The Locality Partnership considered a Full Application made to the Community Investment Fund from PRYDE.

The applicants are seeking £90,830 (£30,290 x 3 Years) for match funding for a Community Development Manager, two part time engagement staff and a contribution to the increased running costs of the centre. The group is seeking match funding and expects to receive a decision from the Lottery Fund by the end of the week regarding the outcome of their application.

C Gillon advised that one member of the PRYDE board now joined with at Cranberry Moss to bring the community together.

C Gillon highlighted that there is a shadow youth board supported by the community connectors, as there is a strong need to develop more collaborative and partnership-based relationships across the community.

The Chair thanked C Gillon and W Duffy for attending.

The applicants left the room at this point.

The Partnership discussed:

- How the group are focusing on the main issues within the locality, recognising the significant efforts in fundraising to sustain the service.
- Noting that they it was good to see that young people are being engaged, especially around mental health and wellbeing, noting that early intervention could play a key role in future solutions
- It would be helpful if they could create a baseline at the start to track progress and identify changes over time, as this could also support future funding opportunities for the organisation

The Partnership agreed to award the Group the £90,830 subject to confirmation of match funding from the National Lottery. It was further agreed that funding for subsequent years will be released following completion of the mandatory monitoring form and the Group's annual attendance at the Locality Partnership to provide updates on baseline information showing progress.

Finally, it was agreed that if the Group does not secure match funding from the National Lottery, L Riddex and the Team will work with them on developing a new CIF proposal.

	 Two summer programme events were held in Kilwinning with 344 people attending. Two arts groups taking place at Cranberry Moss are at full capacity with 12 participants each. 14 people are participating in the Discovery Award, with one participant achieving Bronze and the remainder of the participants working towards Silver and Gold. The team are now running two groups. The Community Shed continues to grow with new members 	
	joining regularly, and they have submitted a CAT application for Blacklands Hall alongside another group, with applications currently being assessed and a decision expected by December.	Noted

6.	Partner Updates	
6.	Partner Updates Education	

- Supporting skills development and delivering a My World of Work
 platform This allows parents and young people to have access to
 employment information, with priority groups encouraged to
 engage and understand how to use the platform.
- Work is ongoing with Education Scotland on developing profiles.
- Metaskills are being linked across all subjects to professions, the key challenge is ensuring young people understand their longterm importance.
- A recent careers fayre with 30 employers attended and was very successful and well received by senior pupils.
- Concerns were raised about litter in McGavin Park. Young people have been involved in litter picking, but it was noted the issue should not rest solely with them and requires wider collaboration.
- New and nearly-new uniforms are available from the school, with families invited into the school to access these, T Swan noted that it can be difficult to encourage full uptake.

Active Schools

M Rae provided the Partnership with an update:

- Recruitment for the Leadership Programme has been completed, with four programmes running across North Ayrshire.
- The first group, North Ayrshire Sports Academy, is now in week 4
 of 6, with 15 young people from Kilwinning involved. After the
 October holidays, participants will begin delivering extra-curricular
 clubs in primary schools.
- Team Inspire, made up of young people who go above and beyond, currently has 20 members, including four from Kilwinning. They mentor new Sports Academy students and recently took part in a residential focused on planning and team building. They are keen to take on greater responsibility and ownership of activities.
- A new Active Girls Committee has been established, with two representatives per year group from S3–S6. There are currently six members from Kilwinning.
- There are 16 Young Ambassadors at Kilwinning Academy.
- The whole Kilwinning cluster has been awarded the Gold Award for the next two years.

Police Scotland

- The LALO is working on the Chamber Choices programme and Police Scotland work experience.
- The team continues to collaborate with ADP teams.
- Safer Shores involved significant work with youth engagement teams over the summer, with a strong visible presence that was highlighted as a positive addition.
- The Campus Officer has been active in supporting litter-picking initiatives.
- Electric pedal bikes have recently been delivered in the area.

M Cowan highlighted that he would take forward the matter regarding school uniforms and explore opportunities for Police to work more closely with the school.

F Comrie noted that KA Leisure also has sports kit available.

Scottish Fire and Rescue

K McGuire advised the Partnership that a full report was included in the agenda pack. He advised the Partnership that with bonfire season approaching, the Community Action Team is delivering safety talks within schools. He also noted that it is encouraging to see many local groups making good use of the community room in Kilwinning.

KA Leisure

F Comrie provided the Partnership with an update:

- Blacklands Primary School has been used as a hub venue for activities involving young people and parents, including a Family Fun afternoon welcoming new families, weekly active play sessions with Primary 1 pupils and parents, and use of a portable pitch for PE and play sessions.
- Various summer activities with free places offered at Inspire camps to pupils from Blacklands Primary School and families supported by North Ayrshire Health and Social Care Partnership. 30 places were booked, with 16 young people attending and six families participating through referrals.
- The KA Community Sports Team delivered a 4-week block of racquet sports to children and young people at Blacklands Primary School.
- The "Me to You" employability course was completed by eight individuals, supported by partners including NAC Employability and Ayrshire College.

The Chair thanked everyone for their updates.

8. Meeting Forward Planning

R Leith suggested looking at theming each of the meetings around one of the LP priorities. R Leith also noted that the team is working on locality profiles and will review existing information related to each theme, identifying any gaps and partner updates could also be themed accordingly.

The Partnership welcomed this approach.

L Riddex highlighted that she is working on re-establishing the Locality Networks also.

It was agreed that the **Improving Community Wellbeing** priority would be the focus of the December meeting.

9. AOCB

A Wilson highlighted that TACT is hosting an event on 9th October from 12:30 to 4:00 pm at the Ardrossan Civic Centre as part of Challenge Poverty Week. The event aims to bring agencies together to tackle poverty and is open to all. Partner organisations involved include Employability, Citizens Advice, Money Smart, and various volunteering groups. Soup and sandwiches will be available for those who come along. A Wilson advised that she would circulate the event poster to the Partnership.

W Crighton advised that the team are working to establish and grow community income generation by offering packages for birthdays and other events. The hall is gaining a strong and steadily increasing community following. An intergenerational committee is in development, naloxone train-the-trainer sessions are planned, and an application has been submitted for a public access defibrillator.

C Young advised that he is currently engaging with a local primary school through the Street Striker initiative, which uses presentations and workshops for P6/7 pupils to address knife crime. On 12th October, they will participate in an event. Plans now underway for Operation Santa that ties in with efforts in Bridgend, with plans to expand to other areas. The 50s Diner also helps raise funds for the community centre.

The Chair thanked everyone for their inputs.






Poverty/Financial Inclusion




Health and Wellbeing

The bench will be created for the playground. The organisation are intending to create further Buddy Benches for all of the primary schools within Kilwinning.




Regeneration and Increasing Civic Pride

- Three members of Discovery Award 2 group have volunteered with NAC core skills team and have started assisting delivery of Numeracy and Literacy classes.
- Seven members have taken on volunteering posts with Cunningham Housing Associations Toy Appeal for this Christmas working from the Sweeny centre in Ardrossan.
- Love Hall youth group took part in Safe places activity – this activity allowed young people to identify areas in their community that they feel are safe and areas that they feel need improvement. This involved the young people in a consultation process with a view to supporting the group to take forward an initiative to support young people in feeling safe.









Community Engagement/Participation and Voice


- Kilwinning Vintage Voices, hosted a **Brew** and Blether event on Wednesday 3rd September to encourage new members and have engagement with older people in the community regarding positives and negatives affecting older people. At the event the older people were treated to tea/coffee and cake/biscuits. Musical entertainment was also provided. Two attendees from Kilwinning Vintage Voices attend the Executive Older Peoples Council Meeting on Thursday 6th November at Cumbrae Gardens in Largs. The key discussion included: Communication, Transport, Community Safety, Access To healthcare, and Public Realm.
- Corra are currently supporting the groups they are working with to take forward their community vision/ Plan on a page as Corra Foundation look to change the way they are working in communities and step back from on the ground working by March 2026

Work and Skills

- Writing For Self Expression (4 week course) has been running in partnership with the Royal Literacy Fund who has provided a professional writer to facilitate the course. The course started on Tuesday 26th October in Kilwinning Library, and is running for 4 weeks. 6 learners have been attending the course.
- CLD staff facilitated Cyber Awareness
 Training session for Choose Kilwinning
 committee members on Tuesday 4th
 November In Kilwinning Library. The
 training covers appropriate usage of
 shared emails, email etiquette, social
 media protocols, whatsapp and group
 chats, and GDPR Awareness.
- After recently nominating them,
 Kilwinning Community Shed have been
 selected as a finalist to attend the Adult
 Learners' Week Award ceremony on
 Thursday 29th January 2026 at the
 Scottish Parliament.

Climate Action and Local Environment

- Eglinton Growers Community Allotment held their AGM in Kilwinning Library on Sunday 2nd November. The AGM was attended by 24 members. The majority of the committee have stood down, with a new committee elected. Following the AGM,CLD staff met the group on Monday 3rd November to discuss the handover process from the previous committee, and to discuss the office bearers roles. The new committee have expressed a need for committee training which CLD staff will deliver in January 2026. The former office bearers have offered support with the handover process.
- Pryde have just received funding to work
 with the community in Pennyburn to create
 two murals on the railway bridges, as well
 as install two breathing spaces benches.








Community Engagement/Participation and Voice

- Whitehirst Park Community Association are having their annual Christmas movie day on 6th Dec. CLD staff booked Mobile Cinema and popcorn machine for the event.
- PB CLD staff gave support in completing paper voting for groups whose members may struggle to access libraries and online. Have been to both Dirrans and Healing hearts groups.
- Kilwinning Joint Youth Group are exploring ideas of becoming constituted and take on roles and responsibilities. They aim to lead fundraising and influence local decisions, including plans for youth space.
- Current members of Discovery Award Group in Kilwinning will be given the opportunity to present to community members of North Coast ,the benefits of the award, How it has helped them? and enable real community engagement with a peer learning approach.

Work and Skills

- Transferable skills gained within Art groups such as, time management, improved focus and concentration, enhanced fine motor skills, developed understanding of colour theory and basic painting techniques.
- Transferable skills gained from attending discovery group such as teamwork, communication, problem solving, resilience and motivation, self management, social intelligence and meta skills. Plus, skills from joining new groups each.
- Kilwinning Academy Intervention CLD staff met with YouthLink to explore how young people can achieve their Participative Democracy Award. This award will demonstrate partnership working, clear communication, and group work. Activities throughout the programme will structure outcomes that promote participation and leadership.



Climate Action and Local Environment

 Kilwinning Joint Youth Group – participated in an issue-based session exploring the environmental impact of Bonfire Night. Young people discussed how individual actions affect the local environment and learned practical ways to reduce harm and promote climate-friendly choices during not only Guy Fawkes celebrations, but when fires are essential.

Work and Skills

 Support from NAC Economic Development - Two businesses have been supported to improve on fair work initiatives, 6 Business Gateway Planning to Start interventions, 4 businesses supported to start their business, one business attended a recruitment workshop, 4 businesses have been supported with procurement, 10 jobs have been filled by North Ayrshire residents from Kilwinning businesses, one business received a grant for process digitalisation

Climate Action and Local Environment

The Pollinator Packs project was designed to raise public awareness of NANN (North Ayrshire Nature Network). It offered people a chance to have a little piece of that network at home. The project was subject to time constraints in terms of the availability of plants from suppliers and opportunities to engage with the public through upcoming community events. Each pack contained 7 perennial plants and 2 seed packets. This ratio was chosen so that each pack would create a square metre of pollinator friendly planting in a garden or greenspace. The plants were selected to provide pollinator species with a source of nectar and pollen across the growing season from March to September, when pollinator species are most active. Packs were given out at the Kilwinning Flower Show on the 28th of August. 84 packs were given out. 134 were given out in the Kilwinning locality. Four packs of plants were also donated to be planted in McGavin Park.

Events

Kilwinning Community Events is a small voluntary group which was set up to run events in McGavin Park over the period we also took on the improvement plan for the park after a previous bid collapsed. KCE vision was to get more people back using the park for more than just walking and to cater for a wider community.

This resulted in an enhanced outdoor gym, zip slide and play area. The group is liable for ongoing repairs and maintenance of all this equipment which is starting to kick in with equipment out of use at times till funds or grants can be achieved.

Kilwinning locality is unique as such as such as it has no energy generation companies supplying grants at this time or common good funds that can top up the income of the group other than a meagre £1k fund which we use to support Picnic in the Park.

We run Picnic not to make money but also not to lose money this year we covered £1500 on top of the council grant to fund the day.

The fireworks we now rely fully on bucket donations, sadly not everyone donates and we used £3k to support the event so we have our challenges to keep these events going plus repair the play equipment.

We also had to close the toilets in the park due to the loss of power to the park which will take time to sort out.

To keep going we need a few more committee members or people to help apply for grants and fundraising.

To review our events and look at the charges. This will probably mean if the fireworks goes ahead a capped attendance for Kilwinning residents only with tickets issued.

This would reduce the need for us to provide parking, traffic management and road closures along with reducing the need more toilets insurance etc. that's if we decide to proceed at all.

Our priority as such is to keep the playground operating for the wider use of the public year-round.


Introduction

This report summarises community feedback gathered through an online survey to inform local priorities for Kilwinning. The survey explored four key areas:

A total of 23 responses were received from individuals with various connections to Kilwinning, including residents, volunteers, and workers.

Demographics




- Age Groups:

Key Barriers Identified

- Limited local job opportunities and training facilities.
- Poor transport links affecting access to work.
- Limited apprenticeships and modern trades training.
- Digital exclusion facinging challenges with digital access, including reliable internet and devices.
- Fear of losing benefits when undertaking training.



Suggested Support

- More apprenticeships and youth opportunities.
- Accessible and affordable training (online and face-to-face).
- Local job centre or careers hub.
- CV support and interview skills workshops.
- Incentives for employers to offer training and jobs.



- Meadowpark Road and Laughlan Road car parks.





- Local parks and green spaces.

- Regular community meetings.

Final Thoughts

Respondents highlighted the need for:

- Better communication and promotion of services.
- Investment in town centre regeneration.
- Stronger collaboration between council and community groups.
- Sustainable funding for local initiatives.

Possible Recommendations

1. Establish a local information hub for jobs, training, and community services.

- 2. Develop environmental volunteer programmes and improve Main Street aesthetics.
- 3. Expand community larders and affordable activities for families.
- 4. Create mental health and wellbeing hubs with drop-in support.
- 5. Improve communication channels (digital boards, flyers, community meetings).

Priority 1 – Supporting Skills and Work

North Ayrshire Wellbeing Alliance – Kilwinning Pilot: Summary

The Kilwinning Pilot has brought the North Ayrshire Wellbeing Alliance to life, demonstrating how innovation, collaboration and community-led design can connect wellbeing and employability in a meaningful and practical way.

Phase 1 focused on Kilwinning West/Blacklands, engaging around 450 households and beginning with an ideas workshop involving 28 partners. This shaped a model built on lived experience, local insight and the strengths already present within the community.

The pilot showcased how wellbeing activity including physical activity, social connection, health management and confidence building can combine with employability pathways, volunteering and wider support communities.

A key learning from Phase 1 is the power of simplicity, partnership and flexibility; even without a dedicated budget, partners collectively delivered activity, shared resources and maintained momentum through the Kilwinning Partner Network (KPN). The pilot confirms the value of bringing wellbeing and work closer together and highlights how aligned assets, community spaces and partnerships can deliver genuine local impact.

Phase 2 will focus on deepening the partnership approach, refining the model based on what the community told us, and expanding delivery to test and strengthen the learning from Phase 1. This will help shape a framework that can be scaled across

the wider Kilwinning locality—ultimately creating a locality-wide approach that links wellbeing, participation, and pathways into skills and employment.

The initiative is now well-placed to move from a pilot to a fully replicable model that strengthens community wellbeing.

Priority 3 - Alleviating Poverty and Promoting Equality of Access to Opportunities

A 4 week block of sporting activities was delivered to the Blacklands Young Carers Group. Approx 20, P5-P7 pupils from schools across the Kilwinning locality who care for a family member at home took part in various taster sessions on a Tuesday afternoon within the games hall at Blacklands Primary School.

Priority 4 - Improving Community Wellbeing

KA Leisure has delivered a number of activities and initiatives that promote positive community wellbeing:

Community Sport / Community Sport Hub Programme

- Kilwinning Community Sport Hub in partnership with the Active Lifestyles team is offering an eight-week block of pickleball and badminton sessions for North Ayrshire Council employees to support their health and wellbeing. The programme began on 31st of October and runs for eight weeks.
- North Ayrshire Community Sport Hub Club Start Programme, in partnership with Kilwinning Community Sport Club and KA Leisure, we are delivering eight weeks of free football sessions for children from Kilwinning and the surrounding areas born in 2020. During this programme, we aim to recruit and develop volunteers to help establish a new 2020 Kilwinning Rangers football team. The first session took place on Friday the 14th of November.

- In partnership with Abbey Primary School and North Ayrshire Active Schools, we have assigned a community coach to deliver a nine-week breakfast club programme. This initiative enables pupils to engage in physical activity and access a nutritious breakfast prior to the start of the school day.
- KA Leisure October Holiday Programme In partnership with key partners, including North Arshire Active Schools, we provided free holiday programme spaces for care-experienced children. The programme offered a safe and welcoming environment where children can stay active during the school holidays.
- KA Leisure's Raquet Sports Coordinator delivered a 4 week block of raquet sports within Blacklands early years with 10-11 attending each week. The sessions ran throughout September and promoted the Inspire mini racquet sports sessions that tale place weekly on a Tuesday at Kilwinning Academy
- Sports Hall Athletics Whitehirst Park, St Winnings, Blacklands, Pennyburn & St Lukes Primary school all participated in this year's sports hall athletics events. Whitehirst Park have reached the final which is scheduled for Tuesday 2nd December at the Portal.
