charitable Trusts

• Beith & Gateside

- DalryIrvine
- Kilbirnie & Glengarnock

Applications

Organisations or individuals wishing to make an application to the trust fund are invited to complete and submit the appropriate application form to the Council. The application must confirm the area in which assistance will be provided and this must be one of the towns listed above. The applicant must also explain the trust purpose which is relevant to their application, who will benefit from the use of the funds and the way in which assistance will be provided.

Trust purposes applicable to Town Charitable Trusts

- Trust Purpose A The prevention or relief of poverty
- **Trust Purpose B** The provision of recreational facilities or the organisation of recreational activities with the object of improving the conditions of life for the persons for whom the facilities or activities are primarily intended
- **Trust Purpose C** The relief of those in need by reason of age, ill health, disability, financial hardship or other disadvantage
- Trust Purpose D) The advancement of education (applicable to Beith & Gateside Charitable trust only) The Beith & Gateside Charitable Trust has the same three trust purposes as the other town funds, but has this additional purpose due to the terms of one of the original bequests for this area.

The Trust Purposes Explained

Applicants should be aware of the factors the Trustees will consider when awarding grant assistance from the Town Trusts.

Trust Purpose A - The prevention or relief of poverty

The Trustees may interpret poverty broadly and a person does not have to be destitute to be considered poor. The prevention of poverty includes preventing those who are poor from becoming poorer as well as preventing those who are at risk of being poor from poor. It must be possible to:

• Demonstrate that the activities for which funding is requested becoming are clearly targeted at people suffering or at risk of poverty.

Activity which enables individuals or groups to escape or avoid poverty, such as training for work skills, may provide benefit under this purpose, as may direct help by monetary payments or assistance in kind to those suffering poverty.

Trust Purpose B - The provision of recreational facilities or the organisation of recreational activities

This purpose promotes the provision of recreational facilities in the interests of social welfare. Facilities or activities may be provided to the community as a whole, e.g. a community centre. Alternatively, facilities or activities may be provided to a particular section of the community as long as there is also a public benefit, e.g. a youth club, or a senior citizens club.

Note that where facilities or activities are not provided to the public as a whole but only to a limited section of the public:

- (i) that section of the public must be defined in terms of need, which must relate
- to their age, ill health, disability, financial hardship or other disadvantage; and
- (ii) the provider must be able to demonstrate that the benefit is being provide to a section of the public which is in need of it.

An example would be a club providing recreational or sporting facilities for people with learning difficulties or an activity club for senior citizens. Note that if considered appropriate, the activity may be provided to men only or to women only.

Trust Purpose C - The relief of those in need by reason of age, ill health, disability, financial hardship or other disadvantage

This purpose would include organisations concerned with the care or upbringing of children or young people, as well as organisations concerned with relief of the effects of old age or disability, for example by providing specialist advice or equipment or dropin centres. It includes relief given by the provision of accommodation or care and would therefore also be relevant to housing associations and similar bodies aiming to relieve the effects of ill health or disability.

Trust Purpose D – The advancement of education (Beith & Gateside only)

This purpose covers both formal education, such as that provided through schools and universities, as well as less formal education which may take place in the community. It covers education, training and research as well as education in the broader sense of the development of an individual's capabilities, skills and understanding. For example, individuals may need financial assistance to pursue their education or may need additional support to access further education.
