1.	Welcome and Apologies	
	The Chair welcomed everyone to the Garnock Valley Locality Partnership meeting and apologies were noted.	
2.	Action Note	
	 The action note from the meeting held on 7 March 2019 was approved with the following points raised: Stagecoach agreed to assist with the travel needs analysis which will be carried out by the Moving Around Working Group and defer any decisions on routes and timetables until this has been carried out; changes will be made to the food plan maps prior to them being uploaded to the Community Planning website; the CIF grant of £45,000 for the Gielsland Hall Gateway Project was awarded to the Beith Community Trust following approval by the NAC Cabinet. The Partnership noted the update on actions arising from the last meeting. 	

3. **Story Maps** The Locality Partnership received a presentation from Damien Griffith **CPP Team** on Story Maps. The presentation highlighted the benefits of the new tool and how it can be used by communities. A link to Story Maps will be published on the Community Planning Partnership website and group members will be notified and sent the link Noted. 4. **Locality Officer Update** Christina Pieraccini referenced an update on the work which has been undertaken in the locality which was included in the agenda pack and highlighted the following points: two young people from the Garnock Valley have been elected to the Scottish Youth Parliament: a litter-pick which took place in Beith on 27 April and saw around 50 participants help to tidy up the town; the St Inan's Gala Day which will take place in Beith on 15 June 2019 and will be the first time in six years which the festival will be celebrated: and buses will be available to transport people to from the Garnock Valley to the food PB event on Saturday 8 June 2019. Noted. 5. **HSCP Locality Forum Update** The Partnership received a verbal update from Janet McKay on work which has been undertaken in the locality by the Health and Social Care Locality Forum with the following point raised: the transformation process currently underway within GP surgeries through the Primary Care Implementation Fund. This will see GPs focussing on complex clinical care with other healthcare professionals such as physiotherapists pharmacists being available in surgeries to provide additional services: the pilot scheme in Arran which has merged the Locality Partnership and Locality Forum will run for one year and will be reviewed thereafter as a future model for the other 5 localities: the expansion of the Link Worker facility across the Garnock Valley. Link Workers will be based in GP surgeries and will provide people with guidance on which non-medical services are available in the area and how to make use of these; and plans to refresh the Locality Forums priorities and a request that All Members suggestions for priorities be sent to Janet McKay.

Members asked questions and were provided with further information on:

- the Forum's current priorities, progress which has been made towards achieving these and the plans to refresh the priorities;
- a mapping exercise which was agreed as part of the Mental Health for Young People priority and that fact that two teaches have been seconded to research which services are available for each school;
- the positive impact of introducing School Councillors and the fact that there is a waiting list for appointments in most schools.

- * The Partnership agreed to write to this group to inform them that the project outlined in their application is acceptable however, given the considerable difference between the amount requested and the balance available for dispersal (£23,066.20) confirmation of other funding sources would require to be submitted before approval could be given. It was also noted approval would be subject to OSCAR's approval in terms of the winding up of this fund.
- ** Councillor Robert Barr declared an interest in this grant application as a member of the travel group and took no part in the decision-making process.

Councillor Robert Barr raised an item of business relating to the Margaret Archibald Bequest (MAB). The Partnership were informed that the Dalry Old Folks Committee recently went through a change of committee membership which resulted in an application to the MAB for funding towards summer outings missing the deadline. Councillor Barr proposed that the application could be submitted to Councillors via email for decision to allow the trip to go ahead. The Partnership unanimously agreed.

Community Investment Fund – Applications for Comment

The Partnership considered two applications for CIF funding which were submitted for comment by the Beith and District Community Council and the Facilities and Amenities Working Group.

James Waite outlined the application from Beith and District Community Council for £39,000 to hold three participatory budgeting events across the Garnock Valley. The events will look to fund projects/events which tie in with the partnerships three priorities and will see all three community councils working together. The events are anticipated to take pace in May/June 2020.

The Partnership agreed to make a recommendation to the North Ayrshire Council Cabinet, that an award of £39,000 be made to Beith and District Community Council from the Community Investment Fund.

The Partnership then considered the application from the Facilities and Amenities Working Group for £80,000 to promote the Garnock Valley as a positive destination and help to promote the assets which can be found locally.

3. Title and summary of proposal

Garnock Valley 2020 Vision

The Garnock Valley has a rich and fascinating social, industrial and cultural history and heritage. Community activity provides access to a range of services that enrich the lives of individuals in the area and the character of the Garnock Valley itself. Each town has direct access to a rich natural environment and areas of beauty. The Garnock Valley is on the main route to and from the Ayrshire coast from Glasgow. Despite this richness of assets, there is a general downwards trend of declining town centres, feeling of fragmentation and outward migration. The Locality Working Group have identified there is a need to improve perceptions of the Garnock Valley, from the consumer and from the community perspective. The Garnock Valley is a unique place with huge potential to become a vibrant and engaging place which serves the needs of its communities in a way that is creative, inclusive, sustainable and future facing.

The aim of this project is for all the towns and villages of the Garnock Valley to work together to change the narrative of the area by creating a positive mindset and perception within the community of the area in which they live (as well as to those from out with the area). It will promote the Garnock Valley as a positive destination (as included in the Garnock Valley Locality Action Plan) and will help promote all the wonderful and rich assets which are found locally. By taking this asset based approach it is hoped it will create a vision towards a more positive perception of the Garnock Valley for all.

Project Proposal

Stage 1 – setting the scene

To employ consultants who will:

- Work with the community and partners to capture what they feel are the existing community, social and cultural assets and resources within the Garnock Valley. They will identify what people like about their towns and what are they proud of. This work will help set the scene and develop stage 2.
- Engage local people in the development and articulation of a positive and aspirational GV 2020 vision for the area. What would a positive Garnock Valley narrative look like? What would it take to change the current narrative?
- Develop a delivery route map and vision for supporting a variety of interventions that could be deliverable within the short, medium and long term. It is hoped that this would then be taken forward by a Development Worker (Creative Catalyst).

4. What difference will this project make within the locality and to local services and programmes?

This project has been identified through the Garnock Valley Locality Action Plan and has been codesigned by the Facilities and Amenities Working Group, where representatives from Beith, Dalry and Kilbirnie have all been involved.

This project would help to promote the Garnock Valley on a wider scale, encouraging more people to visit the area and what it has to offer.

It will encourage more people to get involved, which can help reduce loneliness and social isolation. As well as working to address the priority of Facilities and Amenities, it would also contribute towards Moving Around (social isolation) and Work and Local Community (volunteering).

This project will link in with tourism and businesses as well as working with a number of partners.

It will achieve a long term legacy by reducing isolation, increasing social cohesion, changing the community narrative and boosting civic pride.

Outcomes – Once the baseline is established by mapping current perceptions, it will demonstrate:

- increased civic pride
- increased participation of people getting involved in local events and activities
- an increase in satisfaction and happiness in their area
- an increase in people liking where they live
- increased awareness of local opportunities.

5. Please give an overview of the engagement that has taken place in relation to the project

Over the last 3 years, a number of engagement events have taken place to identify the locality priorities and create the Locality Action Plan. These include: workshops using the Place Standards toolkit, online surveys and discussion groups.

In February and March 2018 the working group worked to refine the action plan and identified ways of moving forward. Creating a positive image of the Garnock Valley was widely recognised as a role which could help build the profile of the area, as well as encouraging people to visit and also boost perceptions of the area. It is anticipated this project would encourage new people to visit the area, as well as work towards shifting the mindset of the local community, by bolstering civic pride within the locality and strengthening community cohesion. It is hoped that this will also raise the profile of the Locality Partnership and contribute towards a more recognised collective Garnock Valley identity.

6. Please tell us how the project will be managed

The project will be managed by the Facilities & Amenities Working Group, where representatives from each of the 3 areas of the Garnock Valley are involved. This group will appoint a consultant for Stage 1 and recruit the Development Worker for Stage 2, if applicable.

7. Amount of funding being requested

Please supply details of the amount of funding being requested and any **other** funding you have had over the past 5 years, both financially and 'in kind'.

Amount of funding requested: £15,000

The overall project will be made up of 3 parts. This initial funding application is for £15,000 to appoint a consultant to carry out an extensive community engagement exercise to shape the GV 2020 vision for going forward. To identify and collate the community assets and positives within each of the areas, create a baseline of current perceptions of the Garnock valley but also to identify what people like and are proud of. This would work towards helping to create a picture of what a positive Garnock Valley would look like and would develop a delivery route map and role profile for a Development Worker, creating a clear identified course of action to promote and achieve these positives within the community. This sum, while estimated, is based on other similar community engagement projects carried out in North Ayrshire.



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- Makerspace Project A community mosaic in Dalry Library Makerspace is growing with over 1500 tiles creating the Garnock Valley on the library wall. Each tile is individually decorated, and 3D printed, with participants from primary age to 80 years + from all across the Garnock Valley taking part. Eventually over 3000 tiles will make up the completed mosaic. Please feel free to pop into the library to see its progress.
- Youth PB Youth PB 2019 is now live and open for applications. Groups who work with young people throughout North Ayrshire can bid for up to £1000. Closing date for applications is Sunday 13th October, with the voting taking place in November.
- Stoneyholm Mill Doors Open Day Building on the huge success of 2018, the Stoneyholm Mill Trust will once again be opening the doors to the mill. This year's event will include: a craft fair, showings of the Mill Girls film, drama, activities and a pop-up coffee shop. If anyone wishes to volunteer, please contact them on stoneyholmmilltrust@gmail.com.
- **Kilbirnie Mural** Local resident and business man Adam Mclean has installed a mural featuring the design of local artist Tom Donnelly, which is a variation of the famous Mona Lisa. Adam has also worked to tidy up the area and install a bench. The mural was unveiled at a ceremony on 3rd August.
- ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) A summer programme
 provided a weekly class and other activities including opportunities for
 families to engage with existing summer activities in the wider community.
 For the last week of the programme there was a trip to the Glasgow Science
 Centre where 32 people from resettled families in the Garnock Valley visited.
- ESOL financial literacies will soon be introduced in the Garnock Valley and a new programme starting in September will offer pre-literacy level and beginners literacy.
- The language café run in The Walker Hall, Kilbirnie has proven successful and popular with learners with approx. 15 people from resettled families attending each session. It has attracted young adults, who have previously not engaged with ESOL community learning. Volunteer engagement at the café has also been appreciated.

Moving around (public transport, traffic and parking)

Highlights

- Travel Needs Analysis Work is progressing with the consultant's brief and a draft version is currently with Louise Kirk of NAC for comment.
- **Dr Bike** Approx. 50 bikes were repaired over a 6-week period in Dalry and Kilbirnie as part of Parklives.
- **Developing Young Workforce** Work is currently underway to develop an educational programme around cycling at Garnock Campus. Guidance staff at the campus will visit Prestwick Academy bike maintenance project to see if the model can be replicated and piloted at Garnock Campus.

Next Steps

The group will meet again on Wednesday 11th September at Rosearden Centre, Dalry at 7.00pm.

Highlights

- Garnock Valley Men's Shed The toilets at the shed are now complete and operational. The group are now on to the next stage of the Asset Transfer process and are working on their business plan. One of the volunteers at the shed has been nominated for a Scotland's Learning Partnership Adult Learners Week Award.
- Lochshore 2 meetings have now taken place as part of the process of building a development group for the Lochshore site. Meetings have been very well attended and there is an enthusiastic approach to taking this forward.
- Dalry Fairy Glen Sat 3rd August was a huge success at the Fantasy Fairy
 Festival. Many people in the local community were involved including: local
 Scouts helping with the BBQ, local artists playing music, Community
 Developing with facepainting and young people helping to plant over 30
 shrubs. Everyone enjoyed the new carvings, sculptures and fairy doors which
 have been installed. There were activity sheets for the children to identify
 insects and trees as well as find the hidden fairies. Well over 100 people
 attended and a fantastic time was had by all.
- Dalry Community Council The Community Council circulated a survey which received 263 responses. This survey was designed to capture how local

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people feel about their town and to collate suggestions on what could improve it.

• Youth garden – Work has begun on the creation of a young person's greenspace at the area to the rear of the Walker Hall. Young people will continue to be involved in its creation and upkeep.

Next steps

The working group will next meet on Wednesday 4th September at 7pm in Bridgend Community Centre, Kilbirnie.

Highlights

- St. Inans Day The event was resurrected this year and took place on 15th June. The day was very well attended with positive feedback being received.
- Youth fest 2019 and Youth Beatz Members of the Garnock Valley Youth
 Forum helped with the planning and hosting of the North Ayrshire Youth Fest,
 which took place on 22nd and 23rd July in Kelburne Country Park, Largs. Young
 people from the area also attended the Youth Beatz festival on 22nd June in
 Dumfries along with young people from throughout Scotland.
- Garnock Valley Parklives This year's events have been very successful with lots of positive feedback being received. Volunteers have worked very hard to make these events a success. An evaluation survey has been sent out to participants and shared on social media to gain feedback to help shape plans for 2020.
- Barrmill A group of volunteers from GV Mens Shed have embarked on an
 eight-week volunteering programme at Barrmill Park. Volunteers will
 undertake a variety of projects including: path repair, gardening and fence
 repairs. The group will learn transferable employability skills in gardening and
 construction.
- Activity Agreement A Garnock Valley Activity Agreement programme has been approved and started in August. So far 2 young people have joined the programme with numbers expected to rise over the next few months.
- **Beith Community Garden** In early July, Beith Orr Neighbourhood Watch had a visit and assessment of the Community Garden by the assessor from Keep Scotland Beautiful and the Royal Horticultural Society. They have received their outcome and have been given a 90% outstanding report which they are very grateful for. The garden has helped brighten up the town and now has a lovely carved bench. It is a nice welcoming area for anyone visiting the town.
- Garnock Valley Carves Plans for this year's events are progressing well. The event will be held of Saturday 7th September 2019 with 11 international





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carvers taking part and visitors expected from throughout the area and beyond. The chainsaw Carving event www.garnockvalleycarves.co.uk is gaining momentum with around 40 stalls asking for a place. There will be lots for the children do and take part in including free face painting. It is hoped that the visiting public from far and wide will come along for another superb day out to witness spectacular carvings being changed from being a log into the finished article. All the carvings are for sale by auction at the end of the day.

- Garnock Valley Community Councils The 3 Garnock Valley Community
 Councils Participatory Budgeting CIF application was approved by the Garnock
 Valley Locality Partnership in June and is awaiting final ratification. They also
 applied to Investing in Communities for match funding. They should hear a
 final outcome for both applications by the end of October 2019.
- **Garnock Valley Allotments** 6 volunteers who are working to achieve their John Muir Award at Place Woodland helped out at the GV Allotments over a 2 week period to clear an area making the site more accessible and attractive.
- Supporting young people The Community Development Team engaged with over 140 young people during June through a Primary 7 transition programme within the Garnock Valley cluster primary schools. These are young people leaving primary school and due to start at Garnock Campus in August. Plans are underway to re-enage with these young people at Garnock Campus to see how they are coping with this transition.
- Dalry youth engagement A streetwork programme was delivered over the summer in Dalry. Unfortunately, numbers were lower than hoped however this work will continue until Christmas to try and engage with hard to reach young people in the town. In addition, a programme of youth sporting and educational activities is due to start in Dalry in September in a partnership between NAC Community Development Team, KA Leisure and Active Schools.
- Community Link Worker The Community Development Team are currently exploring ideas with the Community Link Workers around a joint project which will work with elderly people in the Garnock Valley encouraging growing and gardening with health benefits associated with this green activity.
