	Community Wealth Building	
	As requested, the Partnership will receive an update on Community Wealth Building at the meeting scheduled for March 2021.	

### Community Investment Fund

At the previous meeting the Partnership had agreed that a proposal to use CIF funding to carry out a feasibility study on a proposed new route for the National Cycle Network (NCN) Route 7 between Dalry and Kilbirnie could advance to a full application.

The group had since advised they will be seeking funding through Sustrans and will not submit a full application at this time.

The Partnership also received an update on the application for CIF funding submitted by Radio City. The application was being assessed by an internal council process and group members were asked to put their faith in the ongoing process. Radio City will be informed of the outcome first. It was advised that a further update would be provided in due course.

### Garnock Valley Men's Shed

The Group's Community Asset Transfer application was approved by North Ayrshire Council's Cabinet on 8 December 2020. Councillor Barr confirmed that the Dalry Parish Boundary Trust had paid a grant of £5,000 for roof repairs following the decision.

The group was also named the second-best Men's Shed in Scotland at a recent event.

### 3. Participatory Budgeting Update

The Partnership received a presentation from Pam Crosthwaite on participatory budgeting.

The presentation covered a number of areas including:

- PB statistics from across North Ayrshire including 367 funded projects to the sum on £445,000;
- three events planned for 2021 nurturing excellence, arts and culture and youth PB; and
- adjustments to the process which have been required due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

Members were advised that examples of successful applications are provided on the application form and a full list of funded projects is available on the Community Planning website.

### 4. Garnock Valley Young People

The partnership received an update from Garry Tait on the work which has been carried out with young people in the Garnock Valley. The update covered a number of points including:

the Youth Disorder Working Group which had been meeting virtually to discuss methods to reduce antisocial behaviour in Dalry and Beith; and projects undertaken by the GV Youth Forum including participatory budgeting, a Christmas card project, quiz nights and a school uniform shop. A wider discussion took place around youth disorder which had been increasing in frequency and severity. A number of hotpot areas were identified and discussed. G. Tait/J. It was agreed that Garry Tait would continue discussions with Police McGee Scotland out with the meeting and that local Head Teachers would be invited to future meetings of the Locality Partnership. 5. **Community Support** The Partnership received an update from Angela Morrell on the local response to the Covid-19 pandemic by the community and partner organisations. Noted. 6. Cost of the School Day The Partnership received an update from Angela Morrell on the work being done to help reduce the cost of the school day across North Ayrshire. The presentation provided information on: the cost of the school day and how reducing this ties in with objectives contained in the Child Poverty Action Plan; a working group which has been set up to identify initiatives that will reduce the cost of the school day; and good practice already in place which could be shared across schools/community groups across North Ayrshire. Noted. 7. **Community Representatives** The Partnership were advised that a number of expressions of interest had been lodged in terms of filling the role of Community Representative which had become vacant following the resignation of Ian Shaw. Three full applications had been submitted and were presented to the Partnership for consideration. Following discussion, it was agreed that the successful candidate would ideally be a Kilbirnie resident to continue to town's representation on the Partnership. It was agreed to appoint Henry Johnstone to the role of Community J. McGee Representative.

name	Garnock Valley Men's Shed
Brief details of organisation	Garnock Valley Men's Shed are in the final stages of asset transfer of their building, a former cleansing and grounds maintenance depot in Kilbirnie public park. Since its inception, the shed's membership has grown to over 80, with up to 30 members using the building on any given day. The Trustees have installed a gent's toilet, a kitchen, re-established a previously disconnected water supply, constructed a bespoke scale model-building room, installed double-glazed windows and reception area, kitted out and draught-proofed a workshop area. Additionally, some roof insulation has been added by shedders. Shed members use these facilities to engage in personal and community projects that effectively tackle loneliness and social isolation, resulting in positive mental health and wellbeing.

Amount requested	£20,000
Brief overview of proposal	The shed building formerly had an obsolete oil heating system that is no longer operational and has been removed. Shedders have been temporarily heating the building using portable electric heaters, moving them from room to room when required. The cost this will incur in the longer term is unsustainable. Furthermore, the lack of insulation in the building makes it extremely difficult to heat, meaning that these electric heaters are ineffective, as heat is lost quickly. The Trustees have recently commissioned an analysis for a new heating system and insulation and have decided to install a FAR Infrared system that is electronically controlled, with Genius Hub room sensors and controls. This is a zoned heating system that will enable individual rooms to be remotely controlled, ensuring that rooms are heated as and when required and not any more than is necessary.

**Subject:** To update the Locality Partnership in respect of the Elderly Grants.

**Purpose:** To approve the Elderly Grants 2020/21 Budget and agree proposals in respect of carrying this budget over to 2021/22.

**Background:** The Elderly Grants budget is normally presented to the Locality Partnership for agreement once budget details are received each April. The budget is set according to area elderly population and details are attached at Appendix 1.

The 2020/21 Elderly Grants budget for the Garnock Valley Locality is £8,474.

Following agreement of the Elderly Grants budget, historical groups are invited to apply, and details of the groups are also shown at Appendix 1.

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, it has not been possible to hold the activities normally funded by the Elderly Grants budget because of the restrictions in place. Looking at the forthcoming financial year, it is difficult to predict what activities will be permitted and needs have changed. In order to address this, the following proposal is being made.

**Proposal:** The proposal for consideration is for the budget to be carried over from 2020/21 and that Officers convene a meeting with key older people's groups and the current groups who disburse the Elderly Grants, to consider the key issues affecting older people, which have become even more pertinent during the COVID-19 Pandemic. These include, but are not exclusively, social isolation and digital exclusion. This may provide opportunities to consider how the carry forward budget may be spent in ways that best meet the needs identified by the older people of North Ayrshire.

**Locality Priorities Refresh** – The Community Planning Partnership is currently undertaking an exercise to revisit the locality priorities within each locality. These were previously identified and set out in 2017. This is an opportunity to see if what matters within communities has changed, especially in light of the Covid 19 pandemic.

**Garnock Valley Community Support Hub** – The Hub continues to support vulnerable people within the community. The Hub offers advice, guidance, food parcels and also prescription collections and deliveries for those unable to leave their home due to self-isolating or who are in financial hardship. From 23<sup>rd</sup> March 2020 to 28<sup>th</sup> February 2021, almost 5000 volunteer hours were contributed from local volunteers towards supporting the community through the Hub.

**Garnock Valley Community Food Network** – Local organisations continue to work together to develop the Garnock Valley Food Network. This is a locality wide collaboration to help address food insecurity in the Garnock Valley. The Network met with Tesco on 9<sup>th</sup> Feb to ensure waste is minimised and to discuss collaborative working.

In addition, a North Ayrshire wide Food Systems Network has been developed to bring together several organisations from throughout North Ayrshire who have opened or plan to open a pantry/larder within their community. This will enable groups to support to each other as well as share ideas.

**Dalry Community Garden** - Dalry Community Development Hub have now received planning consent for their community garden and work will start on site soon.

Beith & District Community Council — The Community Council were delighted to have been informed that following their suggestions, there will be 6 new cycle parking locations in Beith by May 2021. These will benefit the community and visitors to the town, encouraging users to shop locally. They are also pleased to report that they have purchased a War Memorial Commemorative Bench to be placed in Wilson Street Garden. In addition, they were able to support the community with The Best Dressed Window competition in December. Feedback was very positive with comments such as 'it's good to see the town shops looking so good at Christmas'. The Community Council continue to meet monthly over Zoom on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Tuesday of each month.

Dalry Community Larder – This was launched on 18th Nov 2020 and has operated on a Wednesday evening and Saturday morning from the Community Centre in Dalry. Approx. 110 people are accessing support each week. They provide fresh and date specific products which they receive from various sources including Tesco, Irvine`s Bakery, Café Solace and Co-op. They also distribute a number of toiletries, which have been donated. This is currently all provided free of charge however they are now looking to move towards a minimum and sustainable membership model from March. The feedback is that the people accessing the service are appreciative of the support they are providing for the community.

**Barrmill Jolly Beggars** - Funding of £25,000 was received for community benefit. This provided over 2500 bags of kindness which were distributed to isolated people in the Garnock Valley over the last year.

**Participatory Budgeting** – Applications for the Locality PB closed on 14<sup>th</sup> February. A total of 49 applications were received from local community groups in the Garnock Valley: 11 for Arts & Culture, 17 for Main PB and 21 for Youth PB. Groups have been notified whether they were successful and voting for the Youth PB will commence Monday 8<sup>th</sup> March for 1 week.

### Highlights

**NCN7** – The 3 Garnock Valley Community Councils continue to work with NAC to explore the feasibility of the NCN7 route between Kilbirnie and Dalry. A proposal from Sustrans has been submitted to Transport Scotland and a decision on the proposal is imminent. It is hoped that a successful outcome will lead to work beginning mid-April.

**Lochshore** - Funding has been secured from Sustrans for Phase 2 active travel route at Lochshore. Construction of the route will begin in late summer 2021 and be completed early in 2022. In addition, there is a live online public engagement currently taking place on the features to be incorporated into a circular route on the site. The design should be complete by the end of April and, subject to securing the remaining funding, the route will be constructed prior to the Garnock Hub building opening in 2022.

**Guided walks** – A programme of health and heritage walks have been planned to help aid recovery from the wider impact of covid on mental and physical health.

Participants will be identified by working in partnership with Community Link Workers.

A737 at Beith – Beith and District Community Council has welcomed Transport Secretary, Michael Matheson MSP's confirmation that the Scottish Government will move to the procurement phase for construction of new roundabouts and a flyover at the junctions of the A737 and B777 and the A737 and B706. This has been an ongoing campaign by the Community Council, supported by Kilbirnie & Glengarnock Community Council, Dalry Community Council, local councillors, and MSP Kenneth Gibson. It is hoped that work will commence late 2021.

### **Highlights**

**Dalry Skate Park** – A steering group is currently being established to help design a skate park which will be located within Dalry Park, funded by Town Centre Regeneration Fund. If anyone would be interested in finding out more or would like to get involved, please contact Christina on the details provided at the end of this update.

**Review of Halls, Centres and Libraries** – The 3<sup>rd</sup> stage of the consultation into the future of North Ayrshire's Halls, Centres and Libraries went live on Friday 5<sup>th</sup> March. This will be open for the community to have their say until Wednesday 5<sup>th</sup> May. Details of how to get involved can be found on the North Ayrshire Council's website and will be promoted through social media and postal mail outs.



Facilities and amenities

**Green Health Fund** – A funding bid of £4,900 was successful from Green Health Partnership Fund. This will fund the rewilding project at Place Woodland. This programme is being offered as an outdoor learning opportunity for St. Bridget's P7 pupils, working with Place Woodland volunteers. This project will hopefully encourage more involvement at the woodland through issuing bird boxes, wild plants and encouraging wildlife recording.

Garnock Valley Men's Shed – The trustees continue to meet online during lockdown. The Asset Transfer of Lease has now been approved and roof repairs and resurfacing were completed during lockdown. The Scale Model Group meets on Monday afternoons and Fred Brown hosts a Facebook Live Model Group on Wednesday evenings. By reaching out in these ways, it has helped to address loneliness and isolation during these difficult days, having a positive impact on mental health and supports some of the more vulnerable members.

**Lochshore** - Plans for the Garnock Hub are progressing well. Construction should begin in May 2021, with the building opening in summer 2022. A consultant will be appointed in the next couple of weeks to develop the detailed masterplan for all phases of development. This will include a public consultation, which it is hoped will run during April/May 2021. Green Action Trust are currently leading on the design of approximately 10ha of new woodland at the north of the site which should be planted over the winter of 2021-22.

Valley. Cailley from Beith Trust has been attending the Community Council meetings to help spread the word to populate the app ahead of a formal launch.

**Garnock Valley Youth Forum** – The group continues to meet weekly online via ZOOM. Activities have included quiz nights and supporting the North Ayrshire wide LGBTQI+ charter. The group also recognised and celebrated Burns' Night with a Scottish themed event. In addition, the group assisted with the PB Shortlisting and are currently planning an environmental project working in partnership with Dalry Community Development Hub.

**Youth Work Education Recovery Fund** – NAC, working with Beith Community Development Trust, have commenced delivery of an employability programme for young people identified through Garnock Campus.

**Dalry Community Chit Chat** - A weekly community chit chat has started via ZOOM and takes place every Tuesday. During the sessions everyone engages in conversation, shares ideas and stories about the Dalry area. Project will help to tackle social isolation, boredom, and support people through the recovery of COVID. So far, 13 people have registered to date.

**Beith Skate Park** – Positive progress has been made to bring together like minded individuals keen to develop a skate park for Beith. Working with the Beith Park Action Group will allow the group the opportunity to access the existing knowledge, skills, and experience and to support the new group in their transition to their committee.

**Youth Engagement** - Detached youth work had been on hold since January due to covid restrictions however was able to restart on 5<sup>th</sup> March. The Youth Engagement Working Group met in January, including representatives from Police Scotland, Garnock Community Campus and Young Persons Support Team. The group will meet again on 23<sup>rd</sup> March and aims to reduce anti-social behaviour through positive and meaningful engagement.

The Ayrshire Community Trust - TACT Staff have been organising and facilitating monthly 'networking' Forum meetings for all 3rd Sector groups and organisations that wish to attend. The next online Forum Meeting is scheduled for Tuesday 16th March. If you are a 3rd Sector organisation and you are interested in attending, please email: info@tact.scot

TACT have a small supply of PPE for local volunteers / groups to access. This includes gloves, sanitiser, aprons, and face masks. If you know of any groups that could benefit from this, please telephone the office on 01294 443044.

Positive Steps with Partners is our Employability Project focusing on working with local individuals to access quality work placements, training, and personal development opportunities. #### **Identifying a Need**

Barrmill Jolly Beggars Burns Club realised in February 2020 in the build up to the Covid-19 pandemic and the subsequent 'community lockdowns' that this would pose issues for our own club members, mainly in the age 70+ age group. Accordingly, we decided that as a club we would endeavour to support our members and if grant funding was available, the wider community in the Garnock Valley.

As it would have impossible to help those in need in a general sense with our limited resources, we decided to try to specifically support club members, disabled people, and widows/widowers over 70 years of age.

Receiving grant funding was of the essence if our objective was to be reached, so we began searching out potential grantees and applying for funding, which in itself was time-consuming and lengthy exercise.

### **Our Funders**

However, over the 12 months period we were successful in gaining grant funding for our project from a variety of funders: Bring Joy Foundation (twice); Beith Trust; Tesco (Twice); National Lottery Community Fund; Impact Funding Scotland; Dalry Parish Boundary Trust; Barrmill Jolly Beggars Burns Club; The Ayrshire Community Trust (TACT); Age Scotland (twice); North Ayrshire Council and Foundation Scotland.

Funding of £25,000 was the total received which is a quite remarkable sum of money to raise for community benefit distribution over a one year period.

Importantly, a comprehensive end of grant report together with photographs and all relevant receipts was forwarded to the grant funders. This resulted in three of the funders quickly offering us further grants to continue the project. This allowed the project to continue until March 2021, making it a year-long project.

### Safety Issues and Content of Jolly Bags of kindness

The 'Jolly bags of kindness' were delivered to each recipients door whilst social distancing and wearing face-masks and disposable gloves. We were extremely conscious that we did not wish to be responsible for spreading Covid-19 or indeed catching it during the important delivery runs. Each monthly delivery contained a variety of tinned foods (soup, rice, beans etc), tea bags, coffee, hand gel, tissues, biscuits, sweets, local books and magazines.

### **Buying Local**

All items were purchased locally in North Ayrshire in support of our commitment to the Garnock Valley in particular and in line with NAC Community Wealth Building Strategy. The value of the contents of each bag ranged from £7.50 to £10 and was boosted considerably by bulk buying, money off coupons, discounts as well as donations of additional supplies by large stores, particularly Tesco, Kilbirnie, at no cost.

### **Wider Community Benefit**

In addition during the project we were also able to deliver smaller 'Jolly Bags of Kindness' to Garnock Valley Disability Group; 4 GP surgeries in the Garnock Valley; NAC Care at Home Teams in the Garnock Valley; two residential Care Homes in Beith; Police Station, Kilbirnie; Ambulance Station, Kilbirnie; Residential homes in Beith, Kilbirnie and Dalry; Sheltered Housing Complexes in Beith, Kilbirnie and Dalry; Post Office, Beith; nominated members of Garnock Valley Men's Shed.

### **Response from recipients**

The grant funding was very helpful indeed and greatly appreciated by Barrmill Jolly Beggars Burns Club and all those who specifically benefited from the 'Jolly Bags of Kindness' project.

Although the recipients were mainly in the Garnock Valley, the club have members who reside in West Kilbride, Ardrossan, Saltcoats, Kilwinning, Irvine, rural farms in Burnhouse and Barrmill; Johnstone, Paisley and Erskine.

As far as we are aware Barrmill Jolly Beggars BC was the only totally voluntary club/ group in the Garnock Valley providing this special service.

### Newsletters

During the project the club also produced five newsletters for members and recipients and these, too, were well received.

### Social Isolation

A large number of recipients were also shielding because of infirmities and age. So the opportunity was taken during delivery of bags to spent time catch up whilst maintaining strict social distancing and the deliverer wearing mask/gloves. Feedback was excellent and

what shone through consistently was the sheer joy of recipients that our wee club had remembered them at this time of difficulty.

Taking on such a project is a huge amount of work viz: applying for grant funding; starting to purchase suitable items for inclusion in the Jolly bags of kindness; storing the items; bagging the items prior to delivery and being restricted in help because of social distancing during Covid; loading the packed deliveries into a vehicle and delivering them to the doors of recipients – always social distancing.

Because of the covid-19 and other restrictions the bulk of the entire work was carried out by two people for this one year period). Without any shadow of doubt worthy of special mention for her dedication to the project was Kathleen Reid. She single-handedly (because of Covid-19 restrictions) did all the purchasing for the bags; filling the car; unloading items at home and placed in the house or hut/garage; filled the bags prior to delivery; made up the delivery run list; delivering each bag personally; spoke to recipients whilst social distanced; and importantly carried out the administration of the project

During the project we also came across young families who were clearly struggling and they, too, were provided with Jolly bags of kindness. What shone through strongly is that many people are finding life difficult because of sudden unemployment, health issues and drink/drug issues. It was not possible to help everyone, but by targeting those with disabilities, widows/widowers and older people, we did reach out to a specific part of the community who were suffering from loneliness and social isolation and they were very appreciative of the service provided. We have many letters of thanks, cards and emails acknowledging the service provided.

#### **Thanks from Recipients**

The following is a brief sample of replies received giving an insight into some of the reactions of recipients in their own words.

Hello Donald and Kathleen, a quick note to let you know that I got the parcel that you kindly left for Elizabeth and myself, also to say thank you for the hard work put in to making up and delivering the parcels, the two of you do a great job, the generosity and kindness shown is very much appreciated. My thanks for all that you do, God Bless

Just a short note to say "thank you" for thinking about us and delivering that lovely wee parcel to our door. It was such a nice surprise and we will definitely be able to use all the items especially during this COVID period when we are not out and about much to do our own shopping.

Harry was at Crosshouse Hospital today having his second chemotherapy treatment and tomorrow he is going to the Beatson for a shot of radiotherapy to see if will ease the pain in his back. Again we are grateful to the many funders who valued our objective and gave support.
