The group is a combination of the voluntary organisation which manages the football delivery under the umbrella of the registered charity Kilwinning Community Sports Club.

Kilwinning Community Sports Club owns the ground and is made up of its members, one of which is Kilwinning Rangers. Kilwinning Rangers Juniors and Kilwinning Rangers Youth Club provide pathways for young people to continue to participate in sport and to deliver their aspirations both within sport and the community.

Kilwinning Rangers has been in existence for 120 years, moving to Kilwinning Community Sports Club in early 2019, although Kilwinning Rangers were a founder member of the charity and have been in membership for 10 years. Both Kilwinning Rangers Juniors and Kilwinning Rangers Youth Club have their own Committees, elected by its members, who will work together on this project.

Although closely identified with its on-the-pitch activities, the football activities sit at the heart of a hub which delivers a wide range of community development, bringing together youth activities, community food provision, employability skills and health and wellbeing (see Appendix I). On a weekly basis around 300-400 people participate in activities, with a further 270-330 young people taking part.

Kilwinning Community Sports Club is a well -used facility and lacks the capacity to provide space for the numbers involved and to meet the community ambitions of the organisation.

In the 2019 Kilwinning's Future, a wide-community review took place to identify a key action to build a stronger community. The top priority was the need for places for young people to meet, attractions or organised activities giving more options of things for young people to do in Kilwinning. With 216 people, across the age-groups, voting for this it is evident that there is wide-spread community support. A number of other themes help support this application including the support of 139 people prioritising creating projects or undertaking initiatives that support people's individual wellbeing needs (physically, mentally or socially).

The main outcomes which the organisation wants to achieve are:

- Increased participation by young people in sports/creative-related activities;
- Improved health and wellbeing;
- Increased confidence and skills;
- Greater sense of pride in the area;
- More volunteering from adults;
- Better networking for young people;
- Building on the number of youth volunteers;
- Good role models for young people; and
- Improved pathways from the organisation into the business club and, potentially, employment.

We would like to convert a recently donated 110ft x 40ft portacabin. This will form a 433 square metre flexible community space to address the capacity issues for youth and other activities in the main clubhouse building. A large, fully accessible, multi-functional space will be created through the removal of dividing walls, with works also set to include a Youth Zone, the construction of toilets, affordable office and rental space for small local businesses. The this will provide the sustainability for the organisation and this will help to provide further youth activities).

The project will also provide much needed sustainable community space. It will create much needed affordable retail and office space to allow existing and new businesses to flourish creating new employment and assisting in delivering the local authorities Economic Plan for Kilwinning. However, the most important aspect of the project will be the Youth Zone area that will allow young people in the town to visit mix and enjoy the social aspect of the facility.

There is no need to set up a new organisation. Both Kilwinning Rangers Juniors & Kilwinning Rangers Youth Group are already constituted and form part of their regulated governing bodies. The groups have their own Committees with strong volunteer infrastructure.

Our ambition is to empower young people in Kilwinning to have a strong focus and community purpose in life.

The Club believes that no young person should suffer from financial disadvantage and provides ways in which young people can be included. Examples of this include football kit exchanges, food-programmes (The Buffs in the Kitchen in partnership with CentreStage) and after-school coaching schemes. A Homework Club is expanding its range of activities to offer more options to young people who are more engaged through creativity and tech, than sport. All participants have access to after-school snacks.

Our project meets with North Ayrshire Community Planning Partnership Priorities:

- Building Stronger Communities

We work in partnership with local and national agencies including but not limited to Kilwinning Academy, The Scottish Football Association, Active Schools and local businesses to provide services and programmes that improve the life chances/health and wellbeing for members of the community.

This initiative supports the findings of the Kilwinning charrette, Kilwinning's Future, and the Locality Partnership's priorities of Work and the Local Economy and improving the Local Environment through building up local facilities.

There were a number of meetings held with Local Authority and National Agencies involved in delivering football in our area. There were also a number of public meetings held. Records of these meetings can be provided if required. Estimates are around 200 participants.

There is broad support for the direction in which the organisation is developing, in particular the work with young people. While there is support for partnership working, however, financial contributions are hard to secure.

No objections were notified during the recent planning process.

The finances would be managed through the organisation's accounts and released as the project progresses. Accounts are overseen by the Scottish Junior Football Association, as well as members. The treasurer is a chartered accountant. In addition, there is close working with Kilwinning Community Sports Club and advice is available as members of the club.

A variety of volunteering and employment opportunities exist through the programmes

- Coaching
- Health and Wellbeing
- Kit Exchange
- Men's Shed
- Creative Kilwinning

It is anticipated that this might be around 50 volunteering opportunities.

Through the business club, the organisation is working to build links between the school and local employers, with an ambition that 8 young people might move into training or employment through the business club networking. This is at early stages until the facilities are operational, and this is limiting the organisation's ability to progress.

Our organisation has had numerous on-going meeting regards this project with North Ayrshire Council and all partner agencies being fully aware of the importance of these facilities to the Kilwinning community and the future survival and sustainability of Kilwinning Community Sports Club.

7. Amount of funding being requested

Amount of funding requested: £15,000

We received £41190 from the CIF in 2020 for this project. At this point the budgeted costs were conservative but achievable for the refurbishment required to the donated Portacabin. Unfortunatly after receiving planning permission NAC Building Control after reviewing the building drawings advised that in their view there was a change of use within the building structure which resulted in them deeming the build as a "new build" and not a "refurbishment as originally costed for. This would mean it fell under new build regulations. The biggest impact for us was the enhanced insulation values and disabled access the building would require before a Building Completion Warrant to allow building accupancy would be issued. The insulation costs alone were £22000. This along with delays caused by Covid and Government travel restictions have increased our costs by approx.. £25000. We have applied to Landtrust for £10000 and are seeking to request the remaining £15000 gap funding from CIF.

Completion of Electrical/Plumbing & Security Works £10000 Completion of Internal & External Building works £15000 Total £25000

They use a comprehensive database that provides effective data to monitor the targets of each project and programmes undertaken. The resultant reports are produced on a monthly basis for the board of management's information.

Corrective action if necessary is then put in place in order to stay on course to achieve the targets set. The Project Manager will collect monthly data by speaking to placements and the partner agencies and businesses.

Locality Training menu will now be delivered virtually where possible. This is being relooked at by the teams. A couple of training sessions have already been on offer.

Team continuing to check in with me and my mental health group members where possible, as well as members of the elderly forum.

The Kilwinning Community Hub is continuing to run from Kilwinning Library. We expected number of calls to rise when we went back into lockdown but that didn't happen. Some days there are no calls and some days we are getting one or two. Not as many volunteers involved now as the amount of requests is manageable by the staff that's involved.

Youth Forum still running on zoom every week. 6 members attending. As a group they have been discussing young people's mental health, black history month, relaxation techniques. Also just catching up with the young people, doing challenges and quizzes. They have been looking at child protection through social media. Looking to make partnership with the virtual community centres to carry this out. Applied for Youth PB to hold a young person's fun day outside. One of the young people has been nominated for the Young Scot award. Working with rangers to delivery an outdoor positive mental health project.

Detached Youth was on hold during the initial stages of lockdown but started back on Friday 26th February. This continues to happen in partnership with Police Scotland. Staff are Implementing the national guidance to try and engage with the most vulnerable whilst adhering to social distancing. Keeping in mind boundaries and responsibilities.

A confidence building and wellbeing workshop for community groups and members has been created. This involves a wide range of advice, techniques and interactive activities to address their low self-esteem and improve their mental wellbeing. This will be available online to view and an interactive workshop will be offered.



General

Kilwinning Progress Report



Reporting Period – Jan-March 21

Community Association Catch-up was held on Weds 24th Feb. 3 of 5 Community Associations attended. Great discussion was had, and this has continued to be a 6-weekly occurrence.

Next stage of the Halls Centres and Libraries consultation is now underway. This has been advertised through Social Media and all NA residents will also receive a postcard with the information on how to take part in with their Council Tax bill.

There is to be a pilot, using the social platform 'discord' to look at creating information and training opportunities for young people, parents/guardians/carers and highlighting LGBTQI across North Ayrshire.

Team have been using lampposts to advertise the Adult learning services available within Kilwinning.

System Changers - Kilwinning will become the first community in Scotland to take on the new System Changers Programme. This is designed to work with the community for the community to bring social change of how the systems in Kilwinning operate. This is in early stages and a working group of partners is currently being organised. The team will be working on this along with Lankelly and Corra.

Due to COVID most work on locality priorities came to a standstill for us to concentrate on the community hubs. This is something that we will now start to look at.

Food with Dignity projects should have now started. It was decided that depending on which part of Kilwinning you live in will determine which larder should be joined.

These are:

Woodwynd/ACES: Open to residents from Woodwynd, Corsehill and Dirrans. Opened on 25th Jan. Have 150 clients registered. Its open 3 days per week. It is being very well used and not always got slots available for everyone who needs it. Hopefully now that Cranberry Moss has opened and the areas been split into 2 this will help with availability of appointments.

Cranberry Moss: Open to residents from Pennyburn, Whitehirst Park and Blacklands. Larder Opened on 9th March. First week was very successful with all available slots being booked out.

PRYDE: Have now procured their vending machine. If centres aren't open again by April then they will look to do a take away service.

Cashback for Communities – Various groups received a share of NA funds. These were: Barnardos, Children 1st, Irvine Neighbourhood Youth Forum, and Impact Arts. Projects will take place April21 –March 22.

Connecting Scotland – Funding secured to provide 20 IT devices to the local community. The team are working on how best to distribute these while keeping within the contract with Connecting Scotland.

PB – Voting for youth PB is due to finish on Tues 16th March. 14 Kilwinning groups were successful in obtaining funding from Locality PB totalling £12,954. 4 Kilwinning groups were successful in obtaining funding from the Arts & Culture PB totalling £1592.49

Update

TTRO is now in place. Have received 2 queries/complaints re this, which between myself and Jonny from Roads dept we have responded to. Jonny is going to look at the Town Centre Fund to see if he can access funds to enable some issues that have been raised be addressed.



Housing and community (environmental issues)

Update

Outdoor Gym is now in and running well. It seems to have been very well received by the community. Kilwinning Community Events have now put in excellent picnic benches which the community have been raving about on social media. They are looking at next steps and further upgrades for the park. KCE have also been doing local litter picks.

Team is supporting Kilwinning Football Academy with current CAT at Almswall Road, the group are awaiting offer letter. They have also took on a 5 year lease on Blacklands Hall, which they will eventually look to progress to a CAT.

Staff from Kilwinning Youth Forum in early stages of discussions with Eglinton Park Rangers regarding a potential partnership project. Young people have been engaged with on potential ideas for the project.

Subject: To update the Locality Partnership in respect of the Elderly Grants.

Purpose: To approve the Elderly Grants 2020/21 Budget and agree proposals in respect of carrying this budget over to 2021/22.

Background: The Elderly Grants budget is normally presented to the Locality Partnership for agreement once budget details are received each April. The budget is set according to area elderly population and details are attached at Appendix 1.

The 2020/21 Elderly Grants budget for the Kilwinning Locality is £6,360.

Following agreement of the Elderly Grants budget, historical groups are invited to apply, and details of the groups are also shown at Appendix 1.

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, it has not been possible to hold the activities normally funded by the Elderly Grants budget because of the restrictions in place. Looking at the forthcoming financial year, it is difficult to predict what activities will be permitted and needs have changed. In order to address this, the following proposal is being made.

Proposal: The proposal for consideration is for the budget to be carried over from 2020/21 and that Officers convene a meeting with key older people's groups and the current groups who disburse the Elderly Grants, to consider the key issues affecting older people, which have become even more pertinent during the COVID-19 Pandemic. These include, but are not exclusively, social isolation and digital exclusion. This may provide opportunities to consider how the carry forward budget may be spent in ways that best meet the needs identified by the older people of North Ayrshire.

- TACT Social Media continues to be used as a platform to promote safety messages from Police Scotland, Funding Information, Benefit Support, Energy Advice and vital local service provision. We would welcome any information from other service providers that we can share.
- TACT Staff have been organising and facilitating monthly 'networking' Forums for all 3rd Sector groups and organisations that wish to attend. - Staff continue to maintain regular dialogue with North Ayrshire Council to update on progress and identify additional ways we can work together.

- TACT Digital are continuing to work with Kilwinning Heritage Group on a Digital Heritage Project for Kilwinning Abbey. We hope this will enable a greater number of individuals to access the Abbey on a digital platform.
- Positive Steps with Partners is our Employability Project focusing on working with local individuals to access quality work placements, training and personal development opportunities. - North Ayrshire Third Sector Chief Officer Group our first meeting of 2021 took place on 18th February 2021. This is open to Senior Staff working with a 3rd Sector Organisation. - Eglinton Community Garden Collaboration we are continuing to work with a range of organisations including North Ayrshire Council, Turning Point Scotland, The Conservation Volunteers, HSCP Learning Disability Team and North Ayrshire Alcohol and Drug Partnership to deliver a successful Community Garden for local people to get involved and learn to grow their own produce. The Collective have recently been successful in securing their first funding, to continue their work, from the Green Health Partnership. - Organisational Support continuing to work with groups and organisations delivering relevant Training including Governance, Basic Bookkeeping and Volunteer Management. We are also assisting with Charity Registrations, PVG Support, Funding Support and Support with compiling Constitutions.
- Community Wealth Building, North Ayrshire is the first Community Wealth Building Council in Scotland – this is fantastic news and something very positive for North Ayrshire. As the Third Sector Interface, TACT sits at the Community Wealth Commission. This commission supports the implementation of the CWB Strategy and will encourage involvement from local businesses, government agencies and local organisations on CWB initiatives.

- SLACK The Ayrshire Community Trust and Arran CVS as the Third Sector Interface are currently trialling an engagement platform known as SLACK. This will have a wide range of information and resources for 3rd Sector Organisations to access. If you would like access to this platform please contact: <u>info@tact.scot</u>
- We are continuing to contact and engage with 3rd Sector groups and organisations to complete our COVID Health Check Questionnaire. This Health Check enables us to ascertain support that is required including Funding, Governance Support, OSCR Guidance, Volunteering Support, Health and Well-being information and any other areas.
- Staff continuing to update and source a range of Volunteering Opportunities that are currently available. We are still receiving a high number of Volunteer Registrations and don't have enough placements for those interested. If you know of any groups or organisations that could assist with some additional volunteers please contact info@tact.scot
- TACT are working closely with the British Red Cross, through the national vaccination centres, to provide suitable volunteers who are able to help.
- TACT and Arran CVS staff will offer at least 100 individuals from different groups and organisations the opportunity to attend Mental Health Improvement Training to support the ongoing needs of service users and staff throughout this pandemic and importantly there on after.
- TACT and Arran CVS as the local Interface were asked to consult with local 3rd Sector Organisations by the Scottish Government on proposed changes to Charity Law. The consultation event was held on 21st January 2021. Results from the consultation have been returned to the Scottish Government. The consultation was closed on 19th February 2021.
- TACT Capacity Building Officers have been in touch with Nicola Gooch, NAC Community Benefits Officer to introduce ourselves and explain our role within Community Benefits and to discuss how we can work together. The Capacity Building Officers have also been in contact with local contractors and put them in touch with local third sector organisations.
- Staff are working with our Locality Partners in the Participatory Budgeting process.
