5.	Police Scotland & Scottish Fire and Rescue – Wellbeing and Partnerships

M Cowan provided the Partnership with an update on the work of Police Scotland:

- The campus officer continues to do excellent work in the school.
   Recently they have been delivering sessions on knife crime.
- The Prevention and Interventions Officer is also very active in schools, especially around vaping education, and works closely with the community team and trading standards. Recent test purchasing in Kilwinning found no issues.
- Regarding parking on Main Street, the team has been actively addressing issues, issuing tickets as needed, with support from parking enforcement officers.
- Looking ahead, it is a priority is to maintain a visible police presence in the area to help strengthen relationships between officers and the community.

D Morrison asked if officers engage with non-attenders or conduct outreach work. M Cowan confirmed that they do, maintaining connections with Children's House through regular visits, and they are willing to attend any groups as needed.

M Cowan advised the Partnership that the team is happy to attend any community events.

The Chair thanked M Cowan for his input.

#### 6. KA Leisure

F Comrie provided the Partnership with an update on the work of KA Leisure in Kilwinning:

- The Activator bus has been providing health checks at Whitehirst Primary, Corsehill Primary, and the Segdoune Gala, with plans to attend some upcoming farmers' markets.
- The WBA initiative in Blacklands is progressing well, with strong involvement from multiple partners.
- The Funday held on 7 June attracted 300 attendees, with the first hour dedicated to ASN participants (10 people attended).
- Another Funday scheduled for 11 July again first hour will be for ASN participants.
- The "Me to You" course involved nine young people, with six attending regularly Graduation is set for this Friday, and future volunteering opportunities are being explored as a result.
- A Funday is also planned for August at Blacklands Primary.
- Weekly free multi-sports sessions are offered at the MUGA on Tuesday nights, though attendance has been low.
- Ayrshire College is working to broaden opportunities for sports students.

G Gallie commended the inclusive approach to the funday, highlighting its accessibility for everyone.

	L Riddex advised the Partnership that a full report was included in the agenda pack issued. L Riddex provided the Partnership with an update:	
	<ul> <li>The second Discovery Award group for those aged 50 and over has started in Kilwinning, following a waiting list. There are now 12 participants in this new group, bringing the total to 27 over-50s involved. A case study is included in the report, and a few members from the first group are now working towards their Silver Award.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Support continues for the community shed, which is exploring an asset transfer. An open day was recently held during Mental Health Week, several new members joined.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>The team's summer programme includes activities at Eglinton Park and Kilwinning Library.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>The CLD team will be at Irvine Beach throughout the summer to conduct youth engagement activities as part of the Safer Shores initiative.</li> </ul>

9.	Review of Locality Planning	
	J McGee advised the Partnership that a report went to the Council's Cabinet in May 2025 on the review of Locality Planning. The recommendations of the report were shaped by the survey responses issued to all Locality Partnership members over summer/autumn 2024, where the majority of respondents were community reps. J McGee also highlighted that there was also an Information Session held late May 2025 where all Locality Partnership Members were invited to attend.	
	J McGee asked the Partnership how they felt about the format and structure of the meeting and what changes to the meeting format, or any other aspects would members like to see going forward.	
	The Partnership discussed:	
	<ul> <li>Reports being submitted in advance.</li> <li>Bringing groups together would help everyone recognise the significant amount of work being done locally.</li> <li>With smaller team, everyone needs to work a bit smarter to allow for more meaningful discussion.</li> <li>Focus on making the most of everyone's time and local knowledge, identifying gaps, and channelling resources effectively.</li> </ul>	
	There is a need to measure impact and value against priorities to assess the difference being made.	

Utilising collective knowledge, a workshop session focused on priorities would allow community representatives to showcase their work. Ongoing evaluation and follow-up is important. There is a lack of HSCP links and presence at meetings. R Leith highlighted the work J Greenlees is doing with HSCP. Main Street is receiving attention, but more community engagement is needed. Police are doing their best, but it remains challenging. There is a need to focus on specific issues and ensure that partners leave with clear action points. A change in format could help increase community engagement and buy-in. How can we reach those who are typically hard to engage, with support from Local Partnership (LP) members What steps can we take to make it easier and more accessible for people to get involved. L Riddex/J Next meeting further discussion in workshops McGee L Riddex highlighted that her vision acts like a golden thread, with subgroups gathering community feedback on issues related to the priorities. This information is then shared through networks and fed into the Local Partnerships. G Gallie highlighted that in another Ayrshire authority, a banking hub hosted Police Scotland and Trading Standards for a day to provide advice on scams. The hub was very busy and served as a central point for the community. The Partnership had strong interest in bringing a similar model to Kilwinning, even monthly and with the involvement of additional organisations. This approach could be an effective way to connect with the community and collect feedback, offering a promising new outreach opportunity. G Gallie agreed to share the regional manager's contact details, who has G Gallie indicated they are open to both individual and organisational involvement P Marshall asked what is happening with the two buildings at Howgate, the former betting shop and police station. Cllr Hume highlighted that she is working with a business to potentially take over one of the units. G Gallie highlighted that in terms of the Police Station this is part of national estates strategy. It is hoped that there will be some movement G Gallie on these offices soon. G Gallie undertook to take back comments back and to ask for an update. R Leith R Leith also undertook to get information on this area and share an update by email.

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This project will be led by Turning Point Scotland in partnership with North Ayrshire ADP, Ayrshire College and the DWP.

The aim of the project is to deliver a college course, with Ayrshire College, for people in recovery from drug or alcohol use.

The course will enable people to develop their personal and employability skills in a supportive environment with the aim of working towards the job market.

We will achieve this by means of creating further education and volunteering opportunities. Further developing our joint working abilities and creating more sustainable ventures in the Kilwinning area for the future

## Brief Overview of Proposal

If successful in gaining funding this will largely be invested in a Peer Lead Practitioner. The core focus of this role will be to provide support to people on the course and to the lecturers from Ayrshire College. Additionally, as part of their role they will be expected to help identify appropriate volunteering opportunities for people in the community and provide support to enable people to sustain both their attendances at college and volunteering placements.

This course is demonstrative of how we can work together to support skills and work opportunities for people. This also goes a long way towards alleviating poverty for individuals and the community as a whole. By undertaking this course, we can take further steps to enhancing our mental health and wellbeing. This can also play a big part in reducing social isolation, increasing social functioning and alleviating loneliness. These factors combined have a very positive impact on individual's health outcomes and increases our community resources and resilience.

This model has already been delivered with a very successful first year in North Ayrshire throughout 2024 by Turning Point Scotland, in partnership with North Ayrshire Alcohol and Drug Partnership, Ayrshire college, DWP, Connected communities and Minds of recovery.

The first year has produced 13 students successfully completing the course and volunteering opportunities. The project has helped address the inequalities gap in provision and access to further education and volunteering opportunities within North Ayrshire. More specifically around employability support for people in recovery, for those who have been involved in the Justice system and experience many barriers to employment and accessing mainstream college courses.

The 13 students have all benefitted greatly from completing this course in terms of their mental health. Many have seen an increase in confidence, selfesteem, self-belief, self-worth, resilience etc. People have also reported a greater sense of purpose and increased feel proud of becoming more valued in their role within the community and indeed becoming a role model for others in similar circumstances.

This programme will support people to obtain an accredited qualification which could lead to further educational opportunities within the college and the community and increase participants readiness for paid employment.

Additionally, the programme would enable people in recovery to provide peer support to one another, develop their skills and knowledge around mental health, wellbeing and resilience, and tackle issues around poverty and access to meaningful opportunities.

If successful, the project will be delivered within the Kilwinning locality in a community setting. It will be made available to people who live in other localities in North Ayrshire to maximise participation although Kilwinning will take priority.

This course is very sustainable and a key part of the previous year's success was the partnership working and services being involved. This supports the

community and brings services together, which in turn supports the people who need us. This has allowed people in recovery from alcohol and or other drugs to have an opportunity to go on and complete further studies within a college environment. This course has broken down barriers for people accessing education that they normally would have felt ostracised. A lot of work with our Peer Lead Practitioner was around breaking this barrier and building on confidence so people could make informed choices.

We aim to have a minimum of 18 people again starting this course with at least 10 people completing the course and carrying out 20 hours of volunteering placements. The optional choice will be provided for those who wish to complete an SVQ 3 in Health and Social Care.

In terms on long term impact this course breaks down stigma for those in recovery wishing to enter into further education and provides a safe space within a college environment in which to do so with Peers. This also benefits services who wish to take on

#### 2. Brief description of your organisation

PRYDE bought an unused public house based in the heart of the community just over 20 years ago and were formed 2 years prior to that operating from Cranberry Moss Community Centre. We are a Scottish not for profit Charity Limited by guarantee. Pennyburn Regeneration and Youth Development Enterprise, in North Ayrshire, combines both the physical and social sides of regeneration, building the capacity of its members to benefit the wider community. A community survey by Pennyburn Community Association indicated a need for a community hub to be established. The main issue that was identified was a lack of services in the area. PRYDE was formed to help meet this demand, guided by the principle that to have responsive and relevant services the community needs to be engaged and where possible have ownership.

The Playz opened to the public in March 2012, the result of impressive partnership work with local agencies and ability to attract funding. The building now functions as a community hub, training centre and events venue, hosting everything from exercise classes, senior citizens activities to music tuition.

Involvement of the community has been integral to the development of the building, and PRYDE has trained local residents in action research to establish community priorities and enable them to contribute to and have a stake in the design and use of the building. PRYDE's Community Connector then responds to these aspirations and works with the members to deliver a programme of learning and events.

We have 2 of the now young adults who began their growth with us as teenagers, undertaking a degree in Community Development at Glasgow University supported by PRYDE. They are supported by the Community Connector who is now in year 3 of the course supported by PRYDE. Many other young participants have developed the confidence to undertake other forms of higher education.

#### Outcome 1

Currently we use music to enhance interests, opportunities and confidence. This project will introduce further music, arts programmes to tackle mental wellbeing and lead to qualifications in music business for those wishing to progress, for others it will become a coping strategy. For others their involvement with the music business may also open opportunities for hands on industry experience, leading to work.

Registered for weekly sessions – 95 young people 39 identify as Female, 54 identify as Male, 2 Identify as Non Binary.

Our last Youth Led Concert – 65 young people attended 29 identify as Female, 34 identify as Male, 2 Identify as Non Binary.



Band factory (in partnership with Beith Trust, over 2 weeks) – **45 young people** *17 identify as Female, 28 identify as Male.* 

In the last 2 years – **12 young people** have been supported to access **music based course** at high education. And **2 in community development course** at university. 6 identify as Female, 6 identify as Male, 2 Identify as Non Binary.

**Outcome 2:** Children and young people mental wellbeing, children self-esteem/worth and the communities self-image.

It was evident that our children are feeling the impact of the poverty in the area, self-esteem, hopes and aspirations from 6-year-old upwards was low. Access to activities including family activities has increased for some through the local schools however not everyone takes part. We have been piloting a drop in for 7-10-year olds where we introduced topics through games, discussions and activities. We want to grow this as we believe that by intervening at this stage can impact on the prevention of later mental wellbeing issues. We also piloted a group for primary 6 & 7 to provide confidence and coping methods through group work and peer support. This was a popular group which supported the primary through their transition to secondary school. We work with schools and parent councils.

**7-10** year olds group – **14** young people registered *9 identify as Female, 5 identify as Male* 

P6/P7 group – 26 young people registered 15 identify as Female, 11 identify as Male

Easter / Summer family activities – 267 children registered 153 identify as Female, 114 identify as Male

**Outcome 3**; Anti-poverty services, provisions, referrals and support.

We provide affordable food and free food where needed. We have contact with many of the support agencies including CHAP, Money Matters, 1<sup>st</sup> Alliance and Citrus Energy as well as the local food larder. The provision we offer is not competing with the food larder as it appears to be different people using the Playz. We have recently set up a digital drop in so that people can learn and access various sites/printing and learn

**Outcome 4:** Intergenerational & family work to assist age groups understand each other's needs and aspirational.

The provision of intergenerational work will pull all of the other outcomes together to ensure that our people and community is more resilient to current and future situations. The value of community and increased self-image will result in more volunteers to take forward some of the services in the future.

Wall Mural intergeneration work – Group consultation sessions: Young People 23, Adults 20 Feedback of first draft week – open to public.

15 young people involved in painting wall mural.

#### **Outcome 5**

Isolation is an issue that older people as experiencing however alongside this we found new people to the area also felt a sense of isolation as well as some of the single parents. It is our desire to provide support groups, activities that include them with the wider community, photography and 'What was/is it like to be growing up in a community such as ours'. We will link with other support and information organisations to meet needs that we are not skilled at.


Our services will be accessible to everyone, the building had disability access and our staff and volunteers are aware of other aspects within the diversity and inclusion agenda. Alongside this the tackling of poverty and other poverty related outcomes. We have recently undertaken training in Neuro diversity to have a greater understanding of how the environment can better support people who are not neurotypical.

 How this proposal fits with the Locality Partnership priorities of 1. Supporting skills and work 2. Improving our local environment 3. Alleviating Poverty and promoting equality of access to opportunities 4. Improving Community Wellbeing.

The PRYDE Community approach has for 20 years, focused on improving the environment, increasing civic pride and community participation and improving access particularly for the whole community, as well as for young people training and learning that builds confidence skill qualifications and self-efficacy in preparedness for work. Where possible the employment of local people will be grown.

Our 3 Year project is designed to help our wider community realise their part in releasing the energy of the people giving them a sense of belonging and ownership within their community







#### 5. What engagement has taken place in relation to the project?

Please include the number of people who have been engaged with or consulted as well as the range of people.

Over 300 people have been consulted through online surveys, inhouse surveys, a comments wall, community mapping and face to face chats. This feedback has been across all age groups and with other organisations.

Involvement of the community has been integral to the development of the building, and PRYDE has trained local residents in action research to establish community priorities and enable them to contribute to and have a stake in the design and use of the building. This engagement is ongoing withing PRYDE to enable us to understand needs and issues that could be delivered with funding support. The continuation of the local communities and the others who use the centre is crucial to the ongoing delivery of meaningful programmes. This level of support would not be achievable by the community volunteering, the volunteering strengthens the activities to meet the running costs of the building such as the cafe, fundraising such as bingo and the key holding for other organisations using the building.

The value of community and increased self-image will result in more volunteers to take forward some of the services in the future.

#### 6. How will the project be managed?

How the finances will be managed

The funds will be ring fenced in a credit union account, the salaries and other associated invoices that the funding covers are paid from this account providing a clear statement of the expenditure. This arrangement has been in place for over 14 years and works well keeping ring fenced funding separate from self-generated funds. The treasurer will provide the Board with a up to date cashflow and management accounts and will provide a budget variance quarterly.

Does the proposed project contribute to volunteering or employment opportunities in Kilwinning?

There is volunteering opportunities within the community café, Board and some of the community interest groups such as the sewing group and the Recycled Juveniles. In total we have 15 volunteers who contribute in different ways.



We have two sessional workers who deliver music workshops to young people including Home Schoolers, the two of them were involved as teenagers and have developed their skill with us that has led to employment

Other young people are part of the Youth Board who assist at activities and events and take part in identifying the needs and desires of their peers. For example they were recently involved in ensuring the children and young people had a voice about what the external wall mural should display. They then assisted the artist in completing the wall and supported the children and adults who wanted involved. They are currently assisting the Board to come up with a better suited name for the Company.

Our HR is carried out by one of our Directors who is responsible for this along with finance in their day to day job.

Support is provided by having membership with Ayrshire Chamber of Commerce if required.

The fulltime employee will be managed by a member of the Board, this has worked for many years.

The full time employee will be responsible for managing the part time staff, they have experience in this through managing the sessional staff

The Library hosts many groups that promote community well-being - Louise from CORRA runs chair based exercises every Tuesday morning, Jan runs a Gentle Exercise Class every Wednesday, the NHS runs monthly Diabetes Support sessions, and weekly Smoking Cessation sessions. Carer's Gateway runs weekly Drop-in support sessions and a monthly support group. Healing Hearts Bereavement Support group runs 2 session weekly. Macmillan Cancer Support offer support sessions on the 1st and 3rd Friday of each month in the Library and there is a Hearing Aid Clinic monthly in the Library as well as free access to Hearing Aid Batteries. NADARS also hold weekly sessions in the Library on Fridays for their Clients. We also run social groups to help support people's mental well-being, we have a weekly knitting group and monthly we have 3 book groups. There is also free access to Period Products at the front door to the Library.



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



- Kilwinning Champions Board Provides a Safe and Supportive Space Creates a welcoming environment where young people can share experiences, reduce isolation, and feel heard—promoting emotional wellbeing. Boosts Confidence and Self-Worth Involvement helps young people feel valued and empowered, which supports positive mental health and resilience. Encourages Healthy Relationships and Peer Support Builds strong social connections and trust among members, reducing loneliness and promoting mutual encouragement. Promotes Positive Lifestyles and Access to Support Offers access to information, role models, and services related to mental health, physical wellbeing, and healthy choices.
- KA Delivery of Health checks at the Family Fun days on 7th June at Kilwinning Academy and 11th July at Kilwinning Sports Club. Both days offered fun activities and sports tasters for young people and also provided health checks for adults, CPR demonstrations for both adults and children. The KA Leisure Activator mobile health unit attended Corsehill Primary School on 13th June delivering health based games and activities for young people. Iso attended the Ayrshire College staff wellbeing day on 23rd June, Kilwinning Library fun day on 15th July and Picnic in the Park on 7th August


- Community Development Team designed poster and distributed it locally and within groups/community centres and library to raise awareness of Kilwinning Community Council and encourage local people to come along to meetings. 16 people attended last meeting due to this engagement.
- PB –Applications are now open. We have 6 community reviewers in place for Kilwinning with 3 people new to the role. CLD is supporting them to review applications and work their way though the process
- In order to gain community feedback on the Kilwinning Locality Partnership Priorities there is currently an online consultation through MS Forms running. It has been promoted through social media, in the library, and centres. It was also promoted at the Kilwinning summer programme events. Currently there are 10 completed surveys.

# **Work and Skills**

- Transferable skills gained within Art groups such as, time management, improved focus and concentration, enhanced fine motor skills, developed understanding of colour theory and basic painting techniques.
- Transferable skills gained from attending discovery group such as teamwork, communication, problem solving, resilience and motivation, self management, social intelligence and meta skills. Plus, skills from joining new groups each are different and working on their own journey.
- Sewing Machine Training Classes are taking place with CLD in partnership with the Library. The course started on Thurs 24<sup>th</sup> July, and has been running for 4 weeks. Attendees have come from Kilwinning Community Shed, with 8 attendees (6 ladies and 2 men). The next steps will be to draw up an agreement for the sewing machines to be used the members of shed as part of a loan agreement.

# Climate Action and Local Environment

- Kilwinnings' 2 Discovery award groups joined together to take part in Climate Action workshops. There were three workshops in total over the summer period,. Group participants are now thinking about their climate actions and what they could do within the local community to spread the word. Kate from NAC shared funding that is available for them to apply for and all seem keen to do this as it will also benefit their discovery folio




# Community Engagement/Participation and Voice

- Kilwinning Older Peoples Voice have been meeting as agroup, with the CLD worker, every two weeks (Thursday 11am-1pm) to develop an understanding of the purpose, and work on some actions for development. The group have adopted the name Kilwinning Vintage Voices, and are working towards hosting a Brew and Blether event on Wed 3<sup>rd</sup> September to encourage new members and have engagement with older people in the community.
- Corra have been We have been working with several community members on a community vision, what changes they would like to see.
   We have been working through their ideas to see what actually can be done and if they need help with action, trying to support them to contact the appropriate person. This is going quite well, there has been a slight stall with finding someone at NAC who can support the group around building accessibility.

# Work and Skills

The Library runs the Study Spaces scheme which gives students places to use to study with free Wifi, printing, photocopying and help from staff if required. At present they have a student who is volunteering at Kilwinning Library to get some work experience. They have Device Advice sessions available on Fridays and the Library service has computer Buddies who can work with people develop basic computer skills. The Library staff have also helped people to use websites such as "My World of Work" to build CVs and signposts customers to other services such as CLASP and the Redburn Centre for classes on computer use. The Library also hosts many Extended Outreach sessions each week to support learners. They also host Enable Employability and ESOL with their learners.



# Climate Action and Local Environment

- Choose Kilwinning are currently looking at becoming the first town to have Christmas lights that are solely powered by solar power. The committee held a public meeting (14 attendees) on Tuesday 22<sup>nd</sup> July to discuss it with the community groups/residents that were in attendance. An application for the UK Shared Prosperity fund has been submitted. Kilwinning Community shed are working in partnership with the group to design Alternative Christmas for the main street, and have already started creating decorations for the trees.
- Streetscene have been carrying out ongoing Maintenance of Wild flower Meadows and War memorial planting. They have also continued support community groups with environmental issues to include litter picking, adoption of flower beds and planters around the Kilwinning Locality.







# Community Engagement/Participation and Voice

- Chair based exercise sessions continue to be popular with 18 participants, this has been a real change in social connections with strong friendships and bonds being made from this.
- Community Afternoon Tea Dance aim is to hold these quarterly. The volunteers have really grown in confidence and are doing more and more in the way of planning and delivery of this event, with partial support from corra staff. Due to support of a local business giving a discounted rate on food and by hosting a raffle, the group can keep the prices low at £6 per person, which includes a full afternoon tea, refreshments and live entertainment. This event has been repeatedly sold out and the group have sold all 60 tickets for the next event at the end of August . Local sheltered housing complex Hawthorn and West Doura are regular participants and have commented how much getting out and being in amongst others means to them, listening to old songs and singing along, sometimes dancing too.

# Work and Skills

- Active Schools have successfully graduated 11
  NASA students from Kilwinning Academy.
  These 11 pupils will graduate with a widerange of sporting and non-sporting
  qualifications such as football, badminton,
  table tennis etc, as well as trauma training and
  first-aid.
- 41 young people have participated in work experiences within the local area as part of the Developing the Young Workforce programme.
- KA Leisure delivered a pilot project called 'Me to You' targeting young people not in employment with various partners including DWP, Ayrshire College, CHAP and CEIS to promote employability and wellbeing within a targeted area in the Blacklands. The 8 week course took place at Kilwinning sports club. During the final week a family Fun day was organised on Saturday 7th June at Kilwinning Academy. Partners attended the fun day to promote employability opportunities and health checks were delivered by KA Leisure. There were various fun activities for young people including bouncy castles and sports tasters.

# Climate Action and Local Environment

- On 18 March 2025, Cabinet approved additional funding of £198,000 to support the conservation repair works to Kilwinning Abbey Tower. The works are being project managed by the councils PMI Services.
- Active Travel team Completed the Links to Eglinton Active Travel Route; Completed the improvements to McGavin Park Active Travel Route; Assisted Abbey Croft Care Home to obtain funding for the installation of a cycle shelter and arranged for the works to be completed; Installed 18 pedestrian crossing points in the Pennyburn area; Provided funding for the removal of steps at Pennyburn Bridge.
- The Outside space at the Library is giving the North Ayrshire Healing Hearts bereavement peer support group the space to have a Remembrance Garden.













Picnic in the Park was another successful event in McGavin Park on August 7th. The PB money the group receives is used towards this event covering free adult and children's entertainment, first aid as well as public liability insurance, licence etc.

The paperwork has started for the Kilwinning Community Fireworks - Fireworks in the Park on Wednesday 5th November.

To give you an idea of how much things costs

Last year our public liability insurance for the night cost around £800 and this year the quote is £1250.

We need this to open and receive a licence from the council £374.

We then have the traffic management, the stewards and the first aid all there for public safety and a vital part of the event.

We have a PA system in the event of an evacuation again all part of the vital requirements of running a safe event.

Yes we have the nice extras like bins to put rubbish in and portable toilets but infact they are requirements before we can open.

The actual key part of the event is just half of these other costs - for the Fireworks.

We want to maintain a great show and don't want to cut back on this spend.

We know the kids love the extra fire act and this year the fairy is back, we know parents appreciate these extra activities as it saves the kids getting bored.

We know everyone can't afford a set fee to get in and that quite literally folk can get in anyway if they want to.

We would rather people were in the park rather than standing outside on a pavement where we feel safety is compromised and we you ate blocking the access route to the Park. Plus, this would add to the stewarding costs and volunteer pressure plus delays on the access.

Even a few more volunteers on the night on the night helping with buckets or being on the safety line or manning a road closure will help save money and ensure the safety of so many visitors. send us a pm via Kilwinning community events Facebook page if you could help.

The repairs to the bouncer are now complete that the group received costs towards the new gearing, the council has now advised us that the zip slide requires some new spares with £1500 being an approximation. We are looking at how we might fund these spares.

# 1. Overview of relevant activity linking to the Locality Priorities, Wellbeing and Partnership Working since the last meeting.

Kilwinning Crews have attended several events since last meeting such as;

- Syrian family fun day at Eglington Park on Monday 18th August We attended with Police Scotland and met with people who are now living in the area, showing them equipment, talking about fire safety in the home and providing leaflets with water awareness information. This was all organised by the NA council/ Cummingham housing association.
- Crews have carried out 46 High/Very High Risk Home Fire Safety Visits since the last meetings. If required referral paperwork (AP1) would have been sent to social services by individual crews via SFRS Community Action Teams.
- Various local groups using community room within Kilwinning Community Fire Station. NHS Midwifes, NHS Group for new mothers, Respiratory support group, local Dads group visiting station with kids. Several youth groups attending for visits.
- Kilwinning Youth Volunteer Group that meet on Wednesdays attended a residential trip to Arran.

(Improving Community Wellbeing)

The KA Leisure, Activator mobile health unit provides a valuable service of health checks and lifestyle advice within the heart of local communities. Over the summer months our programme of visits included attendance at various locations within the Kilwinning locality which included: a Staff Wellbeing Day at Ayrshire College, Corsehill Primary school health week, Kilwinning library Fun Day, Picnic in the park.

"After a health check with KA, I went to the GP for a follow up cholesterol check. This evidenced a serious blood condition which is now getting treated. Thank you, you could have saved my life." Activator Participant

As part of the Active North Ayrshire physical activity on referral programme we continue to deliver a Hip & Knee class within Kilwinning Sports Club. Participants can be referred to the class by a health professional for either prehabilitation, to continue a programme rehabilitation after surgery, or for management of general MSK conditions relating to the hip or knee joint.

The annual Active North Ayrshire (ANA) Summer Games in June engaged both ANA and Community participants from across North Ayrshire and was supported by Kilwinning Academy Sports Leaders who gained experience working with older adults. The young people who attended were praised for the quality of delivery, level of effort and engagement with the older adults attending the event.

### North Ayrshire Wellbeing Alliance -

Established in September 2022, the Wellbeing Alliance is part of North Ayrshire's Community Planning Partnership's efforts to reduce inequalities and improve health and wellbeing across our communities.

Aligned with the Local Outcomes Improvement Plan (LOIP) for 2022-2030, the Alliance focuses on the 'Wellbeing' priority—working alongside local partners to provide targeted support that strengthens individual, family, and community wellbeing.

### Kilwinning Pilot: Connecting Employability & Wellbeing



## (Supporting Skills and Work)

The pilot identified a specific locality within North Ayrshire - Kilwinning, targeting around 450 households in Kilwinning West / Blacklands. By integrating wellbeing and work, it gave people access both to community and health activities and to practical pathways into skills, confidence, training and employment.

8 individuals have completed the ME to YOU employability course which combined a formal qualification in customer service along with wider wellbeing and job seeking support. The course was delivered in collaboration with partners including NAC Employability, Ayrshire College, CEIS and others.

(Alleviating Poverty and Promoting Equality of Access to Opportunities Improving Community Well Being)

Blacklands Primary School has been used as a hub/ venue to deliver activities for both young people and parents:

- Family Fun afternoon to welcome new families to the school in August
- Weekly Active Play Sessions with Primary 1 pupils and parents promoting physical activity.
- Use of the Portable Pitch to offer a dedicated resource for PE and play sessions.
- MUGA Street Sport Project 8-week diversionary programme within the community offering street sport activities to young people.
- The KA Community Sports Team is currently delivering a 4-week block of racquet sports to children to young people within Early Years at Blacklands Primary School.

Various activities were programmed over the summer holiday period:

- Free places were offered at Inspire camps to all pupils within Blacklands primary school and to families who are currently being supported through North Ayrshire Health and Social Care partnership. 30 places were booked at various camps for young people from Blacklands Primary school with16 attendances. 6 families attended camps through referral from North Ayrshire Health & Social Care
- In partnership with the Active Schools Team a P7 transition sports camp was programmed to run weekly during the summer holiday period. 14 young people signed up for the camp although only 2 attended.
- A family fun day took place at Kilwinning Sports Club on 11<sup>th</sup> July. A number of partner organisations attended delivering a programme sport and wellbeing activities for families.
