Island. The Team are also looking at broadening the scope of the service, to look at how cars can be utilised at weekends for wellbeing activities.  A Dobson commented that this project is a great way to develop locality transport solutions and that it would be useful to map solutions around on Island transport. A Dobson also commented that in terms of using transport for young people, there are assets on the Island that could be used to transport young people around the Island. S Foster advised that funding has been earmarked to support transporting young people on the Island to activities.  A Sutton highlighted that she would be keen to discuss this matter further to look at possible options.  Island Skills Report - S Baird advised that there is no identified funding through the Council to facilitate a Skills Co-ordinator for the Island, however she has approached Scottish Government to see if there is funding available through the Strategic Objective Fund for Skills and Education as well as looking at the Shared Prosperity Fund in the next financial year. S Baird commented that this work is very much a priority for the Island Plan.  A Dobson highlighted that he is meeting with the Council's Senior Manager (Employability) and will be raising having a focus on developing locality skills for people and not just for sectors.  The Chair asked A Dobson to feedback the outcome of this discussion to S Baird.  A Sutton highlighted that there is CIF Funding available if we are looking at match funding or part of a consortium of funding to support this work and would solidify the Partnerships commitment to this work.  3. Education Overview  S Foster and Q Black provided the Locality Partnership with an overview on the work taking place in the schools across the Island:  • Residential this year will be held at Arran Outdoor Centre as it
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Residential this year will be held at Arran Outdoor Centre as it
previously had very high satisfaction rates from young people, parents and staff.
Number and literacy strategies have been looked at allow a more consistent joined up approach.
<ul> <li>Island approach for Health and Wellbeing education – there is an ambitious plan that will be ready by August 2024.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Island Plan strategic objectives – working with partners to support a number of entrepreneurial initiatives within schools. The Root and Shoots horticulture initiative has launched. This is running alongside the Coastal Café initiative and will be introducing an SQA qualification in Barista.</li> </ul>
The Youth and Philanthropy initiative – Second year students are provided £3k to give to local charity work. They work together to agree a charity and then present to a panel. The winners get to give money to their charity.

Music School recently won the Endeavour award. Two primary schools on the achieved the John Muir award for **Noted** some of their pupils and it is hoped this will be consistent across all the primary schools on the island. N Tomkinson shared contact details of the NHS contact for Health Improvement Officers for Sexual Health as well as a link to a new mental Noted health & wellbeing guide which was designed and created by local primary school children using their own thoughts and ideas. A Dobson highlighted that via the food and drink workstream of Ayrshire Regional Partnership, it was raised that there is an increasing number of young carers and wondered if an initiative for Ayrshire could be that young people are able to make a pot of soup before leaving school. A Sutton Noted commented that it may be good to look at the work of fairer food network and how this could link in with A Dobson's suggestion. The Chair thanked S Foster and Q Black for their update. Island Plan 4. The Leads for each of the Island Plan priorities provided the Locality Partnership with an update on each of their workstreams: **Environment** S Ross-Gill advised the Locality Partnership that there have been four meetings of the Environment group have taken place so far. The group are having regular meeting due to the range of environmental organisations on the Island and to ensure as many people are involved as possible. The meetings have been useful and can see where the commonality is across the Island. Lots of practices are already in place through the different groups for actions around land management and land use. S Ross-Gill commented that it there is clear interlinking between the three stands of the Islands Plan. The Group are currently compiling the points of discussion and how to constitute these at a local level. The group are also looking at how to respond to the National Island Plan consultation and encouraging organisations to respond also. The next meeting will be held on Tuesday 3 October at Heather Lodge at Noted 1pm and is open to all to attend. Community S Gilmore advised the Locality Partnership that two meetings of the Community group have taken place. There was a meeting of the group held on 20 September with 26 attendees. There was a lot of good discussion, the general feedback is that there is lot of people on the Island that don't understand the Island Plan and how they can have an input,

	there is a need to get clear communications out there. There was also a lot of discussion around transport, ferries, housing, reappointment of buildings and access to health services in the community. Overall, it was a very interesting meeting and highlighted that a lot of the actions in the Islands Plan are more aims and some actions need to be drawn out as some are quite vague particularly round arts and culture.

	Arran Community Council Community Fund	
	B Calderwood provided the Locality Partnership with an update on the Arran Community Council Community Fund. B Calderwood advised that the scheme was established in 2022 following several years negotiations and provides annual funding for the period of the windfarm operations. The initial estimates projected over 25 years providing a minimum of £625,000 to the Arran community. Grant payments are index linked and paid in May of each year.	
	Applications are considered on a regular basis and Arran Community Council Subgroup review all applications and independently score them against established criteria and these scores are then combined to generate a weighted average score. To date they have held three reviews covering 13 programmes totalling £55,000 and have approved funding for seven projects including the Mountain Bike club, Village memories event, Parent association gardening, Chess, Brass Band equipment and providing additional features for a well-used meeting venue.	
	All applications are requested to identify longer term sustainability and it is not expected that the same projects will be approved for repetitive funding applications.
