Categories

Bronze Award

For someone who is new to volunteering. Involves choosing a project to support and fit it around their needs; discovering more about their skills and strengths. It gives recognition for more regular volunteering undertaken. Volunteers that have completed between 25 and 49 hours are eligible for this award.

Silver Award

Taking volunteering to the next level by making a longer commitment to volunteering and developing skills and strengths through volunteer placements. People can record achievements, training, new skills and certificates, keeping them to hand to support any applications for further volunteering or work. Volunteers who have completed between 50 and 99 hours are eligible for this award

Gold Award

This award build on the experience and commitment volunteers have shown to an organisation and is awarded when volunteers complete between 100-199 hours of volunteering This award once again builds on the skills and commitment by the volunteer.

Platinum Award

This award is presented to those volunteers who have completed 200 hours or more and is a recognition of the extremely firm commitment that they have shown to an organisation.

Palladium Award

This for an outstanding contribution to volunteering. Palladium is now the most valuable of precious metals therefore it is reserved for those volunteers who are considered extremely valuable to the organisation. Individuals must have completed at least 200 hours and have exceeded expectations. The volunteer is nominated for this for this level of Award by the organisation they volunteer for. Decisions on the Palladium Award are made by the Palladium Panel. An Outstanding Achievement certificate is awarded.

Purpose: This report is to inform the Kilwinning Locality Partnership about Youth Forum,

Youth Citizenship/Partnership activity, planned and actual for the Kilwinning Area.

Background

This update only concerns the activity of the forum from 19th January in light of Damian Taylor's absence

The Kilwinning Youth Forum strive to benefit the lives of young people in the Kilwinning area. We aim to achieve this by involving young people in Kilwinning in the decision-making process and giving them a voice.

The groups current aim is to recruit new members through a series of TikTok, Facebook and Instagram posts we are hoping to post for week beginning 28/02/22. Posters have also been created to put around the school.

The group have been working in partnership with the Kilwinning LGBTQI+ Group (Open Ayrshire) to create a series of video stetches advising parents on the things to say and how to react if your child comes out as LGBTQI+. The group endeavours to launch these at the Parent LGBTQI+ Support Sessions beginning this year. Furthermore, these efforts contribute to North Ayrshire's Silver LGBTQI+ Charter mark.

The group have been instrumental to the Detached Youth Work Team, undertaking an advisory role in our identification of the issues impacting young people such as underage drinking and knife crime and the primary locations of anti-social behaviour such as Kilwinning Abbey.

The group are organising and delivering a fun-day in collaboration with Kilwinning Library. Whilst currently in the planning stages, the primary focus will be on emphasising the library as a youth space and the recruitment of new forum members.

After being awarded PB Funding, the Kilwinning Youth Forum will go onto plan a Family Funday in the summer.

CATs in Kilwinning that are currently in the system at present are:

Kilwinning Community Football Academy, Almswall Pavillion & Football Ground – this has now been completed.

Woodwynd Hall – no further update from Association following last meeting. The group are not keen to take on any CAT until the roof has been repaired.

New priorities are now active for the locality. These are Skills & Work opportunities (especially for young people), Environment and Green Open Space, Poverty & Equalities, and community Wellbeing. A discussion needs to be had with LP on how we want to take sub groups forward for these new priorities.

The next Locality Network Meeting is due to take place in Cranberry Moss Community Centre on Thurs 17th Feb. This event brings paid employees from different services who work in the community together to facilitate discussions on where we could be working together to best meet the needs of the community, avoiding any duplication.

General

Continuing to support Kilwinning Community Council. The group are keen to act as a catalyst for the locality to create a development trust. Supporting with that. The group are keen to involve more young people so have connected them to the new MSYP's.

Working with members of the Place team to look at Place framework and how this can be implemented in Kilwinning.

Kilwinning Youth Group started back in mid-January with the average attendance around 10 young people. The group programme is a balanced mix of fun activities and issue-based talks. The group sit well with Young Peoples' Voice and Rights, they all get the opportunity to voice their opinions in issues that relate to them

Love Hall AGM is due to take place on Monday 21 Feb at 7pm in the hall.

3 members of the Kilwinning Locality are currently receiving literacy support on a weekly basis. 2 previous learners have now gained employment.

PDA in Youth Work being delivered to some pupils in Kilwinning Academy. The young people have completed their assignments in Unit 1 Understanding Youth Work and Unit 2 Engaging with Young People. They are now a week into their youth work placement and beginning their Work Placement Booklet. By helping young people achieve this qualification, we are ensuring that the CLD needs of communities are met for future generations.

Currently linking up with Sharon Menzies from Ayrshire College who delivers core skills to students. Will be visiting students in the near future. Our goal is to tie the students in closer to their communities and to help them deliver any ideas they would like to carry out in the community.

Re-structuring the once Irvine library literacy group into a ASN social/support group. The group will carry out 1 hour literacy support out of the 2-hour time slot and the rest will be spend doing activities such as Cooking, Music Lessons, Photography, walks, picnics, IT skills etc. This will start on Wednesday 2nd March in Kilwinning Library, 1-3pm.

Looking to refresh 2022 Community Leadership Collective Training calendar. Have created form questionnaires, one for partners who deliver and one for NA wide residents to let us know what training they would like, and to suggest some we don't provide already.

Skills & Work Opportunities



Reporting Period – Jan-March 22

Update

Me & My Mental Health Group are back meeting in the library. They are exploring mental health and wellbeing in a safe, relaxed place. Looking at coping strategies for Anxiety, overthinking and stress. Team will be starting delivery of the HIIC (Health Issues In the Community) Course in the near future.

2 new Community Mental Health & Wellbeing Project delivery officers are now in post. They will cover the full of North Ayrshire. They are currently carrying out a mapping exercise of what services are available.

Stroll With It Kilwinning is due to start back in March. There were 8 members before the group broke for winter break.

Detached Youth Work has been back up and running since mid Jan. Working in Partnership with Police Scotland and KA leisure to deliver diversionary activities using Mobile Youth Centre and KA leisure's portable football pitch. Numbers engaging have not been great so far.

Community Wellbeing

ASN – Groups are now meeting face to face. Currently looking at funding for transport for the next financial year.

System changers is going well. Have looked at a range of channels connected to systems such as power dynamics, democracy, and rich pictures. We are now asking in the system – inviting people from a wide range of backgrounds to discuss the systems with their service. From this a group has emerged to pilot a cooking on a budget group starting with a 6 week pilot in the Blacklands. This will be done in partnership with Jason from Church of Nazarene who will carryout the cooking demonstrations. All participants will be fed at the group and will take home the ingredients used that night to cook again for the family at home.

Group will run for 6 weeks starting Thursday 10th March 5:30-7:30pm.

Community Chit Chats have been put on hold just now due to lack of attendance.

Kilwinning Elderly Forums first meeting since COVID happened on 11 Feb. Unfortunately, there were only 2 members turned up. Another date for group to meet has to be confirmed.

Transition work has started with P7s. This will consist of a 2 week input to all primary schools in Kilwinning to help them with the transition to the Academy.

Adult Learning ASN support - Re-structuring the once Irvine library literacy group into a ASN social/support group. The group will carry out 1 hour literacy support out of the 2-hour time slot and the rest will be spend doing activities such as Cooking, Music Lessons, Photography, walks, picnics, IT skills etc. This will start on Wednesday 2nd March in Kilwinning Library, 1-3pm.

Kilwinning Youth Forum – young people are in the process of deciding projects to spend funding on and recruit new members. Issues that are currently discussed in meetings include mental health in school, poverty, lack of bins in Kilwinning main street and the toilets in McGavin Park.

Update.

Continuing to support Eglinton Growers with their online monthly meetings. The group are going through a lease renewal and have managed to secure another 25 years. The Community Garden is back on track with, and the survey work will be carried out soon. Funding support given to apply to screw fix to cover the costs of drainage and QS.

Environment & Green open space

Still looking at a partnership between Kilwinning Youth Forum and Eglinton Park Rangers regarding potential project, however the member of staff that was dealing with that is currently off sick.

Been liaising with the Corsehill Swing Park group on requirements for the park, funding and requirements.

Through Community Benefit process, £300 was secured from PSL Printing for the TCV group outside Kilwinning Library to secure a new water butt and other gardening equipment

Food with dignity projects are continuing to run well.

The Wee Shoap

Still have a high membership and people attending the larder. The work on the conversion of the storage out the back of the centre into 'the wee shoap' has started and is looking fab. This should hopefully be ready very soon. The idea is to transform the small lounge room that 'the wee shoap' is in just now into a retro style café area to allow people to come together and receive info on relevant services such as money matters, Citrus Energy etc.

Pryde

Vending machine with food products at an affordable price is still available in the centre.

Poverty & Equalities

Cranberry Moss

Membership is high and appointments are being used up on a weekly basis.

LGBTQ group is still going well. young people are in the process of creating a guide for Kilwinning Academy staff and teachers on LGBT issues such as pronouns, facilities and transitioning. This will be the first young person's LGBT guide written by young people. In turn, LGBT members of the community are simultaneously being supported and providing a CLD resource

Working with Kilwinning Bowling club to look at filling the funding gap for their changing facilities/toilets for females. Have arranged for someone from Building Standards to go out and look at the site and discuss process required for getting portacabin in.

- Positive Steps with Partners is our Employability Project focusing on barrier removal working with local individuals to access quality work placements, training and personal development opportunities. The team have adapted the programme to a hybrid setting offering a variety of short fun and interactive zoom sessions covering topics such as, Personal Skills and Strength's, Comfort Zones, Goal Setting and Cooking on a Budget. - Community Wealth Building, North Ayrshire is the first Community Wealth Building Council in Scotland – this is fantastic news and something very positive for North Ayrshire. As the Third Sector Interface, TACT sits at the Community Wealth Commission.
