3. Cost of the School Day

The Partnership received a verbal update by the Lead Officer on the work of a Short-Life Working Group on Reducing the Cost of the School Day which had been established by the Council's Cabinet to identify and roll out best practice in this area.

Headteachers provided details of supports that are in place within schools, that included:-

- Breakfast boxes and healthy snacks;
- Funding towards the cost of school uniforms, uniform exchange and Halloween costume exchange:
- Grab and Go that provides take home food for young people; and
- Only Silver Coin Poppy Day collection;

The Group discussed:-

- The important role of breakfast clubs and free lunches;
- The need to avoid stigma for young people in receipt of support;
- The working group seeking the views of the Pupil and Parent Councils; and
- The benefit of a Strategy to ensure a consistent council wide approach.

4. **Chit Chat Update**

The Partnership received a verbal update from the Locality Co-ordinator on the Irvine Virtual Working stream meeting with representatives from a range of community groups, held virtually on Monday 23rd November. An application had been made to the Community Investment Fund from Irvine Community Centres Digital Upgrades, on behalf of Castlepark Community Association, Fullarton Hub, Redburn Hub, Broomlands & Bourtreehill Community Association and Vineburah Community Association. Funding would be used to upgrade a range of computers, laptops, tablets, printers, cameras and peripheral equipment for use by, and the benefit of, the local community.

Purpose: Project Update

Background

The Digital Participation Officer (DPO) commenced work on February 3, 2020, seven weeks ahead of the start of the lockdown resulting from the Covid-19 pandemic on March 23, 2021.

The development of the original aspirations of the Digital Irvine project was obviously affected by the lockdown and consequently activities have focused on:

- alleviating social isolation and negative effects on mental health by
 - o enhancing the digital literacy of people new to or struggling with digital technology
 - o recruiting and training volunteer Digital Champions and community mentors
- supporting residents' influence and sense of control by
 - o supporting residents to access and contribute to virtual events
 - o facilitating consultative meetings and recreational activities
- contributing to employability through
 - o provision of volunteering opportunities
 - delivery of online training
 - promoting vacancies via the Irvine Virtual Community Centre and ILP Facebook pages.

Key Points for Locality Partnership

Support for those who are digitally disadvantaged:

- Successful applications to the Connecting Scotland Project
 - o Connecting Scotland Phase 1: 51 devices received with 50 distributed
 - Connecting Scotland Project Winter Support: 25 devices received with 18 distributed / allocated to date.
 - These have been distributed via connections made through communications with community groups, connections made through social media, and direct referrals.
 - The majority of devices were taken up by elderly and shielded people to support communications with friends and relatives, with a smaller number delivered to younger (shielded and/or disabled) people to support training and employment.
- Supported successful applications to the Leader Enabling Rural Community Groups of Ayrshire for Drybridge Community Hall Association and Springside Community Association, totalling 22 pieces of digital equipment including iPads & laptops
- Digital Irvine Infrastructure Upgrade: Updated information on IT equipment requirements for 5 community centres in support of CIF application totalling almost

- £80k, including higher specification PCs and laptops for training young people in creating video content. Now being funded by the Scottish Government, the procurement of this equipment is in process in collaboration with Input CW.
- Designing & publishing video and printable content for supporting beginners with digital devices and communications apps, available via North Ayrshire Virtual Community Centre's Irvine Virtual Community Centre & North Ayrshire Adult Learning Facebook groups.
- Creation and co-creation and delivery of online training sessions via NAC's
 Community Leadership Collective for the benefit of community groups and council
 staff. Includes: Working With Adults New To Digital Technology; Hosting Zoom
 Meetings, and Introduction to Videomaking.

Volunteer recruitment, training and management.

- Our commitment to Connecting Scotland includes supporting recipients of the devices who require help. To date we have a team of 5 trained Digital Champions including 3 volunteers.
- Since January almost 40 hours of volunteer telephone support have been provided to 9 adults new to using digital technology.

Community Engagements:

- Virtual Tea Parties (as a member of the Irvine Connected Communities Team) in partnership with Irvine Seniors Forum:
 - Two afternoon sessions delivered: a pilot, the Big Irvine Virtual Tea Party in September and the Big Irvine Christmas Tea Party December.
 - The aim is to develop this initiative as an intergenerational activity with the Irvine Youth Forum to support running of similar events in the future.
- Provision of 'safe space' sessions for beginners to experience virtual meetings
- Support for Irvine Seniors Forum virtual meetings ongoing.
- Support for Broomlands & Bourtreehill Community Association creating a Facebook presence
- Region-wide Digital Skills Community Survey
 - o A total of 104 responses were received; 7 from Irvine
- Facilitating Virtual Working Groups (Chit-chat) meetings since November

- Contributed to the development of the North Ayrshire Virtual Community Centre Facebook presence; with focus on the Irvine Virtual Community Centre and North Ayrshire Adult Learning groups pages.

Action Required by Locality Partnership

- Whilst the Connecting Scotland initiative has provided a lifeline for many, there
 remain significant numbers of people without access to the internet, including
 jobseekers, who would benefit from being connected. Whilst there may be future
 provision via Connecting Scotland, the Partnership may wish to consider funding
 some tablets and mobile data devices for those who 'fall through the cracks'.
- Members of the Partnership are asked to contribute to promoting the availability of support for digital learners and for the availability of training and support for volunteer digital tutors.
- Consider the risk of the absence of a DPO at the end of the current contract period on 31/7/2021

Connected Scotland Phase 1

The Irvine Locality Communities Team has received 51 digital tablets and laptops together with 'Mi-Fi' internet connections from Connecting Scotland for distribution to people who are at risk of isolation because of the Covid crisis through being 'digitally disadvantaged', and who meet specific criteria.

Support will be provided to recipients of the devices on a one-to-one basis via phone and in person (in a venue where social distancing may be maintained).

The devices are intended to benefit people who are all of the following:

- Digitally excluded do not have an appropriate device and/or are not connected to the internet at home
- 2. On low incomes so cannot afford to buy a device or pay for internet access
- 3. At risk of isolation due to coronavirus because they're in the extremely high vulnerability group* ('shielding') or the higher risk of severe illness group* including people aged 70 or over (regardless of medical conditions)

Connecting Scotland Winter Support Package

A further 25 devices have been received as part of the Connecting Scotland Winter Support Package. These will be distributed by end March.

These devices are for individuals meeting the following criteria:

- 1. Older people (aged 60+) and/or have a disability;
- 2. **Digitally excluded** do not have an appropriate device and/or are not connected to the internet at home; and
- 3. **On low incomes** so cannot afford to buy a device or pay for internet access.

Digital Irvine / Irvine CLD Team

Connected Scotland Phase 2 – (delivered and distributed in February 2021)

198 secured from Connected Scotland phase 2 supporting households with children, care leavers and digitally excluded. This was a 6 - way partnership between Irvine locality Team, Greenwood Academy, Children's 1st, Irvine Royal Academy, Health and Social Partnership Throughcare, Kinship Care, Corporate Parenting and Lennox Partnership working with families

All devises have been received and all partners are now in receipt of devices.

Connecting Scotland - Second round for Phase 2. (March 2021 delivery)

150 devices have been secured from second round phase 2 Connecting Scotland by NAC Connected Communities Team working in partnership with Greenwood Academy and Irvine Royal Academy and associated cluster primary schools – supporting households with children. This phase aims to provide iPad's, chrome books and Mi-Fi internet connection supporting and develop digital skills for individuals who are:

- 1. Digitally excluded, do not have appropriate devises and who are not connected to internet at home.
- 2. On low incomes so cannot afford to buy devises or pay for internet access.
- 3. And are either:
 - a) Household with children
 - b) Care leavers up to the age of 26.

Getting online will help individuals access public services, support learning and training, help find or maintain work or provide resilience in the event of lockdowns. All the above are contributing to broader social inclusion and reducing poverty reduction strategies.

Digital Champions

9 learners have been identified and are receiving support from our digital champions. Who are a group of volvineers who help people who get devices through Connecting

Scotland. Participants will learn how to connect a devise to the internet using wifi and putting in the password when they need to. They will learn about sharing documents as attachments within emails and learn, understand internet safety. Learners will be able to use internet safely, confidently and effectively.

Digital Irvine infrastructure Upgrade

Funding has been secured from Scottish Government – Addressing Future Needs for the upgrade of digital resources. Computer upgrade will provide Community Centres with appropriate digital resources helping community associations roll out of a structured learning programme of support, supporting members of the community to access support to vital online services.

Community Leadership Collective

As part of the Leadership Collective Training provided for Community Groups, the Irvine Locality Communities Team have been running virtual courses through Zoom. The courses that have been run are:

- An Introduction to Hosting a Zoom Meeting Part 1 on Wed 3rd February and Part 2 on Wed 10th February. Part 1 had 20 attendees, and Part 2 had 14 attendees.
- 2. 3 part course named **Working with Adults New to Digital Technology**. The course commenced on Thursday 18th February, with 5 attendees.
- Currently facilitating An Introduction To Videomaking. Part 1 commenced on Tuesday 2nd March with 17 attendees. Part 2 is scheduled to take place on Tuesday 9th March. There is also a waiting list of 12 for the course to be run again.
- **4. Sports Funding Session** was held on Wed 27th January which was attended by 10 attendees. There is a waiting list of 4.
- 5. **Health & Wellbeing Funding Session** which was scheduled to run on the Wed 24th Feb, however due to technical issues this will be rescheduled to the 14th of April. 12 attendees have signed up, with a waiting list of 7.
- **6. Basic Bookkeeping** session ran on Tuesday 2nd February, with 6 attendees.
- 7. Using Word for Quick and Easy Graphics for Social Media training is scheduled to take place on Wednesday 17th March
- **8. Intergenerational Training** was scheduled to place on Thursday 18th March, but that has been rescheduled until after easter.
- **9. Taking on an Asset** training will take place on Wednesday 24th March.

North Ayrshire Fairer Food – Community Food System (Community Food Shop) Choices – Community Matters Fullarton Street, Irvine

Fullarton CA and Vineburgh CA with support from connected communities are in process of setting up a community food shop and training facility where members are given access to discounted groceries sourced through donations from individuals, partner organisations and donations from local fare share initiatives in and around Irvine. The shop will be getting a refurb and work is due to commence in March. We are anticipating all going well that the shop will open on Monday 5th April 2021. community handbook has been developed in partnership with anchor organisations across North Ayrshire.

Next Step:

Complete tasks associated within NA fairer Food Community handbook Meet weekly till the opening of the community shop.

Meetings have been set up with BABCA and Springside CA to develop community food provision and support both Community Associations with the development and implementation of a community food initiative.



6 Neighbourhood Virtual Working groups have met on zoom each month since December. Neighbourhood Action Plans are now being drawn up for each area. A professional Irvine huddle group will be identified with NAC locality teams who have responsibility as leads identified. We will develop a process and system using a RAG approach which will track and monitor progress against each action. No Financial Statements are available to review as this organisation was only set-up in March 2020. The bank statement provided does not show any income from previous sales of these packs and the only expenditure shown is for wages.

Legal:

In accordance with Section 15(4) of the Local Government etc. (Scotland) Act 1994, the Council in administering the Common Good Fund shall have regard to the interests of the inhabitants of the area to which the Common Good relates.

This Grant Application cannot be justified in terms of Section 15 (4), as it is limited to recipients of a particular age ("reception and year 1 at Primary School") and to the "ten" primary schools located within "Irvine" generally, not particular schools located within the area considered to be the Burgh of Irvine.

Economy & Communities:

The CPR Group is based in Tain but is a nationwide organisation. They are seeking funding to support the purchase of "Little Lifesaver Packs" for distribution to primary schools. The packs aim to help parents save their child and other adults in a choking and cardiac emergency.

- We have sent out various information bulletins highlighting useful resources, funding information and general advice.
- TACT Social Media continues to be used as a platform to promote safety messages from Police Scotland, Funding Information, Benefit Support, Energy Advice and vital local service provision. We would welcome any information from other service providers that we can share.
- TACT Staff have been organising and facilitating monthly 'networking' Forums for all 3rd Sector groups and organisations that wish to attend. - Staff continue to maintain regular dialogue with North Ayrshire Council to update on progress and identify additional ways we can work together.

- Eglinton Community Garden Collaboration we are continuing to work with a range of

 and Drug Partnership to deliver a successful Community Garden for local people to
 get involved and learn to grow their own produce. The Collective have recently been

- Organisational Support continuing to work with groups and organisations delivering relevant Training including Governance, Basic Bookkeeping and Volunteer Management. We are also assisting with Charity Registrations, PVG Support, Funding Support and Support with compiling Constitutions.
- Community Wealth Building, North Ayrshire is the first Community Wealth Building Council in Scotland – this is fantastic news and something very positive for North Ayrshire. As the Third Sector Interface, TACT sits at the Community Wealth Commission. This commission supports the implementation of the CWB Strategy and will encourage involvement from local businesses, government agencies and local organisations on CWB initiatives.

- SLACK The Ayrshire Community Trust and Arran CVS as the Third Sector Interface are currently trialling an engagement platform known as SLACK. This will have a wide range of information and resources for 3rd Sector Organisations to access. If you would like access to this platform please contact: info@tact.scot
- We are continuing to contact and engage with 3rd Sector groups and organisations to complete our COVID Health Check Questionnaire. This Health Check enables us to ascertain support that is required including Funding, Governance Support, OSCR Guidance, Volunteering Support, Health and Well-being information and any other areas.
- Staff continuing to update and source a range of Volunteering Opportunities that are currently available. We are still receiving a high number of Volunteer Registrations and don't have enough placements for those interested. - TACT are working closely with the British Red Cross, through the national vaccination centres, to provide suitable volunteers who are able to help.
- TACT and Arran CVS staff will offer at least 100 individuals from different groups and organisations the opportunity to attend Mental Health Improvement Training to support the ongoing needs of service users and staff throughout this pandemic and importantly there on after.
- TACT and Arran CVS as the local Interface were asked to consult with local 3rd Sector Organisations by the Scottish Government on proposed changes to Charity Law. The consultation event was held on 21st January 2021. Results from the consultation have been returned to the Scottish Government. The consultation was closed on 19th February 2021.
- TACT Capacity Building Officers have been in touch with Nicola Gooch, NAC Community Benefits Officer to introduce ourselves and explain our role within Community Benefits and to discuss how we can work together. The Capacity Building Officers have also been in contact with local contractors and put them in touch with local third sector organisations.
- Staff are working with our Locality Partners in the Participatory Budgeting process.
