### 3. Community Investment Fund Update- Largs SWI

Sharon Murdoch and Susan Sheperd gave an overview of the impact the CIF had on this project including:

- The group have had a successful year with 45 paid members of the WI as well as pay as you go regular attenders totalling around 20
- Meetings are the first Wednesday each month with around 35 attendees each time.
- Variety of events and activities within the monthly calendar.
- Social media- great support received and presence is high on both Facebook pages with over 350 followers on the public page.
- Events are collaborative within local community including food bank and Men's Shed. Detailed overview of local events was provided.
- Want women to feel comfortable and safe in the area. Long lasting friendships are being made.
- Had a presentation from Ocean Youth Trust around the work of the organisation.
- Men's Shed are coming to do a session on DIY and there will also be crochet lessons in the future.
- Wood working classes are also taking place in partnership with the Men' Shed.
- Feedback for the classes has been very positive with no negative feedback received.
- Funding allowed purchase of 6 sewing machines and an overlocker and the sewing club has 147 members as well as unregistered members.
- 74 women have taken beginners courses and there have been several other classes including for alterations. There have been 23 weekly classes so far with ages ranging from 20 to 80.
- Another open day will be held on a Saturday and there are now 5 regular volunteer to help run the classes.
- Feedback has been 100% positive for this also.
- Largs SWI are holding a wedding dress exhibition on 22 March with 30 dresses dating back to 1953 in partnership with Glasgow Kelvin College.

### Discussion included:

- Cllr Murdoch stated the work taking place has surpassed what
  was expected, especially the partnership working taking place
  and the positive impact on members of the Men's Shed who have
  been working in sessions with the SWI. The Men's Shed members
  have bult accessibility benches and these will be used at future
  sessions.
- Cllr Collier asked if the Men's Shed would also be learning sewing and crochet? Largs SWI confirmed they will.
- B Conner suggested the SWI have reached out to Creative Recycling as they now have a shop open in Stevenston.

The Chair thanked Largs SWI for their presentation.

### **Millport Common Good**

- R Leith provided an overview of the application as per the grant report.
- Question received about whether there was already a notice board at Garrison House, if so would it be better to find a different location. The Chair highlighted it was the community council that ran this notice board.
- The Partnership agreed to approve the application.

Lynne Cathcart, Head Teacher provided the Partnership with an update from the Primary Schools in the North Coast including:

- Largs primary had a successful world of work week with people from across the community speaking about their jobs. They are also creating a poem and p6 performed for Burns night.
- They are also taking part in a rotary quiz and have created a nurture and sensory room within the library.
- An outdoor area is being prepared for outdoor learning
- At St Marys a digital school award has been received to demonstrate commitment to digital learning experience
- Ms Lee introduced children to Chinese culture and Chinese New Year
- St Marys performed for Burns night with Scottish Opera.
- On Cumbrae a Scottish concert was held for Burns night and Cumbrae Burns club donated prizes and trophies.
- Active Schools
- Generation Science are coming to the school at end of term and they will visit Science Centre.
- There will be a screening of The Wild Robot for the school also
- Works with partners in the community has been added to Edu Scotland as good practice
- Rights Respecting Silver Award has also been received
- Largs Academy had pupils at under 18 Scottish Football, Scottish Government and young musician of the year
- Attainment has them as top attaining school in Ayrshire.

Tony Gilhooly provided an update in relation to the work of Active Schools in the North Coast including:

- Virtual Competition Club that was put in place last year which is opened to the whole of North Ayrshire to schools with less than 100. They can compete within their own schools.
- Football Leagues for primary schools to compete at Largs Academy.
- Extra-Curricular Activities- 52 opportunities in Largs Cluster
- International Women's Day/ Fit for Girls
- Largs Academy Sports Council

Brief details of organisation	Community Roots is a registered charity based in West Kilbride, dedicated to improving food security, promoting sustainability, and supporting mental and physical wellbeing in the local community.  Our two main projects are the Village Larder, which provides affordable, nutritious food to around 60 residents per week on average, and the Community Roots Garden, where we grow fruit, vegetables, and herbs using sustainable, pesticide-free methods. The garden offers a therapeutic space for volunteers and visitors to learn, connect, and benefit from the mental health support that comes from gardening and being outdoors.  We are now developing the Garden Haven—a purposebuilt insulated garden room that will allow us to run year-round workshops, wellbeing sessions, and community gatherings, further strengthening our holistic approach to health, food, and community connection.

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#### **Timescale**

Works due to start September 2025 and complete by the end of the year. Stage 1 contract is for main building work costing £59849. 59. We have £50k from The National Lottery Community Fund-Community Led which will cover the majority of the 1st stage. £9849 required by the end of September for 1st stage of work as in contract.

To complete the finishes, create a deck out front and add solar panels we require a further £18879.24 for stage 2. It would be preferable to have this work as a continuation of the 1<sup>st</sup> stage and be completed by Spring 2026. See the quotes for Stage 1 and 2 attached for further detail

We are seeking funding to support the development of the **Garden Haven**—a purpose-built garden room that will bring these two projects together in a year-round, sheltered, and inclusive community space.

### About the Garden Haven

Located in our Main Street garden (with planning permission granted and now in the warrant stage), the Garden Haven will include:

- A small kitchen for preparing meals using produce from the garden and larder as well as warm drinks
- Indoor space for workshops, wellbeing sessions, and small community gatherings
- A warm, accessible environment for those unable to take part in physical gardening

This space is essential for delivering consistent, inclusive support that promotes mental and physical wellbeing all year round.

### Brief Overview of Proposal

### **Funding Need**

We have been granted £50,000 toward the main structure from the National Lottery Community Fund (NLCF). As their capital ceiling is £50,000, we are seeking an additional £9,000 to complete Stage 1 of the build, covering essential construction including plumbing, internal finishes, and cladding. Their grant also covers 3 years of freelance Gardening Assistant and Coordinator fees for the supporting community work that we do in the garden and will do when we expand into the Garden Haven.

We are also seeking support for Stage 2 of the project, which will cost £18,879.24. This stage includes solar panels, final interior and exterior finishes, fencing, and landscaping to make the Garden Haven fully functional, energy-efficient, and welcoming for all.

We are fundraising through the Easy Fundraising platform and will apply to WK Community Trust, May Lockhart Trust and are seeking other funding, however, thes are smaller funding pots and we have to raise for the day to day running of the garden and larder also.

### **Community Benefit**

The Garden Haven will:

- Unify our food and wellbeing work into one flexible, purpose-built, light and cosy space
- Increase inclusivity, offering access for older adults, disabled individuals, and those experiencing isolation. (Access to the garden is on a sloped path, but the outdoor sheltered seated area and indoor space will give us a place for people to enjoy the garden and socialise whilst seated.) Our garden currently has around 1/3 neurodiverse volunteers and around half of our volunteers experience anxiety in other social spaces. 1 person who comes along has seizures when in LED lit areas so we are ensuring that alternative lighting is available and the large bifold glass doors will bring lots of daylight into the space.

- Support mental health through regular stress management and complementary therapy sessions, delivered by our in-house therapist and Complementary Therapy students.
- Enable year-round activity, including workshops on gardening, sustainability, cooking, and herbal therapies.
- We have strong partnerships with Age Well which we supported in getting
  off the ground, and has a wellbeing focus for older people in West Kilbride,
  West Kilbride Community Initiative, both the Parish Church and St Bride's
  Church, as well as contacts in the Ayrshire College Complementary Therapy
  department who are keen to partner with us for work experience whilst
  offering therapies for free to the community.
- We are frequently visited by members in the community passing by and currently cannot extend hospitality to them other than a chat whilst standing.

#### Conclusion

The Garden Haven is a key development for Community Roots, strengthening our impact and enabling us to support the West Kilbride community in more meaningful and consistent ways. There is no community space like it in West Kilbride with this holistic focus and in the garden setting. Since the pandemic we have prided ourselves on working with the community and other organisations and agencies to pioneer projects that fit the community's needs. With your support, we can complete this vital space and create a lasting legacy of resilience, connection, and wellbeing.

Brief details of organisation	Cycling Without Age Scotland (CWAS) is endorsed and supported by the Scottish Government. It operates across Scotland through a network of some 90 Chapters (Branches) of volunteers. It exists to provide tricycle rides to people with mobility issues (aged, infirm & dementia) but will take anyone who would benefit from being outdoors and having some social interaction, including people who are just lonely.		
	The rides are free and provided by volunteer pilots (cyclists) who typically take one passenger and their carer (professional or family)		
	This Expression of Interest is being submitted by the Largs Chapter. CWAS Head Office holds our funds in their bank account and provides our strategic guidance, insurance and maintenance support.

### **Brief Overview of Proposal**

We are seeking funding to purchase a second Trishaw. We opened for business in March 2024 and since then have provided 'jaunts' for some 205 Passengers (not counting their carers). In April of this year our client base expanded to cover autistic children and blind adults, and we aspire to offer it to young adults with learning difficulties.

We have 10 very active and enthusiastic pilots with another 5 on the 'waiting list' pending the second Trishaw. Our existing storage shed (in the Vikingar Carpark) can accommodate the second Trishaw.

We intend to provide street lighting to the Glen so our community can access the facilities safely Apart from the obvious long term safety benefits street lighting will bring it will also facilitate use of the pavilion at night. The pavilion is currently under utilised due to unsafe access at night. Other venues have to be found to hold the meetings required by all the various football groups and Tennis club. Although the area around the pavilion is lit the access from Orchard St is unlit.

There are currently 18 football teams within west Kilbride most of which train and play outside the village due to lack of facilities. There are proposals to improve the facilities within the glen to make the glen available for all clubs in West Kilbride. These proposals include an all-weather, flood lit pitch, which can be used both day and night. Without street lighting on the access road these facilities will be underused

Sustainability speaks for itself as we are proposing solar lighting. We have consulted with a company named "Prolectric" who have recently supply solar street lights in Stornoway. These lights will be set a low-level Illumination until activated by pedestrians to give full illumination. The lights will also be timed to suit the hours of usage of the sports facilities.

Maintenance is fairly limited as the LED units have a lifespan of at least 20 years with the batteries having a life span of 20 years. Regular maintenance is limited to 6 yearly testing and possible cleaning every 6 years.

Our partners include WKCC, WK Community Sports Club, WK Tennis club, WK Amateurs, WK Colts, WK Deltas, WK Mini Kickers, WK Girls, Boys Brigade and Life boys, WK environmental group, WK Civic trust,



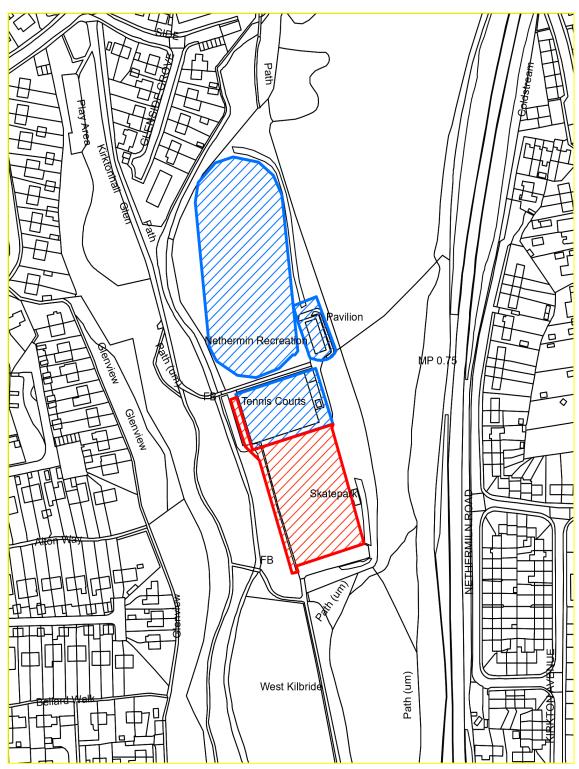

At present all girls teams and younger kids teams travel out with the village to access safe training areas. Other measurable outcomes will be the use of the Pavillion at night. Many groups /teams have suggested they would use the pavilion for meetings instead of using "What's App"

The future developments in the Glan {see figure 1} will be dependent on providing safe access at night. This will allow teams to train in winter afternoons and have tactic sessions after games. Some teams video games and would use the facilities at night to discuss the game.

The fact that women and children can not safely access these facilities at night would be addressed by this project. Also one section of the tennis area was earmarked for Netball, however this was never taken due the unsafe access at night. This would go a long way to reducing inequality, increasing social inclusion and improving mental wellbeing.

Please note the chairs of all groups associated with the glen have written to all our local councillors to ask for their support in this project. All councillors have pledged their support.

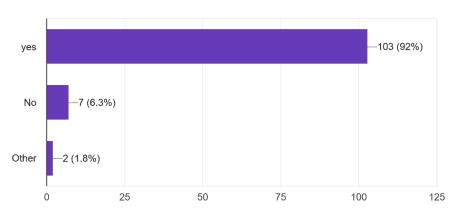

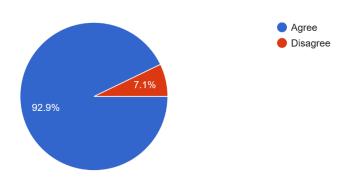

We will revisit all tenderers once we have definitive dates for funding and decide which ones to interview at the appropriate time. A tender report will be issued to all our trustees and community councillors with a recommendation. Once the contractor is selected, we will engage them to carry out the works within an agreed timescale and to an agreed specification.

As the works will be completed in less than 2 weeks we envisage one single payment albeit we would hold back 2.5% retention for a mutually agreed period of time. Depending on the funding source and conditions we would be more than happy for the funders to pay the contractor directly on completion of the works, alternatively if funding is deposited in our account, we would organise payment direct. Payment would only be made when the works were 100% complete and fully demonstrated with all guarantees in place.

We have electrical engineers within our volunteer group and their expertise would be utilised to inspect and report on the works.



There would be no direct staff involved although the companies we have contacted to date have all proposed to use local labour.

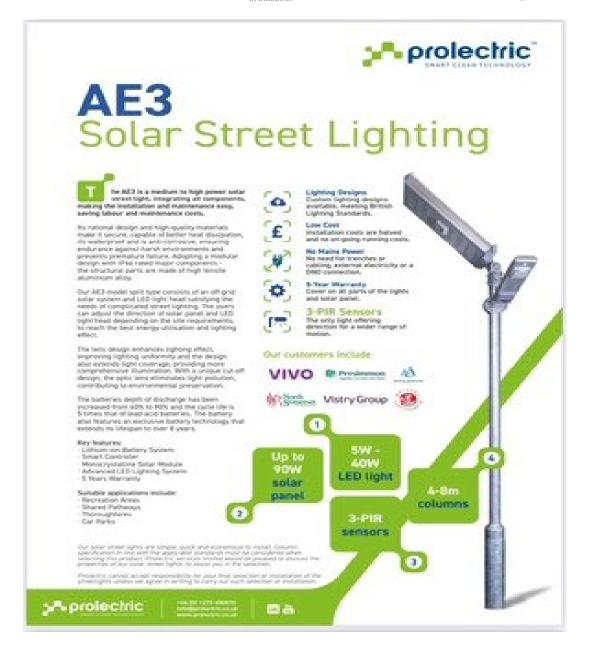

## **Supporting Skills and Work Opportunities**

- Largs Community Development Trust have made steady progress in establishing its main project Your Space, located in Boyd Street Largs. Contact has been made via TACT with North Ayrshire College regarding training for volunteers. ScotWest credit union will provide training to the volunteers to enable them to fully run the credit union. This will include the IT software and legislation / regulations around money laundering etc. Lomond Radio station and Irvine Beat broadcasters will deliver training for the running of the Radio station, This will include the IT software and legislation / regulations set out by OFCOM. Discussions are in progress with the Head teacher at Largs Academy to enable their pupils to be full participants in the running and broadcasting of the Radio station. A volunteer mentoring service is being established within the Radio station where experienced broadcasters and radio producers will mentor inexperienced volunteers.
- North Coast Youth Forum worked with the Helter Skelter Trustees, and Barry Wilson from Largs Academy to shortlist youth funding applications. 8 groups were funded to the sum of £46,000. There will be another round of funding applications around October.
- An introduction to cooking course is planned to take place over the summer in West Kilbride Community Centre. Not only will this look at cooking skills, it will also look at cooking on a budget, and healthy eating.
- Community Benefit Wish List Donation of laptop to 25 Group Royal Observer Corps Association from Re-Tek. and £100 donation to West Kilbride Civic Centre for planters from Carruthers.
- As part of the Community Climate Action Plans, there will be 3 x Climate Workshops for the Skelmorlie community to improve/increase Carbon Literacy and identify climate actions that support the 4 Local Priorities. Also looking to work with a second group from the NC&C Locality.

# **Increasing Social Inclusion**

- The third Promise Conference in North Ayrshire was held in December 2024, collaboratively organized with the Care Experienced Young People from local secondary schools and the Corporate Parenting Team. The event featured an activity day at the Ardeer Community Centre, where secondary school students from across North Ayrshire participated. The day commenced with an icebreaker session to facilitate introductions among the attendees. Following this, Clare Morris from The Promise Scotland provided an overview of the promise, along with information about the various groups operating within their schools.
- Our MSYPs (Member of Scottish Youth Parliament) continue to be the representative voice for young people in the Three Towns locality and have been working to gather their views for the Scottish Youth Parliament Manifesto. We encourage young people to complete this to shape national policy from 2026-2031. Entries can be submitted here: SYP's Manifesto 2026 2031 before 26th April. Furthermore, they are working on their national campaign priorities around access to youth work, mental health and wellbeing and gender-based violence. Within North Coast we have 2 MSYPs that represent the Cunninghame North Constituency Emma Henderson (Arran High) and Rhyan Gorrie (Garnock Campus). Individually Emma Henderson is looking at equitable access to public transport for ASN young people and Rhyan Gorrie is focusing on promotion of foodbanks and larder and encouraging young people to volunteer across these provisions.
- Carried out training with 29 staff from Health & Social Care Partnership on LGBT awareness as part of our commitment to our LGBT Silver Charter Mark, we continue to roll out training to other departments and third sector upskilling staff.
- A language assessment was carried out for a new Ukrainian arrival to the area. The
  learner was subsequently signposted to Ayrshire college which offers formal
  provision at the learner's level, that he is now attending. This *supports* the learner
  in increasing his *skills* with the aim of increasing *work opportunities*. The Language
  Buddy scheme is active in Largs, with 2 volunteers supporting 3 learners with
  tailored English conversation sessions. Both learners and volunteers see their *skills*improved as well as having *increased social inclusion* and *mental wellbeing*.

Subject: Roads, Structures and Street Lighting Maintenance Programme 2025/26

**Purpose:** To advise the Locality Partnership of the Roads, Structures and Street Lighting Maintenance Programme for 2025/26.

#### 1. Introduction

- 1.1 North Ayrshire Council has a statutory obligation under the Roads (Scotland) Act 1984 to manage and maintain its public road network. The adopted road network within North Ayrshire has a total length of 1051km. The core roads assets are currently estimated at a value of approximately £1.7billion.
- 1.2 North Ayrshire Council is responsible for the maintenance of the adopted local road network including lighting and structures assets as well as its other non-adopted road assets. However, the Council has no responsibility for the maintenance of the Trunk Road Network which falls to Transport Scotland and their management contractor, Amey. The Trunk Road network includes the A78, the A737 from Kilwinning to the Renfrewshire Boundary and A738 from the Pennyburn Roundabout to the A737 Dalry Road Kilwinning.

#### 2. Current Position

- 2.1 The Council's Roads Service has adopted an asset management approach to road maintenance to allocate available road maintenance funds to locations that will offer the most beneficial return on the investment.
- 2.2 The Roads Asset Management Plan (RAMP) and the roads assets maintenance strategy follows the recommendations contained within the 'Well Maintained Highway's Code of Practice, ensuring that the Council's statutory obligations as delegated Roads Authority are met.
- 2.3 In complying with the Code of Practice, an effective regime of inspection, assessment and condition recording is well established which assists in not only providing a road network for the future but one that promotes social inclusion and contributes to economic growth within the area. This approach also ensures the Council is providing value for money on any investment attributed to road maintenance.

#### 3. Proposals

3.1 North Ayrshire Council's roads are the Council's largest community asset and play a vital role in supporting the local and wider economy by facilitating the

- movement of people, goods and services and connecting people with economic and social opportunities.
- 3.2 The proposed Roads, Structures and Street Lighting Maintenance Programme for 2025/26 has been developed in accordance with the strategy contained within the Roads Asset Management Plan (RAMP) to deliver the maximum return on investment and ensures the provision of an effective road network throughout North Ayrshire.
- 3.3 Road Condition is measured nationally through the Scottish Road Maintenance Condition Survey (SRMCS). The measure in place, the Road Condition Index (RCI), records the percentage of the Council's roads which should be considered for maintenance. North Ayrshire's RCI has been improving in recent years and although it saw a decline to 34.8% (published 2023 figure) it has improved again to 32.5% (published 2024 figure).
- 3.4 The estimated carriageway maintenance backlog figure for North Ayrshire is currently £38.5 million. The 'steady state' figure for maintaining our roads at present condition is £5.5m per year. The capital budget supported by revenue funding is £4.3m for 2025/26. At the Council's budget setting meeting on 26 February 2025 a further £1m was allocated to road maintenance providing a budget this year of £5.3m.
- 3.5 Road lighting condition is measured through programmes of structural and electrical assessment and testing and is complemented through the ongoing review of age profile and material type life expectancy. The results are categorised and recorded in the lighting asset management database to inform a prioritised list of replacement schemes. Lighting is allocated an annual Capital budget of £1m to address a 'steady state' position of maintaining our lighting at present annualised depreciation rate.
- 3.6 Bridge and retaining wall condition is also evaluated through a robust inspection programme. General inspections are undertaken every 2 years, while an indepth 'principal inspection' is carried out every 6 years and the results of the inspections are used to inform work programmes. The results of the inspections are input into a Structures database which is then used to calculate an average Bridge Structure Condition Index (BSClav) based on the total number of assets. The BSClav is currently 83.11 (2023/24 figure) which is within the 'good' classification of 80 to 90. The allocated capital budget of £560,000 is supported by a small carryover from 2023/24 giving a total of £675,000.
- 3.7 Details of how condition assessments are carried out and how roads, structures and lighting locations are prioritised for inclusion in our maintenance programme are provided in Appendix 2. The assessment matrix used for scoring and ranking structures for inclusion in the Structures Maintenance Programme is attached in Appendix 3.

#### 4. Conclusion

- 4.1 The Roads Maintenance Programme 2025/26, which was approved by North Ayrshire Council's Cabinet on 18 March 2025, is attached in Appendix 1a and 1b. The Programme is based on approved Revenue and Capital budgets including additional £1m which will be funded from approved capital infrastructure investment.
- 4.2 Details of how condition assessments are carried out and how roads, structures and lighting locations are prioritised for inclusion in our Maintenance Programme are provided at Appendix 2.
- 4.3 The assessment matrix used for scoring and ranking structures for inclusion in the Structures Maintenance Programme is attached in Appendix 3.

#### 5. Recommendation

- 5.1 That the Locality Planning Partnership notes the approach taken to determining the Roads, Structures and Street Lighting Maintenance Programme.
- 5.2 That Locality Planning Partnership notes the Roads, Structures and Street Lighting Programme for 2025/26, as shown at Appendix 1a and 1b.

#### **Condition Assessment and Prioritisation Process**

- 1.1 The Audit Scotland Follow-up report, Maintaining Scotlands Roads published in August 2016 stated that Councils should use their RAMPs to establish long term investment plans for maintaining the road network taking into acount whole-life costing and treatment options.
- 1.2 As part of the Roads Asset Management process, annual condition assessments are carried out on the public road network as part of the inspection regime. All locations are assessed using a risk based approach.
- 1.3 Condition assessments are carried out simultaneously with the Safety Inspections in accordance with the pre-determined timescales contained within our Safety Inspection Manual. All faults noted during these inspections are logged within our electronic Routine Maintenance System (RMS).
- 1.4 For carriageways, to take account of whole-life and different treatment options the carriageway maintenance programme is developed using road asset management principles. Lifecycle planning is at the core of this approach and takes into account, hierarchies, condition and local community priorities. Preventative treatments are used to prolong the life of carriageway surfaces before their condition deteriorates and requires extensive resurfacing.
- 1.5 The main factors considered are:-
  - Road Condition based on detailed visual inspection and the Scottish Road Maintenance Conditions Survey (SRMCS).
  - Road Hierarchy this takes account of the strategic importance of the road and is determined from our Local Transport Plan.
  - Assistance to Council and Community Priorities this takes account of other priorities such as economic development, access to shops, amenity housing or schools.
- 1.6 Carriageways and footways are both condition assessed and scored in accordance with the assessment table below. These condition scores, RCI data, road hierarchy information and priorities information as above are utilised through our electronic WDM Scheme Manager to target locations for improvement works in order to optimise investment.

Each location is also reviewed at least once a year depending on its location within the Roads Hierarchy as part of the routine inspection process.

- 1.7 There are various types of surfacing materials and processes available depending on the particular road type, location and level of existing deterioration. Options available for treatment include preventative measures such as surface dressing and resurfacing options such as screeding, resurfacing (inlay and overlay), depending on the severity of deterioration full reconstruction may be the most effective option.
- 1.8 The level of investment associated with the varying treatment types identified in the table below was established using the Society of Chief Officers of Transportation in Scotland's cost projection model, developed as part of the Roads Asset Management Planning project. The model assists with identifying the effect of various treatments on the on-going condition of the carriageway. This enables a more accurate design life for the treatments currently available to be developed and ensuring value for money on their use. Costs for works can vary from the figures below depending on restricted working arrangements, traffic management required and the extent of preparatory works necessary to enable resurfacing. There is also an additional uplift for island working of up to 50% for works on Arran and Cumbrae.

- 1.9 Street Lighting column replacement is prioritised through non-destructive strength testing to determine the level of deterioration associated with the columns. Following testing, columns are categorised within the Asset Management database for road lighting.
- 1.10 Testing is carried out in accordance with the Institute of Lighting Engineer's Technical Report No.22 Managing a Vital Asset: Lighting Supports as well as UK Lighting Board Code of Practice: Well-lit Highways.
- 1.11 Once results are input, the database then compares these results against the more general age profile to determine a final list of priority repairs. This produces recommendations in order of priority for both individual units and whole streets or areas.
- 1.12 Recommendations are generally categorised as Category A through K as follows:
  - A: Immediate replacement
  - B: Replace urgently or reinspect within 6 months
  - C1: Column Material failure, replace as soon as possible or reinspect within 1 year
  - C2: Bracket failure, sleeve where possible or replace unit within 1 year
  - D: Foundation failure, realign, reinstate and reinspect within 6 months
  - E: Material approaching failure, replace as part of planned maintenance programme or reinspect within 2 years
  - F: Material approaching failure, replace as part of planned maintenance programme or reinspect within 5 years

- G: Condition reasonable, but age expired and certified insured for 2 year periods until replaced
- H: Condition reasonable, but age expired and certified insured for 5 year periods until replaced
- I: Acceptable condition but age expired and insured for 5 years periods until replaced.
- J: Sound condition but age expired & visually poor (evidence of concrete cracking etc.)
- K: Sound condition and not age expired no current requirement for strength structural inspection, visual only at planned maintenance cycle.
- 1.13 Where non-urgent replacement recommendations (Category F through to J) are on an individual column basis, the data is further analysed to determine a percentage value for recommended replacement numbers against the balance of units in a street. If this figure exceeds 30% then the entire street will be considered for higher prioritisation which will address the design class standard of the street beyond individual replacement for safety reasons only.
- 1.14 The structures programme is identified based on the structures prioritisation matrix which ranks assets based on a number of factors including its condition, safety, and usage.
