## 3. Community Investment Fund: West Kilbride Community Initiative Limited

The Partnership received a presentation from Kay Hall of West Kilbride Community Initiative Limited (WKCIL) on its application for funding to establish two choirs which would be focussed on improving the quality of people's lives through the health and other benefits associated with singing.

The presentation provided:-

- some background information on the Barony Centre;
- the outcome of a community consultation exercise which had highlighted the desire for the centre to deliver more expressive arts, including music;
- the proposal was for a series of 60 separate workshops delivered over two years; and
- the intended beneficiaries of the project, namely older people experiencing breathing difficulties including long-term lung conditions and young people suffering from stress and anxiety.

The Lead Officer advised that the group had also provided a presentation one of the sub-groups, which had been supportive and had requested the group to expand its proposal from one to two years.

The Partnership discussed the number of sessions to be delivered and the number of participants who stood to benefit.

The project's representative left the meeting to allow the Partnership to consider the application further, returning to hear the outcome.

The Partnership agreed (a) that the West Kilbride Community Initiative Limited project met the funding criteria and supported the Partnership priorities; and (b) to submit at the project's CIF application to the Cabinet with a recommendation that it be approved.

#### 4. Community Investment Fund: Friends of Millport Town Hall

The Partnership received a presentation from Angie McCallum of Friends on Millport Town Hall on its application for funding for the restoration of the town hall. Further background information on the project costs was circulated at the meeting.

The presentation provided:-

- some background information on the breadth of volunteer support enjoyed by the group and the work undertaken to consult with every resident on the island:
- the hall's potential to deliver a number of social and economic benefits to the community through uses which would encourage social cohesion, inter-generational activity, sports, tourism and heritage interest and employment opportunities;
- plans for the physical layout of the building, which would offer a heritage centre, a venue for up to five events at any one time and housing for rent; and
- the mix of funding the group intended to access.

The Partnership discussed:-

- the current funding limit of £100k on CIF applications;
- the group's asset transfer application;
- the relevance of the proposal in addressing the Partnership's priorities;
- the accessibility of the premises to wheelchair users; and
- the availability of further sources of funding and the position with regard to any CIF should the group fail to achieve all of the necessary funding.

The Partnership agreed (a) that the Friends of Millport Town Hall project met the funding criteria and supported the Partnership priorities; (b) to submit the project's CIF application to the Cabinet with a recommendation that (i) it be approved up to the current funding limit of £100,000 and (ii) the funding be ringfenced pending successful completion of the community asset transfer procedure and the group securing the other project funding components required; and (c) that the potential for a further CIF award beyond the current £100,000 limit be explored in future

#### 5. Centrestage

The Partnership received a presentation from Andrew Swanson, Centrestage, on the charity's work to promote financial and social inclusion, good physical and mental health and inter-generational activities, all underpinned by music.

The presentation provided information on:-

- the charity's three 'hashtags' of fun, food and folk;
- its work to reduce poverty, social isolation and rates of re-offending and exclusions, while increasing positive mental and physical health, social mobility and empowerment;
- the Eat and Train on the Road programme around dignified food provision; and
- current work in six North Ayrshire communities (Ardeer, Ardrossan, Castlepark, Fullarton, Kilbirnie and Pennyburn).

The Partnership discussed:-

- the potential for the group to expand its work into the North Coast and Cumbraes area, including the new development at Flatt Road in Largs; and
- the relevant of its work to the Partnership's identified priorities.

The Chair thanked the Centrestage representative for his presentation and advised that the Partnership looked forward to working with the group in future.

#### 6. Financial Inclusion

The Partnership received a presentation from Louise Riddex, Locality Officer, and Councillor Brahim as Chair of the Financial Inclusion Sub-Group.

The presentation provided:-

- some background information on the financial inclusion work undertaken to date, including meeting with Centre Stage, mapping ATMs and identifying locations where transactions might be made, considering SIMD statistics, and looking at the school holiday meals programme; and
- potential projects, including The Living Room, work with credit unions, the use of a variety of locations to take receipt of out of hours deposits and a potential funding application for a development worker and debt advice worker.

The Partnership discussed:

 the importance of using SIMD data to identify pockets of deprivation within the area; and

General

Joint Cabinet was held in Largs Academy in June. This went very well with over 70 young people participating, discussing the key themes as well as asking the cabinet questions. Report has been written on this.

Skelmorlie Youth Group held a fun day at the Community Centre in August. Despite the atrocious weather it went very well with around 150 people attending. They made around £100 in donations. There were some great comments made on the day about how good the event was and how the community needs it.

Some youth work took place during the summer hols in Largs. This was a partnership between Community Development, Police Scotland and KA Leisure. It ran alternative weeks – one week being basketball on the Wed night the other week being football on a Fri night. Numbers attending fluctuated but overall it was a good event and some good partnership work. At the end of the programme there was an event with BBQ held. Again the weather wasn't great so affected what could be done.

Your Voice Your View sessions have now been completed across North Ayrshire. Information has been gathered. Due to go back out to the communities with a draft plan throughout September.

Social isolation - older people

Cycling without age project looks like it's going well. Have been out on a few trial runs and training up volunteers. Cllr Joe Cullinane is looking to meet up with the group to discuss the project as it was CIF funded.

Louise & Cllr Hill to meet to look at how to take this priority forward.

A new group called Opening the Shutters" has been developed in partnership with the Community Link Worker in Largs. The group has ran a few times now with over 20 people attending. The first session was held at a local Café in Largs but the group had decided that it wasn't comfortable. The venue has now been changed and meetings take place in the Largs Library. The group started off running every 2 weeks but will now meet weekly (except from the 1st Mon of the month when the library isnt available.

West Kilbride Adult Education Committee held their enrolment session. This was very well attended with people signing up for various classes.



Stress and anxiety – younger people

#### **Update**

Clearer Minds Project going really well. The lead of the council is going to meet Corrie and the guidance teacher at Largs Academy on 23 Aug to see how the project is going and how the funding has helped.

Youth Festival took place in Kelburn Country Park in July for young people from all over North Ayrshire. 23 Young People from the North Coast attended. It was a very successful event.

West Kilbride Youth group ran through the summer holidays where different activities took place.

A digi dabble day took place in Millport Library in July. This went well with over 60 young people and parents attending.

It is not clear in this case that the application can be justified in terms of Section 15(4). In particular, a grant payment to a private club could not normally be justified.

If the Committee is minded to grant funds they must be satisfied that the grant of the funds would be to the benefit of the inhabitants of Largs as a whole and must clearly minute the benefit to the community as it is likely that the auditor will require this information.

#### **Economy & Communities:**

Economy & Communities are unable to support this application as group membership is restrictive and not an open membership.
