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6. Locality Youth Forum Update

Jaymie Haswell gave an update on the Youth Forum and the following points were raised:

- The Youth Forum are organising a free Summer Programme in various neighbourhoods in Kilwinning in partnership with Cranberry Moss Community Association, Barnardo's, Kilwinning Sports Centre and Pryde via their successful Cashback funding;
- Four of the young people from the group are attending the Youth Festival fortnightly planning committee for the festival on Tuesday 23 and Wednesday 24 July at Kelburn Country Park;
- The Youth Forum have consulted with over 750 young people, and are finalising the results, and creating a report on the need for a purpose-built youth facility in the main street in Kilwinning;

Work has been happening with Pennyburn Community Association to look at Mental Health Sessions. There were 3 drop in events which weren't greatly attended. Next step is to set up a programme to run a group.

Work also took place with Pennyburn Community Association to look at the need for an ASN group in the area. Again, it wasn't very well attended but they are going to look at another session at a twilight time to see if that enables more people to come along.

Work continuing to happen to support On yer Bike looking at possibility of asset transfer for the building. They have now agreed a lease for 6 months at a price that is affordable to them. This will give them time to try to build up membership of the committee before being able to even consider an asset transfer. Will also give them time to look at possible funders.

Continuing to attend the HSCP Locality Partnership Forum meetings. They are hoping to get some steer from the Charrette to what their priorities should be.

Work & Local Economy

Kilwinning Employability Hub still hasn't been greatly attended. The venue will now be changed. After looking at a few different community venues it has been decided that it will move to the library. This will hopefully make it more accessible for the community. Some engagement work will also take place to try to encourage more people in to use the Employability Hub.

Purpose: This report is to inform the Kilwinning Locality Partnership about Youth Forum,

Youth Citizenship/Partnership activity, planned and actual for the Kilwinning Area.

Background

The Kilwinning Youth Forum strive to benefit the lives of young people in the Kilwinning area. We aim to achieve this by involving young people in Kilwinning in the decision-making process and giving them a voice.

The Youth Forum actively assist in consulting with youth groups within Kilwinning, being consulted, volunteering locally and nationally and applying for funding to deliver Youth and Family Activities.

Four of the group assisted with Kilwinning Community Events in partnership with the Promoting Kilwinning Group for the Music In the Park on 2 June at McGavin Park

The Youth Forum organised a free Summer Programme for over 40 young people in various neighbourhoods in Kilwinning and in partnership with local organisations via their successful Cashback funding. The young people participated in No Knives Better Lives, sport, music, drama, art and a few visits to the cinema, Ayr Farm, Park and M.& D's.

Twelve young people from Kilwinning attended the Youth Fest on 23 and 24 July at Kelburn Country Park. Young people participated in various workshops on Mental Health, Youth Participation Strategy, T-shirt design, circus skills also art and talent competitions.

Three of the Junior Youth Forum members are going to be participating in a project with the Youth Commission.

Economy & Communities, Finance & Corporate Support, and Legal Services have been consulted and their comments are as follows:

Finance & Corporate Support

The amount required to meet the costs is £16,550. The organisation has also applied for a grant to Award for All of £10,000 and will generate income of £1,800 based on providing the service for 10 weeks to 120 children per week.

Legal

The application meets the criteria of Purpose B. The applicant states that participation in the recreational activities they provide, which include art classes and school holiday camps, reduces social isolation and improves the health and well-being of participants. The application states their activities include classes for children (particularly over 5s, but also younger children), adults including persons with disabilities and outreach classes to give hard to reach individuals and groups the opportunity to participate, as well as those affected by child and family poverty.

Note that in addition, the Trustees should be satisfied that granting the application will be a beneficial use of the trust funds. In particular, they should be satisfied the grant will provide a benefit to the wider community, including persons who would not otherwise have the opportunity to participate in this type of activity.

Economy & Communities

This application meets the criteria of Kilwinning Town Charitable trust and will provide relief of poverty through recreational activities that include: Weekly art classes for children, classes and lunches for adults with disabilities. Toddlers group, intergenerational craft class group, partnership with local primary schools, school holiday clubs and outreach art classes. These activities enable Artastic to support community integration, strengthen relationships as well as tackling social isolation and promoting health and wellbeing.

Finance & Corporate Support

The amounts detailed above total £22,967.60. Quotes have been provided for these costs – the quote for dog bins is £714 and the quote for Pathway Network upgrade is exclusive of VAT (£3696.64)

Legal

The application meets the criteria of Purpose B. In particular, the applicant states the path provides recreational facilities for the community, which will help improve their health and well-being and that the upgrade to the path will make it more accessible to all, including persons with disabilities. The application can therefore be granted as it meets one of the Trust Purposes, provided there are funds available for distribution and insufficient eligible applications that meet Purposes A and C.

Note that in addition, the Trustees should also be satisfied that granting the application will be a beneficial use of the trust funds. In particular, they should be satisfied that the grant will provide a benefit to the whole community.

Economy & Communities

The grant will be used to upgrade and expand the existing pathway network around Pennyburn park. Currently it is unsuitable for visually impaired and people with mobility issues and as the park is intended for use by all of the community for leisure activities, the Club wishes to replace and expand the surface with more robust and maintenance free materials to allow use by the visually impaired, people with mobility issues, joggers, families with prams and both young and old cyclists. This will provide recreational facilities for Kilwinning Community and, as a result, meets the criteria of Purpose B

Youth Sports, Wellbeing & Entrepreneurial Hub

We

would like to convert a recently donated 110ft x 40ft portacabin. This will form an 433 square metre flexible community space. A large, fully accessible, multi-functional space will be created through the removal of dividing walls, with works also set to include the construction of toilets, Youth Zone, affordable office and rental space for small local businesses.

Fit with Locality Priorities

Our project meets with North Ayrshire Community Planning Partnership Priorities:

- •Healthier North Ayrshire
- Working North Ayrshire
- Building Stronger Communities

We work in partnership with local and national agencies including but not limited to KA, SFA, Active Schools and local businesses to provide services and programmes that improve the life chances/health and wellbeing for members of the community;

Is this a new service / project / organisation? Please explain

This building is part of the transition of the Juniors moving from the dilapidated Abbey Park to their new home at Kilwinning Sports Club. It will be sited on unused land at Kilwinning Sports Club. The building would be used by Kilwinning Rangers Juniors & Kilwinning Rangers Youth Group with other community groups able to use the multifunctional space. The main hall will offer a Wi-Fi network and multimedia screen and projector for training, local meetings and presentations. It is envisaged that the project will promote community regeneration and civic pride through the re-purposing of a recycled building, developing community facilities which will contribute to the community's health and well-being. We see this as a fantastic project which will not only help to address the need for quality local facilities, but also brings a previously unused area of a historical local site back into use.

How will the project be managed?

The Project will be managed by an assigned qualified Project Manger and the committees of Kilwinning Rangers Juniors & Kilwinning Rangers Youth Group and any funding partners involved if requested. Both have their own bank accounts with numerous signatures.

Initial Estimates are as follows: Siting and External Construction £8600. Electrical/Plumbing & Security Works £19750. Internal Building

works £12840. Total £41190

No, Both Kilwinning Rangers Juniors & Kilwinning Rangers Youth Group are already constituted and form part of their regulated governing bodies. The groups have their own committees with strong volunteer infrastructure.

Our organisation has had numerous on going meeting regards this project with all partner agencies being fully aware of the importance of this facilities to the Kilwinning community and the future survival and sustainability of Kilwinning Community Sports Club

Does the proposed project contribute to employment or volunteering opportunities? - please explain

The proposed creation of retail space has lead to conversations with existing and new potential small businesses who have advised that having permanent working space would allow them to look at increasing their resource. We would therefore anticipate one new employee per business. 8 in total.
