

#### Spotlight on: Dem-Master Demolition Ltd



Dem-Master Demolition Ltd were appointed by North Ayrshire Council to manage the demolition of Irvine's 'high flats' in Fullarton Street. The 5 high rise blocks were built in the 1960s and have formed part of Irvine's skyline ever since. The project is not only significant as a piece of urban regeneration and the creation of new, ultra modern housing, but is highly emotive for local people and their memories of the community in the tower blocks.

Dem-Masters began to liaise with the Council early in the project around the associated community benefits, as it was important for there to be visible and impactful community benefits generated as a result of this project.

A range of projects and interventions have been delivered as a result of the contract, and in particular there has been close working with the local primary school, Loudoun Montgomery and its Parent Council. Laura Kelly from Dem-Master explained "We selected Loudoun Montgomery Primary School as our key focus as the school is adjacent to our project, therefore, we felt that giving something back to the school was important." In addition to the donation of 150 hi-viz vests for the pupils at the school, Dem-Masters supported the creation of a community garden, which the Parent Council had been planning and fundraising hard to bring to life.





Steel benches were donated, along with £1000 to the Parent Council to enable them to purchase the items needed to create a sensory garden. Dem-Masters also provided 2 days of voluntary staff time (with equipment) to progress the groundworks needed for the sensory garden, which significantly advanced the project. A representative from the Parent Council said "The project had been in the planning and fundraising for over 3 years and even with a team of volunteers we would never have made the progress we have without Dem-Master's help. They were friendly, helped with their expertise and managed to do an immense amount of work on the garden, digging areas, helping load sand, bark and gravel, digging up turf and laying it to create designated areas...We cannot thank Dem-Master enough to achieve something in 2 days which would've taken us months and months. The children were so delighted to see if when they came back after Easter holidays."

In addition to the work at Loudoun Montgomery, Dem-Master also employed a total of nine local people as part of the contract, of whom one was previously long-term unemployed and 8 had previously been on zero hours contracts. 4 new apprentices were also recruited onto the project, with two undertaking a SAP 2 Demolition/Asbestos qualification and one working on SAP 2 Demolition. In addition, the contract enabled Dem-Master to offer 8 operatives upskilling training. The nine new employees recruited locally will be retained once the contract at Fullarton Street is completed, which is a fantastic result for the new staff, one of whom said "I'm grateful for the opportunity of a job close to home".



Laura sums it up by reflecting that "we appreciate that the demolition works at Fullarton Street come with an emotional tie to many people in the area, however we are delighted to have been able to contribute and add value to the local community and we hope to have left a positive impression. We respect our surroundings and endeavour to do the best we can to contribute locally."

#### **Spotlight on: jmarchitects**



Ardrossan Campus is a multimillion pound project that provides a new community campus in Ardrossan on the site of a former Shell plant. The project will merge the current Winton Primary School, and Ardrossan Academy along with a new library, leisure facility, public cafe and space for local authority offices and facilities.

jmarchitects were appointed by the Council to develop the plans for the site, and as part of their community benefits, committed to delivering support to a local project via the Community Benefits Wish List. A match was made with the Scottish Centre for Personal Safety (SCPS), who were looking for advice and support to progress a project at their site in Ardrossan. SCPS offer empowering and holistic personal safety training, particularly to groups who may be vulnerable when out alone. The charity has been keen to develop a community wellbeing cafe space where a disused lean-to was present on their site, but needed significant specialist advice and support to get the plans off the page and moving in reality. Getting the architectural plans to a level where they could be submitted for planning permission (and the corresponding plans from a structural engineering perspective for a building warrant) takes time, and costs "thousands of pounds - which for a small charity that offers its services free of charge to vulnerable people, is a huge amount that we simply didn't have", says Alan Bell, Executive Manager of SCPS.

The two organisations began working together in April 2022, with jmarchitects making several site visits and discussions with SCPS and their partners to understand the scope of the project. Over the course of a year, jmarchitects worked on the design for the cafe, eventually gaining planning permission in February 2023. They also brought in Blyth & Blyth, engineers on the campus, to offer support and advice to get the plans through the building warrant stages of sign off, which the plans passed in April 2023 - a year after the support began.

Alan is delighted with the outcome of submitting the request to the wish list, saying that "the whole way we felt supported and the team at jmarchitects were a pleasure to work with...once complete, our cafe will aim at reducing social isolation within our community. We will offer games, quizzes and fun events to help vulnerable people laugh, make friends and integrate back into our community again. We will help female survivors of violence, blind people, LGBT+ people, people with addictions and the many Syrian, Afghan and Ukranian refugees in our area to feel safe and welcome. It's not just a cafe - it's a refuge where we will focus on bringing a smile to your face and improving your mental wellbeing."

The project has also been enjoyed by the team at jmarchitects, with architect Craig Mathers saying: "Working with Alan Bell and the team at ScotCPS to extend their existing facility over the past year has been a truly humbling experience, and we have been delighted to be able to support the expansion of their much-valued work for the community of Ardrossan and North Ayrshire through the Community Benefits programme. We have no doubt that the addition of a community café will provide a safe space for ScotCPS to extend their fantastic work in enabling all people to be able to live their lives with independence and without fear of physical harm, regardless of age, race, disability, sexuality, or gender."

SCPS are now beginning the fundraising journey towards the £80,000 needed to build the cafe. If you have a contract with us and would like to continue the community benefits support started off so brilliantly by jmarchitects, in addition to financial donations, any offers to builders, plumbers, electricians, and other installation specialists will be welcomed by the organisation.
