Communities & Housing, Finance and Legal Services have been consulted, and their comments are as follows:

Finance: Backup for quotes have been provided. Bank statements and OSCR accounts have been provided.

There is £3,437 available for disbursement within the Kilwinning Trust Fund – sufficient funds are available to disburse the amount requested in the application (£1,606.82).

Legal: The funds held in this Trust are primarily for Purpose A, with a small amount held for Purpose C. The Trustees may award grants for Purpose B if more applications have been made for that purpose and the Trustees consider granting funds for that purpose will most effectively relieve need amongst the persons who have applied for or are eligible for financial support.

1. Overview of relevant activity linking to the Locality Priorities, Wellbeing and Partnership Working since the last meeting.

HFSV's - Since the last meeting Scottish Fire and Rescue Service (SFRS) continues to provide the people of the Kilwinning with fire safety advice within their own homes. SFRS has conducted 26 Home Fire Safety Visits throughout the locality. Off these 26 visits, 26.92% of these visits were to the most vulnerable in our community and were deemed high risk. Being High risk means that we will reconnect with the occupant in a years' time and offer to re-visit and provide further advice if required. SFRS receives visits requests from different ways. We receive these direct from the occupant but often we get visits as a result of an operational incident within the property or at a neighbouring home and through our Post Domestic Incident Response (PDIR) Procedure we provide safety advice and can provide smoke detection if required. Since the previous meeting, we conducted 29 PDIR's within the Kilwinning area. A lot of our referrals are due to our continuous work with partners, and we receive referrals from many different partners including NHS Falls Teams, HSCP North Ayrshire and Hospital discharge referrals.

SFRS Launching New Service for Partners – A new service was launched in February 2025 whereby partners referring individuals for a HFSV will now do so using the new online portal. SFRS have written to all Public Sector Chief Executives and Third Sector organisations advising of this. SFRS is committed to protecting personal data in accordance with legislation and therefore can no longer receive referrals submitted via email unless by secure email (Egress). More information can be found on the SFRS website or by contacting local CAT.

AP1's - Over the last few months SFRS have made 6 AP1 referrals to social work partners for people who live within Kilwinning. These AP1's can come direct from our operational crews, after encountering an individual whom it is felt that are Adults at Risk of harm or in Need of Support, at operational incidents or from community engagement such as a HFSV.

SFRS Educational Syllabus - Has been issued to all schools via email with a 'Syllabus' attached which details the seasonal inputs that SFRS deliver, set periods that each input will be available for delivery by one of our team/crews, the targeted age/year group, and the proposed method of delivery (class/assembly). Topics range from Water Safety, Road Safety, Fire Safety, Bonfire/Fireworks Safety, Deliberate Fire Setting and Anti-Social Behaviour.

Safety Talks - Appliance visited Hayocks Nursery for Fire Safety talk and walk around Fire appliance.

Harper house from Saltcoats that is a drug rehab centre for families, brought a group of children with them to visit the station, received a tour of the station and provided fire safety advise.

St Lukes PS, Primary 1 fire safety talk and tour of appliance. Focus on water safety and other roles we undertake for 'People who help us' topic.

Family Visit to station, Shown around appliance, Wildfire Unit and equipment. Discussed fire safety within the home and new smoke alarm legislation. Crews took time to promote winter safety and advice for discarding smoking materials. This highlights that this is a community fire station, and families and groups are welcome. Nursery talk to Blacklands nursey and school nursery and primary 1/2/3 fire safety talk and look around the station and fire appliance.

Fire Skills – On the 11th February saw the completion of our Community Leadership Fire Skills course for pupils at Garnock CC. This was an excellent afternoon as the students demonstrated some of their newfound skills, hose running, BA RTC and CPR to parents/guardians and to some of our senior management team from the Fire service in Ayrshire, alongside colleagues from the school. All attending where suitably impressed by the quality shown by all the young people and the transformation in their confidence from the first day,

All the young people were presented with two certificates, one a British Heart Foundation CPR certificate and one a Fire Skills participation certificate.

The greatest success is that some of these young people have now found a direction in their future with a couple indicating the desire to join our YVS at Kilwinning and a young person deciding to apply for the emergency services courses at the local college in Kilwinning.

Young Volunteer Scheme – The YVS at Kilwinning CFS is still recruiting new young people.

The YVS aims to provide a safe, welcoming and enjoyable environment for you people to learn. They do this as individuals and develop positive relationships as they work together.

Our volunteers promote safer communities, while developing skills for life, learning and work. We promote fairness and equality through active participation and engagement opportunities. All the while, gaining a unique insight into life at a working fire station.

The YVS is not about recruiting future firefighters. We can't guarantee further employment on involvement in the Service to members. We can guarantee an offer of as much support and guidance as possible to member with an interest in the Service.

The scheme enhances confidence and inter-personal skills and provides a sense of belonging. As they volunteer, we equip them to become young ambassadors for the SFRS, and role models in their community.

The 2 larders in Kilwinning continue to provide a service in the locality. NAC Funding that was in place for larders for 3 years is due to come to an end. The next Larder Network meeting will be looking at what funding they can apply for.

Corsehill Community Association were successful in their national lottery application, and have been awarded £20,000 towards the upgrade their kitchen. This will open up more opportunities for the use of the hall, with a commercial kitchen.







Alleviating Poverty and Promoting Equality of Access to Opportunities

- Multiply project have been working 1:1 with individuals, based on their needs. One of the individuals, after receiving some numeracy support, was also referred on to the EQUAL partnership to help her with job applications and work experience to help her secure employment.
- Community Worker has been looking at the possibility of a 'Kilwinning Services Project'. She has spoken to different community partners, as well as internal partner, police Scotland and CHAP. The idea is the hub would be a one stop shop for people who need support with anything from money advice, to housing advice, to help looking for employment etc. Scoping work is continuing and an update will be given when things start moving.
- Corsehill Community Association continue to work away at making the hall more accessible to all in the community. They are providing a range of free events/groups and are planning on more moving forward. They started a Parent and Toddlers Group on 28th January, which now runs every Tuesday and Friday (1pm-3pm) with 25 children currently attending. Attendees pay a nominal fee of £3 that covers the cost of food, and also a contribution towards a trip in the summer. The Christmas Fayre attracted around 235 local residents. 3 breakfast with Santa sessions were held which allowed 150 kids to attend. Feedback was very positive from both the Fayre, and the breakfast with Santa. The Community Association also got funding for the installation of a screen and projector in the main hall. T
- Kilwinning Community Shed have been given temporary use of the of the former job centre situated in the main street. The power has been re-connected, and appropriate building and public liability insurances has being sourced. The group are currently working on upgrading the building, and developing a workshop space for the purpose of the shed starting. They members meeting every Wednesday and Saturday morning for the purpose of cleaning/decorating the space.
- Locality staff are looking at a youth equalities group which will bring Young People with protected characteristics together to discuss/tackle issues relevant to them.

Supporting Skills and Work Opportunities 6





83 young people have involved in Cyber Activities. 27 have been participating in Cyber Explorers, a digital connectivity programme. The programme helps young people develop essential skills for future careers in cyber security. The programme consists of various challenges and missions, and upon completion, participants earn an accredited SQA award at SCQF Levels 4 and

Multiply project currently supporting 9 individuals on a 1:1 basis on their numeracy/literacy skills. The project also facilitates 3 groups in Kilwinning.



Supporting Skills and Work Opportunities

- Maths drop in group has three consistent learners. Work has been done with them to make progress in their learning targets since March on a weekly basis. They all have different goals within their learning and for different reasons.
- Kilwinning Community Shed have been meeting fortnightly in Kilwinning library but now meet in the community shed, in order to discuss establishing the group into a functioning committee and organisation. They have now been granted charitable status after being supported through the SCIO process. They have also drafted a membership code of conduct, which includes group appropriate WhatsApp protocols, that is being used by the committee.
- 4 groups in Kilwinning are currently being supported through the Community Asset Transfer process. All are at different stages. 2 are working on/have submitted their Expression of Interest Forms and 2 have been invited to full application stage.
- A lottery funding workshop for community groups, was held in Kilwinning library on Wednesday 4th December. The session was delivered by Alexandra Krause (national Lottery). The session was attended by 10 community reps. Rosemary Ramsay (NAC) was also available to give advice/support to groups, and some of the groups have signed up to the NAC Funding information email.
- A beginner Guide to Comedy Writing started on Thursday 6th
 February with 7 learners attending. The course looks at all aspects
 of comedy writing. Learners will work towards a performance of
 some form of writing that can be developed. Due to members other
 commitments the group has been postponed and will restart after
 Easter.
- Some Young People in Kilwinning have expressed an interest in being part of a Youth Forum so this is something locality staff are looking at.

19 pupils from Blacklands PS, and 28 from Abbey Primary have been working on the Bounce Back Your Resilience programme. This is aimed at P6 and P7 pupils. The topics covered in these sessions are:

1: What is Mental Health

2: Resilience

3: Social Network

4: Friendships

5: Making Decisions

6: Self Care/Certificates





Choose Kilwinning committee successfully held their Christmas light switch on event for Kilwinning on Saturday 30th November. The event was attended by 2700 residents. The event included, shows, attractions, santa, market stall, and entertainment. Verbal feedback on the day was very positive.



Take time Families continues to run with a new family joining the group who has integrated well. They were successful in gaining PB money and this will be used for families to access resources, bringing in external services that may charge a fee.

The group also hope to attend a trip in the Summer but maybe focus on more local areas to keep costs down.







Improving Community Wellbeing

- Kilwinning Transition Group runs in Kilwinning Academy every week. All cluster school P7s were invited to attend. At present Martyn from Active Schools coming along with his coaches for 6 weeks for the first 45 mins of the group. For the remaining 45 mins the group then focussing on their support networks and how to utilise this with the changes young people are facing going into the academy.
- Stroll with it Kilwinning has 5 new members bringing the group back up to 11. Dynamics in the group are good and they are doing their walk every week.
- CLD Celebration event will be held on Thurs 27th March in Ardrossan Civic Centre. This will be to celebrate the work/achievements of groups that are supported by the CLD dept. It will be an annual event moving forward, in line with our CLD strategic plan.
- HIVE: Your Resilience Your is a UK-wide programme which supports young people's mental health resilience. Delivered in a range of settings, Your Resilience equips young people with the tools and knowledge to maintain their mental health through life's transitions, both now and in the future. 15 Young People received certificates for this through Ayrshire College.
- There have been 4 referrals made from Kilwinning hub based in Kilwinning Library. These included food parcels, referrals to Megan's Space and Family Wellbeing.

- Kilwinning Litter Pickers and other community groups continue to carry out community litter picks.
- Streetscene are looking for community groups/individuals to identify areas and plant a tree.
- Eglinton Growers are Continuing to receive support from the Locality Team through sourcing and forwarding relevant grant opportunities to assist with the development of their wellbeing garden, and site upgrades. Locality staff also attends regular monthly meetings and has been providing advise and suggestions on plot holders guidelines.
- The Eglinton Growers committee held their AGM on Sunday 3rd November 2024 which was attended by 35 members.
- The allotment have had issues regarding trees damaged on the line between the allotment and the road. Locality team liaised with Streetscene to have the damaged trees removed.

Case Study : Choose Kilwinning

The group have collectively come together, for a sole vision to save the organisation, and ensure the Christmas lights switch on goes ahead. From the onset the group have formed into office bearers roles and have had a clear commitment to succeed. Meeting regularly, the group have been proactive in delegating tasks, and ensuring appropriate targets have been met. Throughout the process, the group have also maintained a strong community involvement, and kept the public and community partners informed, which has created a collective support. The group have also been proactive in organising sustainable fundraising, through various events and initiatives.







Due to the success of the group, it has given the group a sense of confidence in running future events successfully. This success also highlights the significance of community collaboration and proactive fundraising in overcoming financial challenges and enhancing local community events.

Case Study: Kilwinning Intervention 13

In this case study, the focus is on a group of S2 students at Kilwinning Academy who have been disengaged with school and face challenges related to literacy skills and additional support needs (ASN). The goal was to create a safe space for these students, engage them in future aspirations, and address their unique needs. Initially, the group struggled with settling in due to various issues, making it difficult to move forward despite several consultations with the young people.





The program helped the young people become more engaged and confident. They have started participating more in activities, showing progress in their work, and felt more comfortable expressing themselves. This approach has also helped us as facilitators evaluate the level of support these young people need in terms of literacy and I will continue to work on this and for support from the school partnership. Ensuring we are giving the young people specific support enabling them to thrive. By focusing on their strengths, interests, and future goals, they have become more motivated and connected to their learning. Overall, it created a positive change in their attitude toward school and personal growth.
