To broaden their impact, the group is seeking funding for an additional trishaw, with delivery expected to take approximately two weeks.

	Expression of Interest - Community Roots	
	The Partnership considered an application from Community Roots who are seeking £28,728.83 funding to support the development of the Garden Haven, a purpose-built insulated garden room that will allow us to run year-round workshops, wellbeing sessions, and community gatherings, further strengthening our holistic approach to health, food, and community connection.	
	The group provided an overview of the project which aims to create a shelter which uses sustainable energy at the garden. 100 people are currently registered with the larder on the premises. Several groups have also expressed an interest in using the garden and the group wishes to	

provide workshops and training but this is not possible due to the lack of shelter or amenities. The group have already been successful in securing £50,000 for the project and CIF would fund stage 2.

#### **Discussion**

The Locality Partnership inquired about the security measures planned for the site. In response, the group explained that secure locks will be installed, the tool area will be positioned behind the building, and the container is designed to be vandal-proof. Additionally, the group plans to reinforce gate security and is exploring the purchase of cameras for the site.

The group highlighted they would be happy to work in partnership with the Police Community Safety Officer on this. L Riddex will make this connection.

#### Friends of Kirktonhall Glen - Full Application

The Partnership considered an an application from Friends of Kirktonhall Glen who are seeking £50,000 of funding for the installation of solar powered and motion activated street lighting. The group highlighted that the lighting is essential for users to access safely the Tennis courts, activities in the pavilion and football training.

The group advised that they have been looking for further funding but have not been successful in securing this.

#### **Discussion**

- The Partnership voiced support for the project so far.
- The group highlighted that they have been offered support with the project from the Council.
- The Partnership asked about the robustness for the lights, which are purely solar, and how they can be powered in West Kilbride despite the tree canopy. The group highlighted this will be possible and are robust, they are used on the Scottish Islands.

The Locality Partnership agreed to support this application with 50% being funded through the CIF and the other 50% funded from other sources for example the CREGF or Communities and Place Fund.

The park is intended to provide safe space for children to play.

Park equipment will be procured and built on the land. The equipment will aim to provide activities for children ages 1 to young teenagers. Accessibility is important to the community and the selection of equipment will seek to accommodate a wide range of abilities, and diversity. The space will house a variety of play equipment for climbing, balancing, motor skill and flexibility development as well as space for plants to be grown and nurtured.

Seating will be provided to provide space for parents and carers to sit and watch the children.

Children will be encouraged to be responsible for the park by keeping it tidy and making sure it is safe by reporting any issues that would affect the safety of children using the park, helping keep the park clean and tidy and participating in painting or growing activities to maintain the park.

Adults will be responsible for making sure that the park is maintained and a safe, warm, welcoming space for the community and the children. A plan to involve the community in managing this will be formed.

#### 2. Brief description of your organisation

Cycling Without Age Scotland (CWAS) is endorsed and supported by the Scottish Government. It operates across Scotland through a network of some 90 Chapters (Branches) of volunteers. It exists to provide tricycle rides to people with mobility issues (aged, infirm & dementia) but is open to anyone who would benefit from being outdoors and having some social interaction, including people who are just lonely.

The rides are free and provided by volunteer pilots (cyclists) who typically take one passenger and their carer (professional or family)

This application to the Community Investment Fund is being submitted by the Largs Chapter. CWAS Head Office holds our funds in their bank account and provides our strategic guidance, insurance and maintenance support.

Cycling Without Age Scotland is a registered SCIO - SC048128 Its aims and objectives are to enhance the mental and physical wellbeing of older and infirm members of our communities. This is delivered through providing accompanied tricycle outings (jaunts) enabling those who might benefit from the service to 'get outdoors' and engage with others.

#### Project Title: Acquisition of a Second Trishaw

We are seeking funding to purchase a second Trishaw. We opened for business in March 2024 and since then have provided 'jaunts' for some 371 Passengers to the end of July. This figure does not include their carers; who also benefit. In April of this year our client base expanded to cover autistic children and blind adults, and we aspire to offer it to young adults with learning difficulties.

We have 10 very active and enthusiastic pilots with another 8 on the 'waiting list' pending the arrival of the second Trishaw. Our existing storage shed (in the Vikingar Carpark) can accommodate the second Trishaw.

We will continue to provide our service exclusively on the Largs Promenade and occasionally at the Largs Early Years Centre.

Our target community beneficiaries is unchanged; we will just be able to increase our volume.

We have no 'partner' organisations, and have no requirement.

It is our intention to double the number of 'jaunts' we provide and thus deliver the social and mental wellbeing benefits of our activities to even more people in and around Largs.

We are currently, and will remain, open to providing our service to ALL who may benefit from it.

#### 5. What engagement has taken place in relation to the project?

Our primary source of passengers are:

- a) <u>Individual Bookings</u>: In the main these are from friends and family of passengers who may benefit from our service. As such there is no mechanism for consulting with them. However, we are convinced there is a huge latent demand and with judicious promotional effort (especial two Trishaws going along the Promenade most days) we will attract them. We have had much anecdotal support.
- b) <u>Care Home Bookings</u>: We have consulted with the three care homes along the front. (Haylie House is to far up the busy Irvine Road and falls into the category of Individual Bookings)

Hutton Park (36 residents) and Burnlea (32 residents) are highly complementary of the service we provide and the benefits we deliver, and will continue to use us and grow the number of outings as and when possible. We talked with the Activity Managers in both organisations. Their limiting factor is having the staff to accompany their residents.

The new Bay Court Care Home (80 resident capacity) are very well aware of the service we provide and indeed have had three outings with us to date while they only have 5 residents. Natalie Lochhead (Care Home Manager) and Paula Bell (Activity Manager - who has been out on the Trishaw) have indicated there enthusiastic support for the engagement we provide for their future residents.

"As a pilot, I see first hand how the trishaw basically generates happiness - in its passengers, in passers-by and in those of us doing the pedalling. It lifts the spirits of our clients, who might be feeling isolated by mobility issues or dementia:, it supports and cheers the carer or family member who joins them; even the folk we pass on the prom can't help but smile or wave and some will even flag us down for a quick chat. And we pilots get a huge boost to our own mental wellbeing from all of this and from the camaraderie of the other volunteers."

#### OBSERVATIONS BY HUTTON PARK CARE HOME

Carla Silveira Activity Lead Hutton Park Care Home, LARGS 14th July 2025

The Trishaw is one of our resident's favourite activities, they just love it, they talk about it all morning when they know they are going out on it, a second one would be fantastic, more residents can get to go out. You only need to look at the smiles on their faces to see how much this means to them

Our Regional Director was visiting the other week and this is what she sent out to all the care homes in her region during Glad to Care Week:

We have a resident who is living with advanced dementia, and who experiences high levels of stress and distress. The team are always trying new ways to support the resident and despite many failed attempts, they finally managed to cajole her into going for an outing along the beachfront on a Trishaw. I heard her screams of delight as they pulled away, and the smile I saw on her face when she returned was truly memorable.

When you're supported by amazing people, you can still have the time of your life in a Care Home.



Plus some comments from Families:

Rona, both her parents are with us: To see the look on my mum and dads faces as they both get to go for a ride along the prom together is just the tonic we need as a family, the volunteers running the Trishaw's are just amazing, Thank you so much

Rosemary: I honestly can't remember when I seen mum this happy, she just loves her outings on the Trishaw, I think if she could she would just go back and forth all day, such wonderful volunteers that runs these.

Gorgia: You just have to look at the faces of the residents when they are out on these, my stepdad is a resident in the care home and he hails from Glasgow, the fact that he gets to go out a couple of days along the seafront is so important to him, he just loves it so thank you so much.

We deem 10 to be the optimum number of pilots to ensure a bank of willing and enthusiastic volunteer cyclist. If there were too many their outings would be infrequent and they may lose motivation. If there were too few then they would be very busy and become disenchanted. Without carrying out any promotional activity we have grown the 'reserve' pilot-in-waiting list to 8.

The training of the existing 8 reserves has commenced with the first two training session booked - 27th August for the first two Pilots and 8th September for the second pair. With a fair wind behind PVG checks they could be active in late September.

Upon announcement of the success of the Funding Application we will seek to grow the pool of volunteers.

The project will double the number of volunteering opportunities from 10 to 20.


All of our bookings are recorded on our TeamUp calendar as and when they are made. We then use this to track our number of successful 'jaunts' delivered, and indeed those cancelled due to weather etc. For example from when we started providing our service in March 2024 (with only two pilots) until the Expression of Interest was submitted in April 2025 we took out 205 passengers (not counting their carers who would themselves derive emotional and mental benefit).

In the year August 2024 to July 2025 we have provided some 364 passenger 'jaunts'.

Our target number for the same period in 2025/26 (August 2025 to July 2026) is 750 passengers. This is based on the availability of the second Trishaw combined with;

- a) The opening of the Bay Court Care Home with space for some 80 residents (more than doubling the seafront capacity of Hutton Park and Burnlea combined)
- b) The growing trend of increase in the number of individually booked jaunts as a result of our continually increasing profile in the community.






## Regeneration and Increasing Civic Pride

- CLD Have had 4 PB launch events to date for the next round of PB funding. Only 1 person turned up in Millport and 7 people attended Skelmorlie with 3 new groups that have never applied before attending which is encouraging. 2 attended WK and 2 in Largs.
- NEC were invited to attend summer program events to help under 22s with free travel passes.
- Cost-of-living events took place in Skelmorlie,
  West Kilbride and Largs. Uptake was very poor
  which was disappointing. Although not well
  attended those who did benefited from
  information received to support them



- Skelmorlie youth group has an average of 16 young people attending each week. Staff are due to speak with primary school to engage with new P7 class. This group is free for young people and allows them to play an active part in planning group activities and take ownership over their group.
- CLD Team ran a cooking group during the holidays. This group consisted of men between the ages of 60-85. All meals were cooked by scratch and the participants were taken through the full process. They were also shown how to batch cook as a few of them lived alone, and this would save waste and time for them.


## Regeneration and Increasing Civic Pride

- 4 events took place over the summer offering free activities for whole families. A total of 667 people attended these events. We had to cancel the 5<sup>∞</sup> event in Fairlie beach due to bad weather which 60 people had signed up for.
- This term West Kilbride Adult Education committee have agreed to run the following free course: Digital Security in the Digital World, Digital Skills for the Over 50's, and British Sign Language taster.
- Largs Food hub have helped a member with a disability by taking his order via a phone call then delivering to him.
- Scotwest credit union is operating from your space. They are currently working on a Christmas campaign to encourage people who want a loan to take it out with the credit union instead of going to payday loans.



- Weekly sessions in secondary schools across
   NA offer a consistent, safe space for around
   60+ care experienced young people to
   connect. Feedback shows the groups improve
   emotional wellbeing, reduce isolation, and
   foster belonging—"I feel like I can open up"
- The staff within the Children & Families Health Team (Health Visitors, School Nurses & Support Team) support children, young people and families with low level mental health support and refer to other services as deemed relevant. Additional advice is also available on the Ayrshire Bairs App (Health Visiting) and SNAP (School Nursing Ayrshire Provision).









# Community Engagement/Participation and Voice

- Supporting Skelmorlie community council to gather community feedback around the lighting in the park. 43 responses so far with a view to build a working group that will focus on the lights and help to lever funding in place.
- Supporting 4 groups through the CIF process.
   1 EOI and 3 Full applications.
- The number of Organisations expressing an interest in using the Your Space facilities continues to increase. Largs Green Futures continue to have open days on a regular basis to encourage participation. LDT membership continues to grow with approximately 65 people having signed up for membership.




### Work and Skills


# Community Engagement/Participation and Voice

- LDT are running a campaign around energy for the entire month of September. It will involve activities in the hub, outreach activities and digital campaigning. Theu are working closely with Citrus energy, and are holding a business breakfast meeting for local business to explore how Citrus energy can help them save on energy costs through a variety of measures. The rest of the month will be focused on residential customers. They want to look at who qualifies for winter fuel payments, and how to claim it. They also want to help people find the cheapest provider and assist them to change supplier. This will be done in partnership with other Organisations.
- NC Youth Forum are looking at working with a growers group to grow food in the school grounds.




### Work and Skills

- Skelmorlie Community council supporting to apply for funding. Was successful with ARIA fund supporting rural communities to access IT equipment. They were successful in funding and were able to get a laptop and printer to support the community council going forward.
- Transferable skills are being learned by young people attending youth groups such as teamwork, leadership, communication problem solving, decision making, confidence, active listening and building relationships these skills are valuable not only in personal life but also in academic settings.
- Largs Food Hub have have had 3 teaching sessions at TACT regarding funding and how to show their effect in the community.

# Community Engagement/Participation and Voice

- Supported Skelmorlie gardening group to get a memorial in place within the village to commemorate the centenary of the Skelmorlie disaster. Very well attended event where family members of those affected were present.
- Members of the NC Youth Forum helped out at the Community Development Teams Summer Programme. This was through peer education/support, and assisting with taking photographs at the events.
- Working in partnership with Education and other council services the UNCRC workplan has started ensuring that we are both compliant and sector leading in our approach to UNCRC incorporation. This includes co design and production of our youth voice structures, training for Elected Members and the development of a mandatory ilearn module on UNCRC. Our Executive Youth Council are nearly at completion of a North Ayrshire Learners Voice Charter supporting the work of pupil voice structures across our schools.

- Tact have an annual training programme
   which is open to groups and organisations
   based in the North Coast & Cumbrae They
   regularly support groups with constitutions,
   policy templates and charity registrations
   amongst other support
- Largs Development Trusts Training for the radio station has commenced. They are working in small groups of 3 or 4 and will deliver basic training over several weeks then move on to more advanced training.
- PDA in Youth Work in Largs Academy have a new Co-hort. 19 young people will start the course when the school returns.
