R Dobson provided the Partnership with an update on the work Active Schools on the Island:	
 Ardrossan Accies delivered rugby taster sessions to all seven island primary schools, culminating in a rugby tournament to encourage inclusive participation and strengthen local rugby links. Lamlash Golf Club hosted the annual Arran High School Golf Competition, bringing together 25 students for a day of friendly competition and community engagement. Six students represented Arran at the North Ayrshire Active Schools Leadership Award Ceremony, with fourteen Arran High students completing the Sports Academy leadership programme. The Young Ambassador group continues to lead and inspire peers across the island. Primary 7 pupils participated in a week-long residential at the Arran Outdoor Education Centre, supporting their transition to high school and focusing on outdoor learning and environmental awareness. The Arran High School Mountain Bike Club offered free bike maintenance and organised trips, including a visit to Fort William and an overnight camping adventure, to promote sustainable transport and outdoor activity.

Subject: HSCP Update

Purpose: To provide an update to the Arran Partnership regarding

ongoing work within the HSCP affecting Arran

1. Introduction

1.1 This paper provides an update from the HSCP regarding developments on Arran.

1.2. Major points of interest include the changes of occupancy to Montrose House, and the delay to develop locality plans.

2. Montrose House

- 2.1 There have been ongoing workforce pressures over many years due to recruitment challenges on the island, and the partnership has dedicated significant time and resources including many innovative ways to try and secure the necessary permanent workforce on the island. These challenges have resulted in the over-reliance on agency staff which is unsustainable from both a financial and a quality of care perspective.
- 2.2 To ensure a safe sustainable model for residential and nursing care on the island going forward, an option appraisal was undertaken and proposal submitted to the Integrated Joint Board on 19th June 2025 to reduce over time its bed complement to 10 permanent beds, 1 respite bed and the development of a new day-care model to ensure the provision of safe, sustainable care with its own permanent staff. The proposed change does not affect current residents and permanent staff within Montrose House. At this meeting in June, there was a request to undertake some additional work around engagement, consultation and impact assessments. This was completed over the summer and a further report submitted to the Integrated Joint Board on 21st August 2025
- 2.3 The equality impact assessment was a thorough review that highlighted that maintaining the quality and continuity of care remains the central priority for Montrose House and that the proposal was in response to the ongoing 30% vacancy rate and current reliance on Agency staff. The HSCP acknowledged the strong opposition from the island community and staff as well as the

financial burden associated with off island placement, it is however imperative that care is delivered safely in line with regulatory standards and within sustainable financial parameters. Montrose House remains a valued part of integrated island services and the HSCP is committed to its future and securing safe permanent staffing levels.

- 2.4 The Island Impact Assessment concluded that the proposed changes represented a necessary response to persistent staffing challenges and financial pressures. The introduction of a hybrid day service model and the reduction in bed capacity aim to enhance service sustainability, safety, and quality of care. While the prioritisation of residents with familial ties and ongoing performance monitoring are positive steps, the potential impact of off-island placements—including emotional distress and increased travel costs—remains a significant concern.
- 2.5 Local engagement included a drop in event and distribution of survey/questionnaires to staff, residents and the wider community. This also included a wide variety of community groups and current service users. Paper copies were also available in GP surgeries and the hospital. The consultation period was extended to encourage greater participation and resulted in 458 community responses and 23 staff responses submitted. There was a comprehensive consultation report published with all forms of feedback included, that highlighted very clear overarching themes throughout with 97% of the community and 61% of staff opposing the proposal. All reports are available for the public to view. This proposal was approved by the Integrated Joint Board on 21st August 2025.
- 2.6 Montrose House ongoing work will be the set up of focus groups to support the development of the new day care model and exploring options to support the admission criteria for Montrose House. There will also be a feasibility group to discuss options for ongoing use of Montrose House to enhance current provision.

3 Further Heath and care developments

- 3.1 The Arran locality team have been asked to showcase a case study with the National Centre for remote and rural healthcare regards accommodation challenges and the purchase of Glenartney Guest House for staff accommodation. This case study will be uploaded to the Turas Platform as an exemplar for innovative practice for other remote and rural island areas.
- 3.2 Arran War Memorial Hospital has now transferred over to the netcall system to progress the single point of contact work. This will streamline phone calls through to the correct department. The team are already seeing promising results with less calls coming through reception, allowing staff to focus on day to day front door processes.

4 HSCP Locality Planning

4.1 A previous paper was brought to the Arran Locality Partnership on 5th December 2024 outlining the plans at that time to carry out HSCP locality

- Planning arrangements, to fulfil the requirements of the Public Bodies (Joint Working) (Scotland) Act 2014.
- 4.2 For Mainland Localities, the process during 2024 included biannual periods of engagement to be carried out each April and September during 2024 and 2025 with different groups. The results of the engagement was then discussed at a Locality Planning Review Group each June and December groups existed for each of the 5 mainland localities and were chaired by the Locality Lead, which was one of the 5 Heads of Service within the HSCP. The original timeline for locality planning was:
 - Locality Conversation April 2024 General public
 - LPRG June 2024– first meeting
 - Locality Conversation September 2024 Equalities/ Existing groups
 - LPRG November 2024 review initial priorities or themes
 - Locality Conversation Spring 2025 Children and Young People
 - LPRG Summer 2025 confirm themes, initial actions identified
 - Locality Conversation Autumn 2025 –
 - LPRG Winter 2025 Draft Plans
- 4.3 This process continued as scheduled until the end of the Children and Young people engagement which took place in April and May 2025. Due to resource changes within the Strategic Planning and Equalities team and other work priorities, the Locality Planning Review Groups scheduled for summer 2025 was postponed and later cancelled, and the Locality Conversations due to take place in Autum 2025 have also been postponed.
- 4.4 For Arran, the intention was to develop a health and social care locality plan for Arran as for the areas to ensure that Arran will still have a published plan with information and intended actions around health and care. This was to be carried out using the existing Locality structure and engagement priorities.
- 4.5 The HSCP Strategic Plan is currently being developed which has meant the team has not been able to continue with the ongoing Locality Planning work, and as such, Locality Plans will not be developed for the end of 2025 as was originally planned.
- 4.6 The Strategic Planning and Equalities team in the HSCP is currently working on developing a new Strategic Plan, Delivery Plan, Performance Framework, and Participation and Engagement strategy for the HSCP, and this work is due to conclude by the end of 2025. Following this, Locality Planning work will be picked up within the HSCP to develop Locality Plans.
- 4.7 The team is currently working with the Community Planning team to discuss better integration between the locality planning processes and reduce

duplication in the mainland localities to something more streamlined as exists in Arran.

5. Conclusion

- 5.1 The Health and Social Care Partnership continues to prioritise engagement with the local community and transparency in its decisionmaking processes.
- 5.2 Further updates will be regularly communicated with the Arran Locality Planning Partnership.
