Spotlight on: Dalry Community Garden

Dalry Community Development Hub started work on a new community garden in April 2021, and since the first volunteers arrived, there's been a remarkable change on the previously derelict site. Sensory raised beds for groups with additional support needs have been installed; craft groups meet to share learning; older people who have been isolated for the last 18 months pop in for a tea and a chat; and children are able to get hands on experience of growing and cooking with fresh fruit and veg.

However, the garden surface was covered in a layer of chippings, making the the space inaccessible for wheelchair users and people with limited mobility.

The garden volunteers submitted a wish to the Wish List in September 2021, asking for help to source paving slabs for the garden paths. McLaughlin & Harvey and DAMM Environmental co-delivered the new garden surface, with McLaughlin & Harvey providing the materials, and staff from DAMM providing the labour in the garden.

The work was completed over 4 days in November 2021, and there is now a network of paths crossing the entire site, which will allow more people than ever before to make the most of this fantastic community resource.

Yvonne Gilfillan, Community Liaison from McLaughlin & Harvey said: "McLaughlin & Harvey were delighted to collaborate with North Ayrshire Council and DAMM Environmental to provide an allaccessible path within Dalry Community Garden: a holistic and eco-friendly space, operated by volunteers and open for use by everyone in the Dalry community."

Christmas Wishes!

It's that time of year again, and our Third Sector and communities are looking for some support to make their Christmas dreams come true: could you be the people to make it happen? If the answer is yes, contact us at communitybenefits@north-ayrshire.gov.uk to discuss the next steps.

- **Corsehill Retirement Club**: looking for financial support to take their 24 members for their annual day out, the first since the pandemic began

- Scottish Pony Partners: looking for advice from relevant trades in order to make repairs to their portacabin classroom, which has been badly weather damaged and cannot be used during the winter
- **Cranberry's Community Larder**: accepting donations of long-life food (particularly tinned and dry goods like beans, pasta, soup, tea and coffee) to support their successful dignified food project for local people during the winter period



Mentors wanted to support young people in North Ayrshire

MCR Pathways is a national, award-winning mentoring programme dedicated to addressing the inequality in education outcomes, career opportunities and life chances for young people in care and those experiencing disadvantage in North Ayrshire.

At the core of the MCR Pathways programme is 1:1 relationship based mentoring. Volunteer mentors spend one hour a week listening to and encouraging their young person. The only qualification you need to be a mentor is the desire to help and be there. Our mentors help the young person they are matched with, to realise their full potential and be empowered with the confidence and belief to make it happen. Mentoring takes place in school and volunteers are asked to commit for at least one year, ideally more. The relationship that develops is what makes the difference.
