After School Transition Youth Groups – Three groups have recently started in the Garnock Valley, run by the Locality Team, for young people aged 10 and over. The Kilbirnie group started in September 2022 and has been running weekly since. Although only a small number have been attending so far, those who do are experiencing very positive benefits, such as increased interaction with peers, increased confidence and engagement in activities. The group have also applied for PB funding to go on a trip to the 5 Sisters Zoo. The Dalry group started in November 2022 and has been well attended so far. Those attending are all from the one school, however we hope they are joined by other young people from the other school within Dalry. They have engaged well in the activities so far and have come up with lots of ideas for future activities and how they would like to shape the club. A group for Beith started on 29 November 2022, with 9 young people attending the first week. This group will give young people access to sports, gaming, warm food and tying in with the community larder for parents to access.



Locality update

Dalry Community Development Hub – DCDH have had a busy and exciting year. They have welcomed many visitors to their Community Garden, giving their produce and recipes away to try at home. Their Soup night went down well using produce from the garden. Spicy Pumpkin, Potato and leek soup were provided. Tai Chi was introduced to their volunteers and visitors and has proved to be very popular. It will continue for the winter months in Rosearden Hall. Dalry Library have supported them and they are now able to access Wi-Fi at the Garden.

A successful afternoon tea was served at the garden in aid of Breast Cancer, which raised £1010.81 and they supported MacMillan Cancer Care with a Coffee Morning, raising £300. Their compost bins have proved to be very popular with snails and worms and they have now produced wonderful compost. The group have installed an access ramp and now the Garden Room is accessible to all. The Playtime Early Years Nursery are using the space for their meetings and recently held a bake sale. The group were delighted to host the Santa's Grotto for Dalry Action Group's, Torch & Tinsel Christmas light switch on, which was well supported and a huge success for Dalry and the wider community.

Lochshore Park Development - The Lochshore Park Hub formally opened on the 8th of October and the café is now open daily between 9.30am and 3.30pm. The next access route to be completed will be the 5km leisure route, the construction of which is well underway and will be completed by January 2023. Woodland planting and a play area at the hub are also due to be completed early 2023.

Several weekly activities are underway including:

- Friends of Lochshore group on Wednesdays between 10am and 2pm
- Arts and crafts group on Fridays from 10.30am and 12pm
- Health walk on Fridays from 1pm to 2pm

Garnock Valley Once Loved Uniform Centre - To date, the Once Loved Uniform Centre has been successful in establishing a centre within the Kilbirnie Youth Project. This has been decorated by the members of the Youth Forum and funded through PB, which the group applied for. It was initially stocked with a small number of donations and new stock donated by Tesco, Kilbirnie. The centre has gone on to set up a social media presence and engage with members of the community. This has resulted in a steady stream of donations of new and second-hand clothing items. Initially uptake of the items was slow however, over the summer of 2022, the centre was taken out into the community in the form of pop-up shops at the Holiday Meals programme venues and at the locality led fun days. This saw a massive uptake in items being received and circulated within the community. Following on from this, the Youth Forum then engaged with the Young Peoples Support Team and took a pop-up shop to their fun night event in September. This again allowed the centre to reach those families most in need of items. Another pop-up shop was then taken to the Kilbirnie Library event in October as part of the 'Talking Mince' event.

The Youth Forum have also looked at expanding the selection of items they provide within the centre and how this can be accessed more easily by the community. This has led to the group applying for PB funding to set up a takeaway trolley, with personal hygiene items such as deodorant and shampoo within Garnock Academy. A successful open evening took place on 9 November as part of National Youth Work Week, which was attended by Elected Members, who showed a keen interest in the work being done. Items will continue to be taken out as a pop-up shop to local events over the coming months, including the three winter fun events taking place in January. They are also in the process of looking at gifting washing machines to each community centre in the locality, for use by the local community. The group also received donation of school uniforms via the Community Benefits Wishlist.

Festive Book Appeal – Kilbirnie Library would like to say a great big thank you to all who donated to their Book Gifting Appeal. They got a great response and appreciated all the donations they received.

Our Community Space – Due to the success of the pilot, 'Our Community Space' has been extended and will continue to run once a week in Beith, Kilbirnie and Dalry on a rotational basis. This is a collaboration between the Community Development Locality Team, HSCP and Turning Point, as well as regular visits from a number of support services.

Winter Fun Events – Three winter fun events are planned to take place in January 2023 in Kilbirnie, Dalry and Beith. These events are focussed on helping vulnerable people and families through a difficult winter, especially given the Cost-of-Living Crisis and will offer free food and provide access to support services. These events will be completely free to attend and will take place: Bridgend Centre, Kilbirnie on Saturday 14th January 11am to 3pm, Dalry Primary School on Saturday 21st January 1pm – 4pm and Beith Community Centre on Saturday 28th January 11am to 3pm.

Winter Parklives – 'Parklives' restarted in Dalry Primary School on 11th November. The partnership between Dalry Community Sports Club, the Locality Team and KA

Leisure and will offer food and activities for young people in the area every Friday evening. 42 young people attended the first week.

Café Solace - Café Solace continues to be very busy on Friday evenings with the number of customers attending now between 60-70 per week. At present they have been able to keep the cost at £2.50 for a 3-course meal, with children under 12 eating for free. This is being kept under review to ensure sustainability. Their Christmas Dinner events will be held on 9th and 16th December. Over the last quarter they supported the Carving Event in Beith, who provided a generous donation, with which they were able to purchase a rice cooker for use at café. They also received another donation from the Co-op Community Fund, which will be used to supplement café expenses.

With NAC Community Investment Fund and National Lottery funding, they have now appointed a Food Development Worker for a 3-year period. The successful applicant, Iain Campbell, has been a volunteer chef at Café Solace for the past 5 years and will take up post on 1st December 2022. Iain will work closely with the Wee School Pantry and other agencies and partners to identify means of supporting members of the community experiencing food poverty.

Youth Participatory Budgeting – 201 applications for Youth PB were received across NA, with 24 being received from the Garnock Valley. Voting will close on 1 December.

Knox the Fox – The Stoneyholm Mill Trust's book, Knox the Urban Fox, is on sale at Beith, Dalry and Kilbirnie libraries for £6.99 until the 17/12. This is a beautifully illustrated picture book featuring Kilbirnie's building and landmarks with tales of our fictional fox. It can also be purchased online.

Kilbirnie & Glengarnock Community Council - On Friday 7 October, the Community Council led a commemorative service to mark the centenary of the unveiling of the Kilbirnie War Memorial and the Dedication of Kilbirnie Public Park. They were supported by members of the Royal British Legion Scotland's Saltcoats, Ardrossan and Stevenston branch. Thanks to Rev Fiona Ross, Major Matthew Bennet, Father Mark Kelly and Mr Archie Currie for leading us through the religious observance at the service. A ribbon was cut by our Provost and she was supported by pupils from St Bridget's Primary School and Moorpark Primary School. Thanks to ClIr Donald L Reid for the photographs on the day. The bugle was played by Hugh Brennan. Hugh's father was the bugler at the ceremony to add the WWII names to the memorial. Thanks to the police for stopping traffic during the minute's silence. They were further supported by the local Councillors, the local MP and local MSP.

GVLP Working Groups – The Locality Community Development Worker has developed and circulated a feedback form to all the current and previous members of the three working groups. This is to pull together feedback on the progress and to ensure the groups are still meeting needs and are fit for purpose. The form will gather this feedback and the suggestions will shape the working groups for the future.

Sustainable Transport Survey - The Moving Around working group has been working with Planning Aid Scotland (PAS), as part of the Sustaining Choices Programme. In addition to widely sharing the survey, and working with colleagues across CLD, the questionnaire was advertised within the New Scots community to increase community engagement. Working together, they conducted two focus groups with New Scots, to gather views on sustainable travel. Further collaboration with CLD colleagues to encourage and support the attendance of New Scots at a community feedback event. The November Moving Around meeting was combined with the PAS community feedback event. All the people that left their contact details as part of the MS form were invited. A total of 23 people attended this meeting including 10 new community members, that had not previously attended the working group. 6 New Scots also attended the event and were supported with translation and interpretation language support. After the feedback event, one new person is interested in joining the Moving Around working group and attending the next meeting.

Once Loved Bikes - Recently, NAC funded a group from the Men's Shed Dalry, to undertake the Velotech Bronze Bike Maintenance Course. This has enabled them to put their new-found skills and knowledge to the test on a bike recycling initiative, to service and repair second-hand bikes and donate them to people in need in the GV Locality. A video of the initiative was highlighted as part of Challenge Poverty Week. To date, 21 bikes have been donated from the community, upcycled and distributed to back out into the community.

Radio City Association – RCA have placed a cycle repair stand at Beith Community Centre. This is the first cycling repair stand within the Garnock Valley giving people access to a range of tools to maintain their bike. They aim to improve cycling locally and by providing a cycle repair stand in each town within the Garnock Valley, will ensure there are tools readily available for everyone to use, thanks to support from Cycling Scotland.

On 10 December, the club are heading for the Gaiety, Ayr to see an afternoon performance of the Pantomime, Sleeping Beauty. Afterwards they will have high tea at the Abbotsford Hotel, Ayr. Santa will visit providing a gift for all before they return home. Overall, the club is in good heart, albeit our membership is mainly in the 70+ age bracket, with only a few younger members.

Voice for Older People – A mapping exercise of current support for older people in the locality was recently completed. Next steps are taking place in relation to older people's voices being heard through a participation and engagement structure, which would link localities in to a North Ayrshire wide platform. 18 people from Garnock Valley took part in the consultation.

Talking Mince - The first 'Talking Mince' session since the pandemic took place at Kilbirnie Library on Saturday 22nd October. This was co-designed with Mhairi Cook from the Library Service and the Locality Team and based on the theme 'Canny Cook?', aiming to raise awareness in the community of the groups and services available locally who can support them with access to food and other services during a challenging winter. The following organisations/services were present on the day:

- NHS Community Dietetics
- The Wee School Pantry
- Café Solace
- Garnock Valley Swap Shop
- Dalry Men's Shed
- Money Matters

While attendance was lower than hoped for, the groups fed back that it was a useful networking opportunity for them. The Men's Shed were able to give away a bike on the day, the Swap Shop distributed some clothes and shoes, and the Income Advisor from Money Matters was able to spend over an hour with a single client, which enabled a fantastic level of support.

New Scots – Garnock Valley Allotments plots for Spikewheat New Scots groups have been secured and memberships completed. Garnock ladies' group had good attendance over summer and support workers are currently working with the group to develop a fresh approach to get more people involved. 7 New Scots in the Garnock Valley are now attending West of Scotland college for full-time ESOL learning.

Read, Write, Count gifting, Families Connect, Young Stem Leader Award, S1 Subject Tasters, Wellness Wednesday, Family STEM and Family Reading Group.

The Ayrshire Community Trust – TACT continues to support the Community and Voluntary Sector with a range of services.

• TACT Staff have been organising and facilitating quarterly 'networking' Forums for all 3rd Sector groups and organisations that wish to attend. The team have adapted the programme to a hybrid setting, offering a variety of short fun and interactive zoom sessions covering topics such as, Personal Skills and Strength's, Comfort Zones, Goal Setting and Cooking on a Budget. The project is involved at the Eglinton Community Garden, supporting volunteers to develop and enhance their skills in horticulture.  Organisational Support – continuing to work with groups and organisations delivering relevant training including Governance, Basic Bookkeeping, Constitution & Charity Registration, Funding, and Volunteer Management.

• Community Wealth Building: - North Ayrshire is the first Community Wealth Building (CWB) Council in Scotland – this is fantastic news and something very positive for North Ayrshire. As the Third Sector Interface, TACT sits at the Community Wealth Commission. This commission supports the implementation of the CWB Strategy and will encourage involvement from local businesses, government agencies and local organisations on CWB initiatives.

• Virtual Reality Taster Sessions - TACT Digital have been delivering taster sessions to a wide range of organisations and groups including Autism Support Ayrshire, YES (Your Entire Self), CAMEO Group (LinkUp Saltcoats) and SENSE Scotland. They have future bookings for Chest Heart & Stroke Scotland, No-one Dies Alone Ayrshire and Ayrshire Cancer Support. These taster sessions are aimed at organisations interested in trying out Virtual Reality as an aid to promote mental health and wellbeing for their service users and/or staff. Developing our Engagement Approach

North Ayrshire HSCP has many areas of strength in relation to engagement and participation. However, it has many areas where improvement can be made.

In 2023, we will implement a new approach to locality engagement, aiming to increase levels of participation from communities and representation from HSCP service areas.

Why change our approach?

- The current guidance for locality engagement has not been reviewed since 2015.
- LPFs have experienced many challenges including difficulties in recruiting to core member roles, undertaking effective engagement with communities, and forums being unclear how their activity leads to overall change in the HSCP.
- LPFs have never fully been considered as a resource for Community Engagement by HSCP services.



What does it look like?

Locality Conversations Frequency: 2 per year in each locality

These will be larger stakeholder events and will be facilitated in **community settings** in each locality in North Ayrshire. Staff members from across services in the Partnership, Council, NHS, 3rd and Independent Sector will be encouraged to attend alongside the community members in each locality.

The events will be facilitated by the Partnership Engagement Officer team with staff teams being encouraged to help share possible topic discussions based on what is going on in services at that time. These events will be structured but relaxed to enable people to have conversations, ask questions and share ideas around health and social care services in their locality.

Locality Planning Review Groups Frequency: 2 per year between Locality Conversations

The purpose of the review groups is to explore the themes and ideas shared from the Locality Conversation events. The role of the review group will be to scrutinise the available information and provide updates, feedback and recommendations through the Partnership's governance structures at Strategic Planning Group, PSMT and IJB. Each Locality Planning Review Group will have a nominated Chair who will have the responsibility of providing feedback on the Locality Conversations and take forward any actions to relevant services.

The membership of the Locality Planning Review Groups will consist of:

Chairperson (IJB member)

 Senior Manager from Partnership Services
 Locality Officer from Connected Communities

 Community Link Worker
 Practice Manager
 Representative from the Partnership Performance Team
 Representative from the Strategic Planning Team
 Other relevant officers, co-opted on an ad-hoc basis based on expertise to subject matter.

Engagement Structure

Locality Engagement: Locality Conversations

Facilitating sessions with the community who live and work in the locality about health and social care.

Strategic Engagement: Locality Planning Review Groups

Strategic review groups responsible for scrutinising the information from the Locality Conversations and reporting through HSCP governance structures.

Digital Engagement: Care Improvement Network

A platform for people to engage digitally with the HSCP via newsletters, online meetings etc

The chair of the Locality Planning Review Groups will be a representative at the Locality Partnership Meetings
