A new study reveals women with allotment plots now outnumber men for the first time. A recent study by Dr Tilly Collins and Ellen Fletcher of Imperial College London, found that in London almost two thirds of plots -64% - are now occupied by women. The National Allotment Society estimates that half of holders nationally are now women compared to just two percent in 1973.

Transforming Scotland's convenience stores

To increase sales of fresh, healthy Scottish produce, Scottish consumers are being encouraged to 'Go Local' as part of a new initiative that will transform local convenience stores into marketplaces selling more local produce. The initial phase of this initiative will see £100,000 invested in ten local shops to increase the space given to Scottish products, broaden the range of Scottish products offered and enhance consumer engagement with Scottish products.

The Go Local programme will be delivered by the Scottish Grocers Federation (SGF), with Scotland Food & Drink supporting on the local sourcing elements of the project.Grants will be awarded for the installation of new equipment dedicated to locally sourced Scottish products on a 50% match-funding basis, capped at £10,000.
