	C Pieraccini acknowledged the two years of work involved and commended the community organisations for their contributions, attending meetings, discussing the plan, and shaping the consultation process.	Noted

5.	Community Transport D Hilditch attended the meeting to discuss Community Transport and highlighted that the Council issued a response to SPT Regional Bus Strategy Consultation. C Pieraccini advised that the working group also submitted a response to the Consultation.	
	 Improving public transport in Garnock Valley is a priority, focusing on better linking towns and improving access to rail, education, and hospital services, which remain challenging Current bus services, especially in the evenings, are inadequate and while a full solution may be costly and not immediate community transport has helped fill gaps elsewhere 	

	 D Hilditch highlighted that a £200,000 grant has been allocated for Garnock Valley and North Coast to improve bus stop signage and make minor route enhancements. Partnership members were invited to share suggestions SPT are exploring franchise models for bus services C Pieraccini is keen to engage with the Johnston Bus Company to explore their business model N Wright noted that these issues link closely to the responses to Local Place Plan, and how this would be a key resource for ongoing transport and connectivity information. A Morrell highlighted that Coalfields has prepared proposal that has been sent to Chief Officers within the Council.
