On behalf of the Partnership, the Chair extended her condolences to Theresa's family, friends and colleagues.

2.1	Matters Arising	
	The action note was discussed and the Chair highlighted that at Item 3, CIF Expressions of Interest, the meeting on 16 March 2020 had agreed that both the Locality IT Upgrade and Castlepark Community Association be progressed as funding bids. Due to Covid and other issues, these applications are not able to be brought back at this stage and both are currently a work in progress. Noted.	
3.	Community Hubs and Next Steps	
	 The Partnership received a presentation by the Locality Partnership Lead Officer and discussed the following:- the excellent collaborative work of the 3 Community Hubs at Redburn, Fullarton and Vineburgh during lockdown to tackle local 	
	issues;	
	 the invaluable support of local volunteers; the success of working with local groups during lockdown to identify local solutions and the value of empowering staff and volunteers to act; 	
	 mental health referrals throughout lockdown; volunteering opportunities going forward with a potential bank of volunteers; the positive concerned of community which had amarged during 	
	 the positive sense of community which had emerged during lockdown; and the commitment shown by local businesses and partners to work together. 	
	The Partnership expressed a huge debt of thanks to Donna Fitzpatrick, Louise McPhater and Elaine Baxter for the tremendous achievement and collaborate work with Council staff and volunteers who put themselves at risk by being on the front line throughout the pandemic lockdown.	
	The Lead Officer advised on matters for consideration moving forward and the Partnership further discussed:-	
	 ensuring that the needs of the locality continue to be met in the context of the Covid-19 pandemic; the potential for a second wave of Covid-19 and structures which are 	
	 still in place to respond to this; the need for swift and efficient action in terms of the Partnership and community ownership; 	
	 the requirement for a caring and efficient people centred approach to the provision of local support and the importance of responding to different local needs; 	
	 the commitment of the Council in terms of community ownership within community wealth building; 	
	 issues in terms of poverty, mental illness and social isolation which were already in existence having been accentuated by the pandemic; 	

	 progress in terms of the Child Poverty Action Plan, food justice and food dignity, cost of the school day for parents, and the production of Scotland's first Anti-Poverty Policy within the Council to address issues within local communities; the importance of employability as an issue moving forward, particularly following the conclusion of the furlough scheme; the continuation of essential partnership working; concern in terms of how a potential resurgence in winter months will affect poverty and mental health; the requirement to consult with local communities to determine what is needed and to ensure local support is in place; and letting income for hubs being non-existent which leads to a situation where it is hard to keep delivering services and employ staff and pay bills. Eddie Kenna left the meeting at this point. The Partnership will receive a follow-up questionnaire which will allow them to share any other issues they wish to raise which have not been covered at this meeting. Noted.

Castlepark Community Association, Fullarton Hub, Redburn Hub, Broomlands & Bourtreehill Community Association and Vineburgh Community Association are longstanding constituted voluntary organisations^{*}, with the exception of Redburn which is operated by North Ayrshire Council on behalf of the local residents.

All organisations share similar aims and objectives by providing community facilities for the benefit of the inhabitants of their neighbourhoods without distinction of sex or political, religious or other opinions by working together with the local authorities, voluntary organisations and inhabitants in a common effort to advance education, and to provide facilities in the interests of social welfare, for recreation and for leisure time occupation.

All of the above community centres are the key hubs for each of their respective areas, and each have a long history (over 40 years) in providing community activities, learning opportunities and social events for people of all ages.

*The initial expression of interest included equipment for Springside Community Association, however this committee were successful in their application to the Ayrshire Leader Enabling Rural Communities Fund. This will supply enough equipment to cover the Centre's needs.

Title: Irvine Community Centres Digital Upgrades

This application covers equipment for:

Castlepark, Fullarton, Redburn, Towerlands and Vineburgh Community Centres*.

The funding will be used to upgrade a range of computers, laptops, tablets, printers, cameras and peripheral equipment for use by, and the benefit of, the local community. These facilities will contribute to addressing digital inequality and the priorities of the Irvine Locality as outlined in Part 4.

Technically this is not a new service as there has previously been equipment available in these locations, however the purpose of the upgrades is to replace equipment which is slow, sub-standard, out-of-date or even non-functioning.

This equipment will support the following outcomes:

- Contributing to supporting people to find work job seeking
- Contributing to supporting people to find work building digital skills
- Contributing to addressing financial exclusion
- Contributing to addressing child poverty
- Contributing to addressing digital exclusion
- Contributing to the alleviation of loneliness and social isolation
- Contributing to mental health and well-being through all of the above

The funds will be administered by Fullarton Hub Management Committee with the support of North Ayrshire Council's Irvine Locality Connected Communities Team Digital Participation Officer therefore no new organisations need be set up.

This application aligns with the North Ayrshire Fair For All Inequalities Strategy by "supporting residents to be digital". In addition, the local Community Planning themes are addressed as follows: these computers will be free for public access and be available to, amongst other groups: jobseekers, students and families; addressing issues including:

- employability for both searching for jobs online and as a facility for learning computer skills and enhancing employability; the provision of internet access via this equipment will enable residents to identify local suppliers of goods and services and by extension contribute to the local economy;
- the internet is of course the ultimate source of information, which supports a more informed community and contributes to its **Influence and Sense of Control**;
- there are many internet resources devoted to physical and **mental health & well-being** both directly and indirectly, in terms of providing access to information on health and being, and as a means to an end by providing those who digitally disadvantaged the facility to access all the online benefits outlined herein.
- this application will contribute to addressing **financial inequality** by providing facilities to source goods and services at lower cost and contributing, for example, to the alleviation of child poverty by allowing parents who might be unable to otherwise access the internet to take advantage of such financial benefits.

Each of the community centres listed sits within an area in the lowest three deciles of the Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation. All are largely the only facility for internet access in their local areas or provide access at times to augment other facilities - Libraries for example.

The need for the upgrade of the PCs and laptops is immediate. Currently anyone using them is likely to be put off returning due to the age and consequent slow access speed of the devices currently in place.

The present situation of the Covid-19 pandemic, leading to an increasing number of people suffering from loneliness and social isolation, has highlighted the extent of the 'digital divide' between the digital 'haves' and 'have nots', and the resulting need for increased provision of opportunities for digitally disadvantaged people to acquire and improve their basic digital skills. Offering access to up-to-date digital equipment will encourage such activity.

Since the original expression of interest, Additional high-specification laptops have been added for the purpose of allowing young people to experience video creation which is an activity which develops skills such as communication, visualisation, forward-planning, and teamwork by participants.

The original CIF Expression of Interest was informed by the work of the previous Irvine Locality Digital Participation Officer (ILDPO) who consulted with representatives of each of the Community Centre Management Committees to compile the list of required equipment.

As much as the condition of the equipment allows, prior to lockdown in March, the digital facilities of each Centre are all in regular use. The Centre representatives have each put forward requests to upgrade the equipment as appropriate to their Centre.

The current ILDPO has ratified that the requests still stand as of March 2020 and updated the costs as necessary as of November 2020.

a. Fullarton Community Hub will be the lead organisation responsible for the administration of the funds in collaboration with the ILDPO.

d. The ILDPO will provide training for volunteer digital tutors who, in turn, will provide support for groups and individuals making use of the various centres' facilities. In addition, North Ayrshire Council's Get Connected facility will be a potential source of technical expertise by giving staff – IT staff in particular – the opportunity to offer their skills as volunteers in relation to setting up the computers and networks. In the event of a successful application, contact will be made with local tech-focussed businesses to request additional voluntary support.

The numbers of units listed is based on a digital audit of Irvine Community Centres completed prior to February 2020 by the original Digital Participation Officer in consultation with representatives from each centre with the addition of 2x video editing-capable PCs at Redburn Community Centre and 10x video editing-capable laptops for community training purposes.

The computers, operating systems and software are current, and once in situ should last with the minimum of maintenance, providing a vital public service to communities identified as deprived, for a good number of years.

Food System

As we move forward from state of emergency into recovery phase we have been working with anchor organisation within Irvine – Fullarton Community Hub and Vineburgh Community Associaiton. The anchor organisation are going to be working in partnership to address issues of food inequality and looking into alternative delivery models using a community wealth building approach engaging with local businesses and third sector organisation providing low cost or free food to residents of Irvine if they need it – Please see attached development session.

We worked with NA procurement team to look at community benefit promises and we met with McTaggart Construction to deliver on a community project promise. Irvine Virtual Working Steams

We held an Irvine Virtual Working stream meeting on Zoom on Monday 23rd November, 37 people participated this included representation from community Irvine Community Council, Community Associations, community groups, youth groups, children 1st, NAC service access team, Irvine Senior Forum and Irvine locality partnership members to name a few.

The meeting was conducted online via Zoom, Marie Burns – Irvine Locality Partnership Chair opened and welcomed everyone to the meeting. We had identified 6 elected members to chair each of the neighbourhood virtual working streams with support of a scribe and a community rep from the locality partnership and we broke into virtual break out rooms. We used interactive comment boards using FunRetro where all end of year chit chat reports were collated onto FunRetro this allowed comments to be inputted by the scribe with all agreed actions and responses recorded and will be used to form neighbourhood action plan.

Irvine Food Co-op Development Session by Irvine Virtual We

Model

Food Co-op (0 votes)

Key Features

A food co-operative is a group of people organising to buy food in bulk, direct from wholesalers or even from farmers themselves. (0 votes)

Comments

- Buying in bulk kilo bags of pasta, pulses, rice, noodles etc. Saving money and being more eco friendly.

By pooling buying power co-op members (who may pay £1 for example to join) can save money on their food bills and are able to buy healthier, better quality foods (0 votes)

Comments

- We will make contact local businesses with support from NAC Business Development Team and invite community wealth building team. Also invite Nicola Gouch new community benefits officer to see how we can all work together.

Savings to be made often amount to between a half and a third of local shop prices. (0 votes)

Fruit and vegetables usually offer the greatest savings. Although co-ops are often run by unpaid volunteers, they need money for start-up costs to buy equipment such as weighing scales and knives, and the initial float. There are continuing costs including transport, hire of premises and paying volunteers' expenses or paid staff. (0 votes)

Comments

- Already in place and secured by SG funding. DF to make contact with Fruit market in Glasgow to builk buy produce.

Legally, a co-op must be a membership organisation. There are different ways of doing this. You could have an annual membership and yearly fee, or free membership on a daily basis, recording daily members in a log. (0 votes)

Comments

- We will be looking to set up a Social Enterprise and will require support fron Business Development Team.

Most co-ops have a yearly membership, charging a nominal fee of between 50p and £2. This can go towards the cost of buying equipment needed for the co-op to run effectively. (0 votes)

Comments

- A membership fee of £1 will be way forward.

Benefits

Food co-op members have reported substantial financial savings as well as increased fruit and vegetable consumption. (1 votes) Food may be delivered to people who are disabled, elderly or housebound and who cannot collect their orders. (0 votes)

Comments

- Volunteers are in place for Vineburgh and Fullarton. We need to engage with other community associations to bring them on board and to develop capacity to to widen participation and neighbourhood volunteers.

Winter Warmer packs for the elderly can be organised and packed by a co-op and distributed through churches and community cafes. (0 votes)

Comments

- Already in place. 84 local residents have signed up and numbers increasing daily.

Winter Warmer packs are a couple of days supply of non-perishable food, such as corned beef, instant potato, biscuits, tea bags and UHT milk. These are particularly important where steep roads and pavements are treacherous in icy weather or where an area may get cut off in the winter for days at a time.

Other special needs can also be catered for. (0 votes)

Food co-operatives can provide a setting for exchanging recipes or information about healthy eating. (0 votes)

Comments

- Community COVID book being collated to provide nutritious meals. Looking at getting learning circles together looking at cooking classes as centres start to re-open. Groups of 5 people each person makes a meal enough for 5 people. They share their own dish with the 5 people that becomes 5 different meals that will last them for the week. Volunteers can also gain new skills and increase their chances of employment. (0 votes)

Comments

- DF has employability hub within Fullarton and will engage with the staff who deliver the employability hub for referrals of local people looking to gain skills and increase their employability by becoming volunteers.

Potential Difficulties

If a food co-op does not have a committee or any governing documents, then difficulties may occur. This is often because the roles and responsibilities of volunteers and those running the food co-op are not clearly defined, and this can lead to confusion, disagreements and problems with keeping people involved. (0 votes)

Comments

- We looking to engage with the following groups to become involved: Age Concern, Children 1st, Vineburgh, Castlepark, Redburn, BABCA, Dreghorn/Drybridge.

For existing organisations running food co-ops it is also important to clarify other areas, such as who is responsible for managing volunteers and covering insurance. (0 votes)

Comments

- This will be a shared responsibility as each area will organise their own volunteers and individually contribute to the food system.

In some cases, a local organisation can help start a food co-op by working with local people, but then hand over responsibility to the community to carry on running it. If such a food co-op does not have any kind of documentation stating how it is run and how decisions are made, the co-op may find it much harder to survive in the long term. Also, once a community has become used to having external support and someone to help them deal with problems, they may find it harder to sort out such issues themselves. (0 votes)

Comments

- This will be set up as a social enterprise. Irvine Fairer Trade will be set up and will be guided by their committee.

Like many projects which depend on volunteers, food co-ops sometimes have to rely heavily on a handful of committed people who after a time may simply 'burn out'. People may be put off offering to help if they see that the work load is too much or if they do not feel they have the necessary skills, such as book keeping and publicity. (0 votes)

Comments

- We looking at different neighbourhoods and organisations coming on board to share the responsibility.

- We will invite employability and skills team to see how we can work together to develop a volunteer programme and have accreditation as part of their contribution. Developing volunteers, skills and confidence to enable them to move on into employment.

Whilst some will welcome the opportunity to learn these new skills this requires support and training. (0 votes)

Comments

- Training programme will be developed as part of the voliunteer programme.

Many of these problems can be overcome if there is a development worker and/or a supportive network of co-ops. (0 votes)

Comments

- Donna Fitzpatrick and Louise McPhater are development workers leading the food system for Irvine with support from Locality officer and Irvine CLD team.

Next Steps

Invite partners to an initial start up meeting to see who would be interested in coming on board. (0 votes)

Meet with Business Team (0 votes)

Sylvia to see if we can get support from Social Enterprise consultant. Who provides 8 days support. (0 votes)

- TACT Social Media continues to be used as a platform to promote safety messages from Police Scotland, Funding Information, Benefit Support, Energy Advice and vital local service provision. We would welcome any information from other service providers that we can share.
- TACT Staff have been organising and facilitating monthly 'networking' Forums for all 3rd Sector groups and organisations that wish to attend. The next online Forum Meeting is scheduled for Tuesday 8th December. If you are interested in attending please email: <u>info@tact.scot</u>
- TACT and Arran CVS as the Third Sector Interface in North Ayrshire recently supported the Response, Recovery Resilience Funding. This enabled 8 local organisations in North Ayrshire to receive funds of up to £2,000 to support the local community at this difficult time of year.
- TACT acted as an anchor organisation with a Funding Bid to the Supporting Communities Fund for a total of £107,270 which enabled 13 groups and organisations to expand services in relation to COVID-19.
- Staff continue to maintain regular dialogue with North Ayrshire Council to update on progress and identify additional ways we can work together.
- TACT still have a small supply of PPE for local volunteers / groups to access. This includes: gloves, sanitiser, aprons and face masks. If you know of any groups that could benefit from this, please telephone the office on: 01294 443044.
- TACT Digital are currently working with Kilwinning Heritage Group on a Digital Heritage Project for Kilwinning Abbey. We hope this will enable a greater number of individuals to access the Abbey on a digital platform.

- Eglinton Community Garden Collaboration we are working with a range of organisations including North Ayrshire Council, Turning Point Scotland, The Conservation Volunteers, HSCP Learning Disability Team and North Ayrshire Alcohol and Drug Partnership to deliver a successful Community Garden for local people to get involved and learn to grow their own produce. - Organisational Support continuing to work with groups and organisations delivering relevant Training including Governance, Basic Bookkeeping and Volunteer Management. We are also assisting with Charity Registrations, Funding Support and Support with compiling Constitutions.

- Community Wealth Building, North Ayrshire is the first Community Wealth Building Council in Scotland – this is fantastic news and something very positive for North Ayrshire. As the Third Sector Interface, TACT sits at the Community Wealth Commission. This commission supports the implementation of the CWB Strategy and will encourage involvement from local businesses, government agencies and local organisations on CWB initiatives.
- We are continuing to contact and engage with 3rd Sector groups and organisations to complete our COVID Health Check Questionnaire. This Health Check enables us to ascertain support that is required including Funding, Governance Support, OSCR Guidance, Volunteering Support, Health and Well-being information and any other areas.
- Christmas Gift Appeal TACT are in the process of creating 150 Christmas Gift Bags for North Ayrshire children this year. These bags will contain plenty of craft activities and sweet treats. We are working alongside the local Foodbank to ensure these go to those that need them most.
- Staff continuing to update and source a range of Volunteering Opportunities that are currently available. We are still receiving a high number of Volunteer Registrations and don't have enough placements for those interested.
