5.	Mental Health and Wellbeing for Young People	
<b>o</b> .	The Partnership received a verbal update from the Youth Participation Officer on Mental Health and Wellbeing for Young People and the Project Delivery Officer, which linked in with the Locality Partnership's priority of Enhancing Our Mental Health and Wellbeing.	
	The update provided information on various strands of work, including:	

- mapping of mental health and wellbeing services for young people;
- a proposed mural project to allow young people to express themselves and including QR codes linking to support;
- the planned launch of an equalities programme to support LBGT+ young people and the recent LGBT Silver Charter Mark submission;
- work on becoming a 'My Bank' pilot to promote financial literacy;
- the ongoing refresh of the Mental Health Toolkit;
- joint work on the 'green agenda' and climate change;
- delivery of the 'Your Resilience' and the 'Take Time' initiatives;
- the Mental Health Ambassador programme; and
- work with partners, including Ayrshire College

#### 6. Youth and Education Overview

The Partnership received a verbal update from Christina Pieraccini on Youth and Education Overview.

The update provided information on a number of matters, including:-

- a successful and well attended bridging the gap initiative that took place at Garnock Campus for Primary 7 pupils into S1;
- highlighting the 3 transition groups running in Beith, Kilbirnie and Dalry, the youth forum, the LGBT group and the partnership with Dalry Comm Sports Club and KA Leisure at Parklives, where approximately 80 young people per week were attending;
- the meeting that took place on 27<sup>th</sup> February 2023 where all 3 working groups were brought together and where it was decided to trial one working group, with project subgroups, for a period of time; and
- the good work that was continuing to be undertaken in the Garnock Valley locality with regard to youth engagement and linkages into education in order to foster and bring forward personal development opportunities for young people.

### 7. Police Scotland – Wellbeing and Partnerships

The Partnership received a verbal update from Police Scotland on the key impact of wellbeing and partnership work being carried out by Police Scotland in Irvine.

The update highlighted areas including the following: -

- recent changes in personnel;
- the Scottish Police Authority 'Police Confidence' survey work;
- the provision of community safety packs for residents;

- ongoing shadowing work with the Council's Environmental Health officers;
- involvement in the Ukrainian and Syrian Refugee programme;
- · a forthcoming Jobs Fair; and
- work with the Council's Trading Standards service on issues around the sale of 'vaping' products.

#### The Partnership discussed:

- concerns around access to vaping products by children and young people and difficulties in tackling this given current legislation;
- the limited powers that Police had in relation to seizure of prohibited items, and the wider powers that Trading Standards officers had under current legislation; and
- the lack of Police attendance at some Community Council meetings in the locality and any reasons for this.
