3	CIF Project Update – Beith Community Association  J Robson provided an update on the project:  Initial delays were caused by boiler issues, but Council core hours have helped reduce costs and improve flexibility. New caretaker appointed through CEIS support which has benefitted local young people. Projects include a new garden with seating and a sensory space (funded by ACVS), a toddler group running twice weekly and the continuation of carpet bowls under the Association's banner.	

The community larder operated for one year but closed due to costs and pressures on volunteers, with demand being more for its social aspect than food need. Larder numbers were lower than elsewhere in North Ayrshire, suggesting the model may not have been the right fit for Beith. The Council continues to provide food support from the centre and there are examples locally, such as Beith Trust's initiative to reduce food waste, which could inform future approaches. Cllr Johnson suggested linking in with the Larder Network to see how other overcame similar issues.

Footfall has improved with more lets in place, including Slimming World and toddler football. Plans are progressing with an organisation to use the café area as training kitchen/café in 2026, with engagement taking place to explore a warm hub model over the coming months.

J Robson noted that CIF provided a strong foundation and capacity to build partnerships, and four staff are now employed compared to none previously.

Volunteer recruitment remains a challenge, with the need to build projects of real interest rather than broad calls for support. J. Robson highlighted plans for further engagement over the winter.

The Chair thanked J Robson for his input.

#### 4. Collaborative for Health Equity in Scotland (CHES)

M Sutherland provided the Locality Partnership with an overview of the Collaborative for Health Equity in Scotland (CHES). CHES brings together Public Health Scotland and the University College London's Institute of Health Equity (IHE) led by Professor Sir Michael Marmot.

CHES is working in partnership with Councils and Health Boards across:

- Aberdeen City
- North Ayrshire
- South Lanarkshire

CHES is about improving Health Equity in Scotland. The programme focuses on actions to improve health and reduce health inequalities in Scotland.

The presentation highlighted key data, including:

- Healthy life expectancy of females in North Ayrshire is the lowest in Scotland at only 52 years (vs 61 across Scotland).
- For males this is only slightly better at 56 vs 60 across Scotland.
   However, this number dropped in July 2025 52.6 years.
- Around 50% of health outcomes are linked to social, economic, and physical factors. Work is needed to shift associated behaviours.
- Data in the Garnock Valley showing the impact of premature deaths among 15–44-year-olds and under-75s linked to cancer and heart disease.
- The eight marmot principles are being used to guide efforts to give everyone a healthier life.
- CHES work is being is co-chaired by Sharon Hackney and Dr. Ruth Campbell.

Brief details of org	Beith Trust is a registered Scottish Charity and company limited by guarantee based in Beith, North Ayrshire, we were established in 2012 as a mechanism to drive forward a community led, asset based approach to the regeneration of our community. We aim to improve the present condition and the future prospects of our community by advocating for our community, facilitating opportunities for change, growth and development of the inherent potential of people and places. We operate a diverse programme of activity and services in and around the Garnock Valley, mainly focused around our facilities at Beith Astro and Geilsland but also in the wider communities of the Garnock Valley, we work in partnership with a number of public, private and third sector groups, clubs and agencies. We manage and operate a number of facilities which generate opportunities for training, volunteering, leadership, employment and enterprise. Any profits are reinvested in enterprise development or subsidise our community services Beith Trust work is centred on creating new conditions that enable and support the people and places of Beith to flourish and thrive. Our work aims to create those conditions.  Our community activity programme aims to create a pathway of support and progression within social, recreational, learning and employability opportunities. We deliver a programme of seasonal & cultural events and festivals.  We support volunteers to facilitate valuable community services that offer support to families and individuals affected by challenging life circumstances and poverty such as befriending, social isolation and loneliness and food distribution systems in the Garnock Valley.

	Beith Trust is seeking a contribution towards upgrading the pitches at Beith Astro to
Brief overview of proposal	safeguard a much-loved, heavily used community hub at Meadowside Pavilions in Beith.  This is part of a larger initiative which will see the Astro Pavilion building, pitch and grounds repositioned to reflect the needs of 21s century community and customers.  After more than a decade and a half of continuous play, the full-size 3G surface has exceeded its life expectancy; compacted infill and reduced playability now pose safety risks and threaten availability. Resurfacing is therefore essential to keep a critical asset open and safe  The funding package will include a range of funders, all of whom have been approached, consulted  - Sports Scotland (Pavilion Upgrade) – preparing application – 150k  - Aria Fund (access controls and security installation) – secured funding 10k  - Cares (Pavilion Upgrade) – EOI submitted – c50k

SFA (Pitch Refurb) - preparing application (previous application rejected - match funding requirement) - c250k Beith Astro is more than a pitch. During term time it supports nature & play, outdoor learning and wraparound childcare used by multiple groups and local schools, in school holidays it hosts popular holiday camps on the pitch, which double as leadership and volunteer pathways for employability participants before stepping into real roles at sessions and events. Adjacent to the pavilions, families, individuals and groups actively use gardens and growing and green space for outdoor play, wellbeing and therapeutic programmes; on-site growing projects involve children and volunteers in food cultivation, composting and climate-aware habits that link to community food initiatives. Football, however, is the anchor that makes the whole venue viable. Beith Astro is booked to capacity at weekends and most evenings, delivering 40+ hours of club matches and training across the week and serving 1,000+ weekly users through clubs, schools, programmes and casual bookings. Regular club demand (Beith Juniors, Beith Community FC and partners) fills peak hours; protecting those hours with a new, compliant surface secures the trading income that subsidises wider community use. Bookings are managed via Skedda online booking apps. access controls are in place with trusted key holders to keep evenings and weekends running smoothly. The football pathway also powers community engagement and workforce: holiday camps and social and recreational activity builds volunteering and leadership, creating progression routes for local young people into paid or volunteer roles at the venue. Because the site operates as a wider community hub—with family support services, outdoor play and on-site growing-families who come for football also access nature-based activities, food growing and wellbeing projects, reinforcing year-round footfall and use of the place. Investment in the pitch is therefore not just a sports upgrade—it's the keystone that safeguards bookings, protects an income-generating community asset for the development of an emerging Sports Trust, and sustains the broader social programme delivered from the venue. **Time** March 26 – April 27 scales Jane Lamont Contact details Chief Officer

#### Beith Trust – Beith Astro Capital Phasing Plan & Funding Strategy

#### **Total Capital Investment Required: £580,000**

Beith Trust has developed a three-phase capital delivery plan that aligns our strategic objectives with available funding opportunities and project milestones. This phased approach enables us to address urgent infrastructure needs, establish a sustainable model for long-term community ownership, and enhance the quality and accessibility of sports facilities across Beith.

Each phase builds on the last, creating a foundation for increased community use, energy efficiency, and place-based regeneration rooted in local leadership.

#### Phase 1: Essential Upgrades to Beith Astro

#### Estimated Cost: £335,000

This phase delivers urgent resurfacing works to Beith Astro, establishes a new Sports Trust, and progresses early design work for future pavilion refurbishment. These steps are critical to ensuring the facility remains safe, accessible, and well-used by the local footballing and wider community.

#### Phase 2: Bellsdale & Pavilion Infrastructure Development

Estimated Cost: £235,000

Phase 2 addresses critical infrastructure and ownership work at Bellsdale, along with the completion of energy efficiency works in the Pavilion. This phase strengthens our ability to manage assets locally, extend facility use, and increase sustainability.

The final phase of the capital plan completes the transfer of ownership of Beith Astro into the newly established Sports Trust. This ensures a sustainable governance structure and empowers the local community to lead long-term sports development.

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#### Collaboration for Health Equity in Scotland

North Ayrshire is one of three pilot areas across Scotland taking a focus on health as part of the Collaboration for Health Equity in Scotland, part of Public Health Scotland. Within North Ayrshire, CHES will focus on early years in Irvine, employability in the Three Towns and ill health prevention in the Garnock Valley. The Garnock Valley working group have met twice and are exploring ideas to put into practice, linking in with the Our Garnock Valley plan.

#### **Community Council Elections**

Following the recent election process, Beith & District Community Council will continue to serve the community of Beith & District having received enough nominations to form a community council and, as a result, they welcome four new community councillors. Sadly, Kilbirnie & Glengarnock did not receive enough nominations to form a community council and will now disband.

The Garnock Valley Locality Team would like to thank all the outgoing community councillors for their hard work and dedication over the years. We wish them all the best for the future.

#### The She Shed

The She Shed continues to thrive and has a healthy attendance every Tuesday in Dalry Scout Hall. They held an AGM at the end of August and now have a fully functioning committee, who are working together to provide those attending with plenty of activities and a safe and welcoming environment. They held a very successful open day which gave local people the opportunity to pop in and find out what was going on and this has led to new members. They have a festive event planned and will be inviting the Men's Shed for Hot Chocolate and cake.

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Community Voices 50+ - As part of the Council's engagement with older people through the Older Peoples Voice Participation Strategy, staff in the Locality Team have broadened the reach of the Discovery Award and introduced Community Voices 50+. The group is aimed at bringing together older people in Dalry, Kilbirnie, Beith and outlying villages and give them a space to discuss issues affecting older people and share information on groups and services that they may not be aware of. It is hoped that awareness of the groups will increase with word of mouth and promotion around the towns and on social media.



Discovery Award – The Discovery Award currently has six regular attendees. Of the regular attendees, two are working on Gold, one on Silver and three on Bronze. Another three members attend when they can and are working towards their Silver Award. As well as working on their awards with volunteering, hobbies, skills, and their personal journey, as a group they have enjoyed trips to Burns Cottage and Kelvingrove Museum and have organised to do the mural walk in Paisley. The group have also had fun making fajitas, held a Halloween party where they carved pumpkins, reminiscing about old Kilbirnie and have a Christmas party planned for the 11th of December. The group have also been participating in a 6-week chair yoga programme, which they are all enjoying and some of them are using this as part of their physical section of the Discovery Award.



#### **Participatory Budgeting**

The six Garnock Valley Community reviewers worked positively together during the review process. Their involvement, experience, confidence, knowledge, and understanding was recognised and resulted in how well they all worked together. The number of applications received was high, leading to a competitive Locality and Youth PB in the Garnock Valley this year. A total of twenty-seven projects for Locality went through to the public vote and ten Youth projects. #### Scottish Mental Health Arts Festival (North Ayrshire)

"Paint & a Pie" and Project Progress (Garnock Valley) were projects both recently featured in exhibitions during the festival. Working in partnership with the Harbour Arts Centre and SMHAF, the team showcased the community's work. The Project Progress 4-week block was included in the S3 Community Leadership's programme, and resulted in the development of skills, experience and confidence for the young people. As a result of their completion of the full Community Leadership programme, almost all young people have continued to engage in education, applied for college, and gained places or continued learning pathways. Positive feedback has been given by partners, community members, and the young people themselves. The Locality Team are hoping to repeat this and host an exhibition of all the work around Paint and a Pie in Kilbirnie library offering a local opportunity to celebrate the hard work of the community.









# **Our Garnock Valley**

The Garnock Valley Local Place Plan — Our Garnock Valley — is believed to be the first where towns — Beith, Dalry and Kilbirnie — have worked together to create a place plan for a cluster of communities, rather than each working in isolation. It was prepared through extensive consultation with the local community and stakeholders. Work has been led by a working group made up of Beith and District, Dalry and Kilbirnie and Glengarnock Community Councils, along with Beith Community Development Trust, Dalry Community Development Hub, Dalry Community Sports Club and Garnock Valley Youth Forum. It has been supported by North Ayrshire Council and funded by the Scottish Government's Place Based Investment Programme.

The collaboration has been recognised with a Judges' Special Award as part of the 2025 Scotland Loves Local Awards, organised by Scotland's Town Partnership. The special prize was presented after award judges heard how the Garnock Valley communities recognised the power of collaboration - working together to tackle common problems, while also addressing individual issues in each town and surrounding villages.





# **Our Garnock Valley**

Members of the group travelled to Edinburgh for the parliamentary reception at Holyrood on 5<sup>th</sup> November, where they met Government Ministers and the Chair of Scotland's Town Partnership. Following the event, the group are due to meet the Chair and Treasurer of Scotland's Town Partnership, along with representatives from the Scotlish Government's Regeneration department.

In addition, the Place Plan was submitted and registered at a meeting of North Ayrshire Council's Planning Committee on 29<sup>th</sup> October.

The community-led plan sets out the aspirations for the Garnock Valley and suggests solutions, including the big challenges like the global climate emergency and tackling inequalities.

By setting out priorities for future development in the area, Local Place Plans can also help communities in the Garnock Valley to develop and deliver their own projects and bring about community-based change.

Speaking on the group's behalf, Helen McNaughton, chair of Beith and District Community Council, said: "Our Garnock Valley is an inspirational document with identified common themes and priorities for each of our areas.

"The vision is to make things better - to improve our areas for our children to grow, our communities to grow and for people to live, be employed and have happy lives in the Garnock Valley. We just want to make things better.

"We're really proud to have taken this work to the place it is now. We look forward to working together to implement the proposals and deliver positive change."





#### **Facilities and Amenities**

#### Café Solace

Café Solace are absolutely delighted to have been awarded funding from the National Lottery Fairer Life Chances over the next three years. This will secure continued delivery of café, where customer numbers continue to be steady with around 100 meals per week served on a Friday. It also gives the opportunity to fill provision gaps for people in recovery and/or families impacted by drug or alcohol abuse, by further developing the Garnock Valley Recovery Hub.

Café Solace participated in the Garnock Valley Carves event in September by cooking breakfast for participants and volunteers. Throughout the very wet and windy morning they served tea and coffee to volunteers and distributed lunch — which had to be diverted to another tent as their gazebo wasn't strong enough to withstand the weather! They also had a catering challenge earlier in November — providing sandwiches and cakes for 300 people at an event in Paisley, which went well and was very well received. This was their largest external catering event to date. This year so far, they have been able to add over £3,000 to café funds through external catering, helping them to remain sustainable.

They have had more young people work with them as part of their volunteering requirements for the Duke of Edinburgh Award schemes, with eight currently working or training with them at present. They also have a new Scot working with them along with her ESOL tutor on a Friday morning, which helps to improve her English. They also have two new adult volunteers who have joined them to help on a Friday night.

The garden will be cleared over the next few weeks and will be rested until they are ready for planting in early Spring, hopefully learning some lessons from what worked and did not work so well this year. Ideally, they will find one or two volunteers in the new year who would be interested in helping them with their garden.

Café Solace held their AGM in October, with the majority of their adult volunteers opting to join the committee. Their next meeting is scheduled for January.

Finally, they are now preparing for their very popular Christmas. Meals are planned for Friday 5th and 12th December, where they will cater for up to eighty each night. They will have carol singers attending both events and they expect a visit from Santa to distribute gifts to all attending. They will also be supporting the Licht Up Our Toon event on Saturday 29th November.

# **Work and Local Community**

## **Dalry Community Sports Club**

The larder continues to provide a vital lifeline for many families and individuals in the town and attendance has remained steady over the past three months. On Saturday mornings, they continue to provide a place where people can meet and have a cup of tea and a chat in a warm space, and they are also able to do referrals to help families with energy costs.

The Sports Club have had a number of winter jackets donated by members of the community and have started to distribute them to families and individuals on Wednesdays and Saturdays during the larder opening times. Park Lives has now finished for the winter and will be relaunched next Spring.

In October, the Sports Club supported Dalry Community Development Hub, K:A Leisure, and Neighbourhood Networks to run sporting events for local adults with additional support needs. This was the third such event, with a fourth planned for December.

The rescheduled Party at the Park took place on Sunday 21st September, once again in partnership with Dalry Community Sports Club, Dalry Community Development Hub, and Dalry Action Group. Due to a poor weather forecast the event was moved indoors to the main hall in Dalry Primary School but, ironically, it turned out to be a nice day. The event was very well attended and proved to be a great success.

They held their fourth free family Community Cinema evening in October in Dalry Community Centre with a showing of The Addams Family, once again with complimentary snacks and drinks. The next event was on November 30<sup>th</sup> when they showed "How to Train Your Dragon". Their final film of the year – a classic Christmas movie will be shown on Sunday 21<sup>st</sup> December.



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# **Work and Local Community**

#### **Dalry Community Sports Club**

Dalry Public Park now has new solar-powered lighting, a project made possible through months of dedicated work by Dalry Community Sports Club volunteers, supporters, and local residents. The environmentally friendly solar lighting now illuminates key areas of the park, increasing safety, extending usable hours for local sports and recreational activities, and making the park more accessible during evenings. Ten new lighting columns are now in place and provide a safe walkway from the Regal Court car park down to the Pavilion. The initiative was supported through a combination of NAC grants, fundraising events, donations, and sponsorship. The solar lighting not only provides a greener alternative to traditional lights but also reduces long-term energy costs and the park's environmental footprint.

After successful fundraising, they have ordered four new benches for Dalry Public Park to be installed by the end of November. They carried out a consultation exercise with park users and have met with representatives from David Ogilvie Engineering at the park and agreed the preferred locations. There will be two new picnic benches and new seating for users of the Skate Park. After visiting the park, the representatives from David Ogilvie have also offered to donate and install a further park bench free of charge.

Dalry Community Sports Club will be cooking and giving out free rolls & sausage at the Torchlight & Tinsel event in Dalry to help support the great work carried out by the volunteers from Dalry Action Group in making the town look good for Christmas.

Looking forward, the Sports Club are now in the final stages of their negotiations with DSM to take over a lease for the field between Dalry Public Park and DSM for planned Community Allotments and playing fields.

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# **Garnock Valley Youth Work**

#### S3 Community Leadership programme

The S3 Community Leadership programme works in partnership with KA Leisure and NAC Education. A new group of young people in S3 have been identified by the school and so far, have been engaging positively. A range of youth work sessions including icebreakers, team building games, social media/alcohol/drugs/energy drinks risks, and awareness has been shaped around their learning needs. The impact of this is evident in their participation, coming into school sometimes only for these sessions on a Tuesday. The programme is targeted at addressing their changing needs and learning experiences. There are currently ten registered with a core of six attending weekly.

#### **S2 Youth Group (Walker Hall)**

Due to the change of venue and time for the youth groups in this term, the level of engagement has been impacted with a reduced number. However, through consistent engagement, a core group have continued to shape their learning in identifying their needs and interests throughout the sessions. All young people have reported their enjoyment and need for this to continue; this is evident in their continuous participation which has kept the group running. A range of activities chosen by them include a Halloween quiz, a traitors' game, arts & crafts (mini zine), and Christmas crafts, which will all engage their participation.

#### **Political literacies**

Planning towards the upcoming 2026 Scottish Government election, the Locality Team are looking at how to engage young people in politics and encouraging them to vote. This will be non-party political and will focus on encouraging young people to take part in the "register to vote" week in February, which is aimed at 16 and 17 year-olds and helps to break down barriers for young people to vote, especially if it is their first time.

#### **Ocean Youth Trust**

The group involved with OYT has concluded with their 5-day voyage and undertook a "give back" day where the group took to Lochshore park to host a litter picking day.

They ended the day with a visit to Beijing banquet as a reward and celebration of all that they had achieved.

#### **Umbrella** club

The Umbrella Club continues to be a safe and nurturing environment for young people who identify under the LGBT+ umbrella to come to during school hours. The group have begun discussing hosting another Bakesale in February to raise money for LGBT Youth Scotland for purple Friday.

#### **Garnock Valley Youth Forum**

The youth forum has been busy with their involvement in shortlisting Youth PB applications and encouraging local young people to vote in the voting stage. As always, they approached this task with integrity and professionalism giving their honest and objective analysis based on the guidelines and criteria. They reviewed several applications for the locality and approved many of them creating healthy voting opportunities for the young people of the Garnock Valley. The group continue to work on the Duke of Edinburgh Award and are making good progress. Members of the group also attended an event in Largs 'Helping Ayrshires Children Thrive in the Digital Age.'





#### Youth Synergy

Numbers are increasing for this group and there are now seven members who all attend regularly and engage well. Due to the time of year, Youth Synergy have decided to postpone their John Muir award and concentrate on the festive fundraiser for the Kilbirnie Lights Switch On. They have been working on creating their Christmas crafts and tombola for the event, which was held on the 29th of November. The income from this fundraiser they hope will fund new branded hoodies for the group.
