1.	Welcome, Apologies and Declarations of Interest The Chair welcomed everyone to the meeting and apologies for absence were noted. Declarations of interest were made by: - J Lamont in relation to the Geilsland Enterprise application made to the Community Projects Fund – Pride in Place Impact Fund - J Lamont, H McNaughton, A Watson and A Wright relation to the Our Garnock Valley application made to the Community Projects Fund – Pride in Place Impact Fund	Noted Noted
2.	Action Note The action note arising from the meeting held on 12 March 2026 was approved. The following updates were provided:	

Action Note

	- An additional Locality Partnership meeting was held to consider the full application from Dalry Community Sports Club. The application was approved by the Partnership and has since been approved by the Council's Cabinet - It is hoped that a representative from the Council's Active Travel and Transport Team and SPT will attend September Meeting	
3.	HSCP Update The Partnership received a report from S Hackney, on revised HSCP locality planning arrangements for Garnock Valley. The new approach will align HSCP locality planning more closely with existing Community Planning Partnership Locality Partnership structures, replacing the previous standalone HSCP Locality Planning Review Groups. This is intended to reduce duplication, strengthen partnership working and support a more coordinated approach to improving outcomes at a locality level. HSCP Locality Leads will attend two Locality Partnership meetings each year, with a standing HSCP locality planning agenda item included to provide updates, share emerging priorities and identify opportunities for joint working. Written updates will be provided for the remaining meetings to maintain visibility of locality planning activity and relevant HSCP developments. It was noted that HSCP Locality Plans will be developed using locality data, community engagement, service input and partner feedback. Draft plans will be brought to the Locality Partnership for comment, ensuring partners have the opportunity to help shape local priorities and delivery. The Chair thanked S Hackney for her report and highlighted his ongoing support for strengthening the relationship between the HSCP, the Locality Partnership and the wider locality. S Hackney agreed and noted the importance of joining up conversations to support better outcomes for residents in the area. C Pieraccini noted the section of the report that refers to shared and aligned priorities and asked whether the HSCP priorities would reflect those of the Locality Partnership. S Hackney advised that the Locality Partnership priorities would be a starting point and that the intention was to avoid duplication of work. A Wright and the Chair requested further information on any gaps in local service provision, including relevant locality-level data on service pressures, reductions in provision, or the number of people requiring support who are unable to access it. It was noted that this information would help the Partnership better understand the scale of impact on residents. S Hackney advised that she would be happy to pull together relevant information where available. R Black highlighted that the Public Health Scotland Local Intelligence Support Team holds a range of locality data and also noted that work is ongoing with Carers Gateway, including regular monthly data hub meetings which provide numbers and emerging trends. The HSCP is also looking at whether any changes in demand or access are linked to eligibility changes, with a whole-system approach being taken to this work. S Hackney also advised that she would be happy to share data relating to the CHES work being undertaken in the area.	S Hackney/R Black S Hackney

4.	Community Projects Fund The Locality Partnership received a report from C Couston on the North Ayrshire Community Projects Fund – Pride in Place Impact Fund for the Garnock Valley. The Garnock Valley allocation for the Community Grant Fund is £176,000 for community led projects. There was also £263,000 allocated for Council led projects. C Couston highlighted that applications had been assessed by a panel made up of locality representatives, a Connected Communities Officer and Irene Campbell MP. The panel recommended approval of five projects in the Garnock Valley, with total recommended funding of £113,804. The Locality Partnership approved the funding of the following projects: • Dalry Community Development Hub - £10,000 • Dalry Community Sports Club - £35,631 • Geilsland Enterprise - £29,898 • Our Garnock Valley Working Group - £28,425 In relation to the application from Radio City Association, the Partnership requested clarification on the financial due diligence undertaken. C Couston undertook to seek clarification on this matter. It was agreed that consideration of the application would be deferred until the information had been obtained and shared with the Partnership. A Morrell highlighted that there was an underspend of £62,196. The options could be to either reopen the fund with a view to coming back to a Partnership meeting later in the year. There has also been a request to use the remaining balance to support remedial works at Beith Auld Kirk via the Council led project fund. The Locality Partnership agreed to reopen the fund to allow groups to apply for the remaining balance to support community projects, with the caveat that spend must be committed by March 2027. It was also agreed that an interim meeting of the Locality Partnership would be held to consider the applications. It was also agreed that a timeline would be shared with the Partnership in due course. The Chair thanked C Couston for his input.	C Couston C Couston J McGee
5.	Community Transport/Locality Priorities The Partnership received a presentation from Susan Dever, CEO of Coalfields Community Transport, outlining a proposed community transport model for North Ayrshire. Community transport was described as a volunteer-led service designed to support individuals who have difficulty accessing mainstream public transport, including older people, those with disabilities and people living in rural areas. S Dever highlighted that there is a proposal for a three-year pilot scheme in North Ayrshire, which would provide shared accessible minibuses for

	community groups, alongside volunteer driver training and a flexible booking system. Additional service ideas include organised day trips, community connector services, shopper transport and low-cost group hire options. The key benefits highlighted were reducing social isolation, improving access to services and activities, supporting independence and strengthening local communities. Challenges identified included recruiting and retaining volunteers, securing sustainable funding, rising operational costs and potential concerns from commercial transport providers. Feedback is being sought through a consultation to understand local transport challenges, identify priority user groups and determine the most useful types of journeys to help shape future service delivery. S Dever noted that she has been applying for funding for buses for the project. S Dever encouraged the Partnership to share the complete the consultation. A Morrell advised that additional support would be available in libraries to help community members complete the online consultation. J Lamont raised questions regarding the feasibility of the proposed model and whether it would be an expansion of the work already being undertaken by Coalfields She also asked whether there was potential to build capacity for a community transport hub in North Ayrshire. S Dever advised that, if the model was not viable in North Ayrshire, it would not continue; however, she did not anticipate this being the case. She noted that the proposal would be an extension of the work already being delivered by Coalfields Community Transport. The Chair commented that Stagecoach services in the Garnock Valley don't operate to align with train times, which represents a significant loss for the area. He asked whether this type of service could be offered to help address this gap. S Dever advised that this may be possible, but only where the service could be delivered on a sustainable basis. S Dever highlighted that groups in North Ayrshire are keen to see Community Transport being offered. C Pieraccini asked if the Travel Needs Analysis will be considered as part of the consultation. S Dever advised that it should as the Council are gathering this data. C Pieraccini invited S Dever to attend the September Locality Partnership meeting, alongside representatives from Active Travel and SPT. S Dever confirmed that she would be happy to attend. The Chair thanked S Dever for her input.	J McGee
6.	Partner Reports Police Scotland • Police Scotland continue to respond to local concerns around speeding, parking and poor driver behaviour. • Road checks are being carried out in key hotspot areas across Kilbirnie, Dalry, Beith and Gateside. • Action is being taken on electric bikes and scooters, including vehicle seizures and public safety messaging.

	- Officers are working to disrupt drug-related activity and support local retailers affected by shoplifting. - Campus officer activity includes school transition support, youth programmes, internet safety sessions and safety inputs ahead of summer. H McVie-Branley asked about hotspot areas for detached youth work. A McKinlay highlighted the War Memorial in Kilbirnie and the area around Tesco as current areas of focus. Community Learning and Development - Two sessional youth workers were recognised at the National Youth Work Awards. - Youth groups are beginning to wind down for the summer period, with a P7 transition day taking place at Lochshore next week. - An event took place with young people from and members of the Discovery Group, which was very positive. - The new mural at Bridgend Community Centre was unveiled. - The Project Kilbirnie Volunteer of the Year Awards took place last weekend which was a great evening. - Detached youth work will continue throughout the summer. It was noted that: - The Active Schools update was included within the Locality Officer Report. - SFRS report was included as part of the meeting paperwork. The Chair thanked A McKinlay and H McVie-Branley for their inputs.	
8.	Locality Officer Report C Pieraccini advised that the full report was enclosed as part of the meeting paperwork. C Pieraccini highlighted: 21 young people from the Garnock Valley attended Arran Pride, and all had a great time. - Beith Citizen of the Year will take place next Friday and is a sold-out event. - The TACT Awards took place last week, with strong representation from the Garnock Valley. - The Development Worker is now in post and is doing a great job, currently getting out and about to meet people across the locality. C Pieraccini noted that they will be submitting regular reports to the Partnership. A Wright noted that the Mill Café has been nominated for a UK wide award. The Chair thanked C Pieraccini for her input.	
9	AOCB Summer of Sport	

Action Note

	A Morrell highlighted that this summer, children and young people aged 3–26 can enjoy a wide range of free opportunities to get active, try new sports, and have fun locally as part of the 2026 Summer of Sport. A wide variety of activities will take place across communities throughout the summer, with specific sessions, venues and times listed for each local area. Summer of Sport 2026 - Northayrshire Community Cllr Reid advised that a concert will be held at Kilbirnie Parish Church to raise funds for the Auld Kirk, with entry priced at £7 on the door. H McVie-Branley highlighted that on the 8 August at 1pm the Lochshore Games will be held at Lochshore Park and extended an invitation to the Partnership. A Wright advised that group have taken over Kilbirnie Auld Kirk now has charitable status and a bank account in place. Work is ongoing to consider the feasibility of future options for the building, which dates back to the 14th century. It was also noted that next year will mark 900 years of Kilbirnie, and consideration should be given to how this milestone could be celebrated. The Chair also conveyed his thanks to H McNaughton noting that this was her last Partnership meeting as she is standing down as Chair of Beith and District Community Council.

Communities & Housing, Finance and Legal Services have been consulted and their comments are as follows:

Finance: The required supporting documents have been provided. Quotes/estimates for the requested funds have been provided. £8,812 remains available for disbursement should this application be successful.

Legal: The purpose of the Trust is “persons in need who have attained 65 years of age living in the Parish of Dalry, Ayrshire and at the sole discretion of the Treasurer of the Council”. It is noted in the application that the purpose of the award is for anyone living within Dalry Parish and aged 65 or over to attend a Christmas meal and summer trip, who would otherwise find it difficult to organise and finance such gatherings themselves. It is also noted that the events bring the member’s social benefit. The application information submitted on behalf of the applicant appears to meet the Trust’s requirements. If the Trustees are satisfied that the group is financially in need, I believe it would be within their powers to provide financial assistance.

Communities & Housing: The application demonstrates a strong community benefit by providing opportunities for older residents to come together, maintain social connections, and participate in activities that support mental wellbeing and reduce loneliness. The proposed events will help promote inclusion and community engagement amongst older people within Dalry Parish. Communities & Housing is satisfied that the activities will deliver positive outcomes for the target group and supports the application for consideration by the Partnership.

Subject: Name for new Cemetery in Kilbirnie

Purpose: To decide on a name for the new cemetery in Kilbirnie.

Background

The existing cemetery in Kilbirnie is nearing capacity for new lairs and as such a new cemetery is being built in the town providing capacity for a further 10 years provision with additional capacity to be laid out as required in future years.

Key Points for Locality Partnership

The new cemetery requires a name. Historically cemeteries have been named after the town they are situated in. Currently Kilbirnie has a “Kilbirnie Old Cemetery”, and a “Kilbirnie New Cemetery” and it is preferred that a name separate from the town is chosen to provide clarity on the location, distinguishing it from existing burial grounds.

*Local members and Planning were consulted, and two suggestions have been put forward namely, Burnside Cemetery and Moorpark Cemetery. The location plan below shows the site of the existing cemetery (red “X”) and of the new cemetery to be named (purple “X”), also highlighted are the locations of the suggested names **Moorpark and Burnside**.*

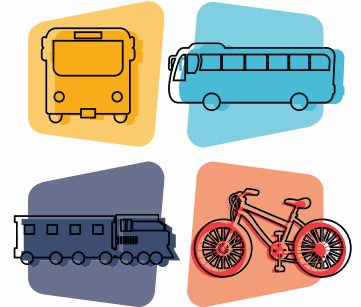

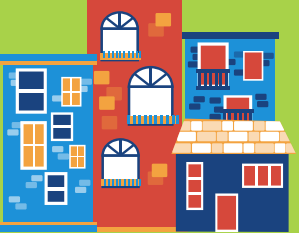


Lochshore Games

Our Garnock Valley

The Locality Officer for the Garnock Valley and Community Development Worker Heather gave a presentation on Our Garnock Valley to over 100 teachers at Garnock Campus' in-service day on Wednesday 19th August. They provided some background information, as well as an update on activity since the plan was published a year ago. Both demonstrated to teachers at the campus how they can link their work to Our Garnock Valley Plan.

Jane Chambers – Our Garnock Valley Development Worker

Since starting, Jane has met with members of the Our Garnock Valley group individually and has been familiarising herself with the local area.

Jane has networked by attending NAC's Creative Conversations meeting, the quarterly Scottish Community Development Network meeting, Beith and District Community Council's monthly meeting and Beith Community Development Trust's AGM.

Jane has also met with the workers individually at Beith Trust and the Garnock Valley Locality Team to find out what their specific roles are and what community groups they work with and support, to see how her work with the Place Plan may align with their groups.

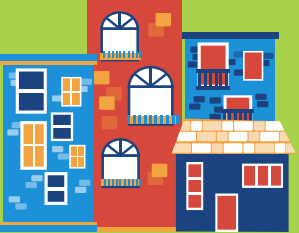
Jane has been leading on the progress of the Creative Place Making Framework project, meeting the consultant and discussing ideas.

The three main focuses Jane has in the first few months are:

Capacity Building: Jane has been looking at two toolkits, the 'Test-it' Toolkit, and the Good Governance Kit. This will be with a view to creating a self-evaluation tool for community groups.

Communication: Jane will create a Facebook and Instagram presence for Our Garnock Valley. This will help raise the profile of the work being done. In addition, there will be at least one public event for the OGV group, to communicate progress over the last year. This will likely happen around the end of the year, possible November.

Creative Placemaking Framework (CPF): Following the announcement of the Community Projects Fund award, Jane facilitated a meeting between the consultant Laura Frood, who has a broad knowledge and understanding of this type of work, along with NAC and representatives of Our Garnock Valley. Jane also brought together representatives from NAC Information and Culture to discuss the project and ensure alignment. This will include the next NAC Creative Conversations being held in the Garnock Valley.



Locality Updates

New Scots

NAC Community Learning and Development provided support through community hubs, helping individuals access information, complete forms and connect with appropriate services, including support relating to financial and practical issues. Two NA wide events were held in Kilwinning and Garnock Valley

Intergenerational bingo and board game activities were delivered in Kilbirnie and Saltcoats, providing opportunities for social interaction and reducing isolation.

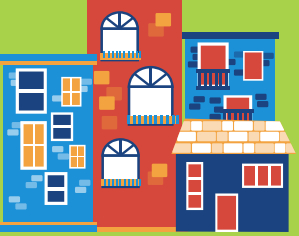
ESOL provision continued to support learners to build literacy, numeracy, digital and communication skills, often linked directly to real life and work-related scenarios such as jobcentre appointments, applications, volunteering and workplace communication. Many learners progressed to volunteering or employment during the reporting period.

Project Kilbirnie

Trustees meet monthly and have launched a project to hold a civic event next May to promote the 900 years of the Auld Kirk, and Kilbirnie, being established. An invitation was sent out to several groups around the town, and it was discovered that a number also have anniversaries next year from Kilbirnie Ladeside football team to Café Solace. Further meetings will ask for a rep from each group to help form a steering group, with Project Kilbirnie coordinating the paperwork and funds. Funding for the event to be sought from Awards from All. The next meeting will be held on Wednesday 16th September 2026 at 7pm in Ladeside Pavilion. The Auld Kirk Heritage Centre will host a public meeting on Wed 9th September at 7.30pm. Project Kilbirnie also held their AGM on 26th August, which was well attended.

Kilbirnie Library

The library has had a lovely summer, with lots of events including Teddy Bears Picnic, Craft Events, Drama all for the kids, while continuing with our adult groups. The Adult Art Group has had a display on all through the summer showing what talented people there are in Kilbirnie. Their memories group and Craft Group have been well supported and are growing in numbers. They were delighted to receive an award at the Project Kilbirnie Citizen of the Year Ceremony, acknowledging the input into the community that the library has. Their next project is their Story Slates Trail, which were created and hand painted by the lovely Lynn. They are organising a Treasure Hunt, where people will follow the trail to find each clue and try to guess which book it is referencing.

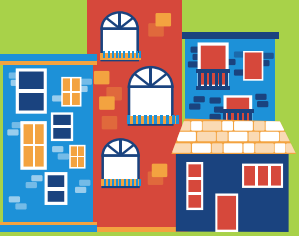


Locality Updates

Dalry Community Sports Club

- The larder continues to provide a vital lifeline for many families and individuals in the town and attendance has remained high over the past three months. On Saturday mornings, they continue to provide a place where people can meet and have a cup of tea and a chat in a warm space. They are also able to do referrals to help families with energy costs.
- Their Allotment project has been taking up most of their time over the past few months and is now starting to take shape. The perimeter fence and roadways have been completed, and construction is nearing completion on the raised beds. It is hoped to hold an information day later this summer to let residents see what is planned and to take on ideas and suggestions from members of the public.
- Park Lives has been running through the spring and summer on Friday evenings, offering free activities and free snacks and drinks. Due to the good weather, they have managed to run almost every Friday without interruption.
- In July, they held their Dalry Summer Football Tournament in the Public Park and welcomed eight teams from three different towns. A Trophy was donated by the family of Ben Gannon-Doak, who also featured on the medals given out to all the participants. This was the first football tournament to be held in Dalry in eighteen years and proved to be a huge success.
- During the school holidays, with the help of funding from North Ayrshire Council's Summer of Sport, the Sports Club joined forces with K: A Leisure to run three weeks of summer sports camps for local children, offering a variety of free sports and activities along with snacks and drinks.

Garnock Valley Carves

2026 will be their biggest event by far, with 20 international carvers and 105+ stalls. Over 21 people have pre-registered to bid already, and over 20 have noted interest in the first ever carving workshop, which will be held on Friday 11th September.

They will have around 35 local groups, voluntary and charity, who they have offered a free stall to and this year they are working with some of the providers to consider what / how they can do more for the kids on the day too.

Currently, they already have a soft shooting gallery, birds of prey, face painters and more to come. The organisers have also got archery, axe throwing and a hospitality tent for the bigger kids, as well as their first DJ and music throughout the day

Local football and tug o' war teams will have activities too and Stevenston & District MCC will be doing a trials demonstration and motorcycle display.

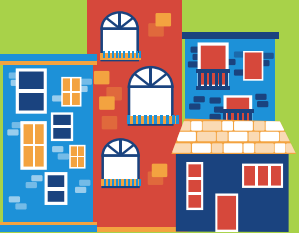
The event will be held on Saturday 12th September 2026 in Dalry.

Dalry Community Garden

Dalry Community Garden are delighted to have received funding from the Pride in Place Impact Fund. This will top up their Community Lottery Funding, and will provide a 9mtr x 7mtr paved accessible area and an 8mtr x 6mtr wooden gazebo with pulley sides. The space will be used as an outside learning area and will be available to other groups or organisations, proving a safe, quiet place for activities. They are already hosting several groups and a number of visitors coming from out with the Garnock Valley.

Valley Verses

Valley Verses is a community poetry trail that is in development to showcase the older people's talents and voice in the Garnock Valley. A call for entries was put out in June and so far, they have received 12 entries. Local businesses were also approached and asked if they would like to display the entries. So far, the response has been good. Now the team are looking to collate all the entries and get them ready for display. The trail will also be featured in this year's Scottish Mental Health Arts Festival at the Harbour Arts Centre.



Locality Updates

Café Solace

Café Solace have had a busy summer period with several external catering bookings and steady customer numbers. On Fridays, they have had between 85-117 customers, with lunchtimes being busy with between 35-56 customers.

Café Solace will be starting another volunteer drive to help them out on Fridays, as over the summer months they were struggling some weeks, particularly with evening service. They are hopeful that they will have some new recruits from the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme once the schools are up and running again. Café Solace still have 3, occasionally 4, young people who have stayed on to volunteer with them after the end of their award requirements. The team were all successful in passing the REHIS course and have obtained their certification for same.

One of their young volunteers, Garry Caldwell, was the winner of the Young Volunteer of the Year award at the ceremony organised by Project Kilbirnie. Café volunteers and Janet Johnstone all received certificates as finalists in their categories.

Their kitchen garden is looking very good, thanks to the support from one of the Community Centre users who has planted and looked after this for them over the summer. They look forward to harvesting the vegetables in due course and using them in their meals.

The Recovery Hub numbers have been steady over the summer. There has been a small amount of outreach work carried out but other priorities have hindered this to some extent. Publicity materials have been purchased and distributed to help increase awareness and numbers attending the hub on a Tuesday lunchtime.

Men's Shed Dalry

MSD has a fantastic impact within the geographical community supporting community members in bike maintenance and an opportunity for bespoke items at a very fair price in the form of a donation. They always offer to support their fellow community groups, whether it is in the form of help setting up tables and chairs for community lunches, digging out weeds, building furniture, or supporting people getting from one place to another.

The impact of this within the shed as a community give the men involved a real sense of purpose, achievement and belonging provide a physical and creative outlet and routine that some involved would not get otherwise. This further creates better mental health for the shedders involved and has a knock on to create a more inviting environment for new attendees and further positive effects the community.



Garnock Valley Greenspace

In partnership with Project Kilbirnie, this project helps to encourage active citizenship and community action. Volunteers have taken part weekly during evening and daytime activities to maintain the town centre planters, paths and pavements. New members arranged an adults and kids litter pick in Kilbirnie, which was well attended. The Community Worker negotiated with Tesco to take their waste plants and redistributed them across the Garnock Valley growing groups. As well as using the plants in Kilbirnie, due to the volume of waste plants, Dalry Community Garden, Beith Community Food Garden, Beith Mitchell Street Garden and town planters all benefitted.

CLD staff helped with the watering during the hot weather.

At Place Woodland, the access path from the Fudstone housing estate has been reopened after over a year of being closed. As a result, the group are noticing an increase in visitors and have been working hard to maintain the paths. They have received a donation of hardcore from the contractor as part of the community benefit.

Greenspace volunteers were supported to attend the NAC Biodiversity Partnership event, to launch the North Ayrshire Nature Network (NANN) and the NAC Local Biodiversity Plan. Friends of Lochshore are going from strength to strength with their partnership with the EQUAL team and TCV. However, sadly they have had set back with the damage caused to their enchanted forest over the last few weeks in July.





Summer of Sport

A range of activities were delivered across the locality, both indoors and outdoors. The Locality Team and Dalry Community Sports Club offered activities in the local parks, while Beith Community Association offered a range of indoor activities, in the community centre. The Locality Team also held two pop ups in Barrmill Community centre.

The Garnock Valley Locality Team supported the Garnock Valley Youth Forum to deliver two pop up events, one in partnership with Dalry Community Sports Club. Here the Youth Forum offered a human fruit machine (created by the Dalry Men's Shed), soft archery, rounders, and crafts. At Dalry, wider sports were also offered as part the partnership with Dalry Community Sports Club.

The Garnock Valley Locality Team held 7 pop up events in total. Two in Barrmill, one in Dalry, three in Beith and one in Kilbirnie. The three pop-up events in Beith worked in partnership with Beith Playpark Action Group and Skateboard Scotland. In total, 9 pop ups were held across the locality. The final event in Beith Park included a fun day, hosted by Beith Playpark Action Group. Unfortunately, the Lochshore games were cancelled due to high winds and heavy rain forecast, however this has been rescheduled to 19th September with an indoor back up plan in place. This event has been organised in partnership with the Equal team, Sustainability team, Garnock Rugby Club, Garnock Valley Youth Forum, TCV, Garnock Valley Pipe and Drums, Café Solace, Garnock Valley Recovery Hub, KA leisure, and Friends of Lochshore. This event will see a fun mixture of activities including wellie chucking, haggis hurl, sheaf toss, soft archery, caber toss, tug o' war and will also include live performances from Garnock Valley Pipe and Drums, a local musician and highland dancers.





Summer of Sport

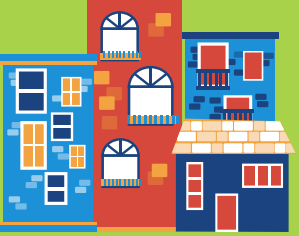
In addition, a number of tickets for the Commonwealth Games were offered and the Locality Team took young people to the Boxing and Gymnastics sessions.

Beith Community Association – The Association ran a number of activities in partnership with other local organisations over the 6-week summer holiday period at Beith Community Centre. Each week they ran Kids Zumba, Football, Badminton, Aikijitsu, and, in partnership with NAC, Darts. Some of these sports clubs currently run at the centre and it was hoped this would offer an introduction for local young people.

Dalry Community Sports Club – Events took place at Dalry Public Park and in partnership with KA Leisure at Dalry Primary School. Activities included, football tournament (involving Dalry, Kilwinning & West Kilbride), rugby taster, various racket sports including badminton, traditional activities including, Rounders, races, bean bag race, sack race, obstacle course, hula hoops, archery, dodge ball, basketball and kids' agility like stepping stones / ground ladders. Our events were attended by both girls and boys with a primary / nursery school age.

Finally, training is scheduled for the Garnock Valley Locality Team in outdoor first aid and woodland skills. In addition, a residential is scheduled for young people to be held later in the year.





Savvy About Scams

NAC Information & Culture received funding from the Public Library Improvement Fund to develop their Savvy About Scams project. They are working with Trading Standards, Police Scotland and other local partners to help residents stay informed through our Savvy About Scams roadshows. The next one is in Kilbirnie Library on Thursday 10th September.

Trading Standards has developed a Scam prevention and safety advice webpage. As part of the project, they are developing printables with a link to the webpage, contact details for Trading Standards and a message to encourage people to take some time and check whether it could be a scam or not before they act. There will be information in the libraries.

• Summer of Sport

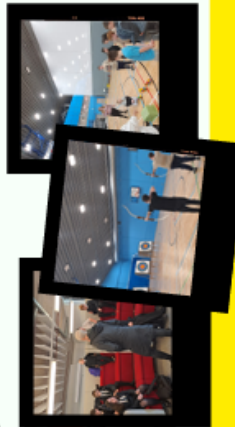
Funding from the summer of sport programme will go towards running martial arts, racket sports and disability sport in the Garnock Valley with the plan of developing the number of evening sports opportunities. The majority of these clubs will be within the schools to remove the need for more transport.

• Future Events

A Primary School Events calendar has been set up for the 2026/27 school year that includes football, girls football, badminton, rugby ASN sport and netball.

• Summer Term 2025/2026

Fifty five sports clubs ran across 7 schools in the summer term with health weeks, sports days and fun days running in all schools.



• North Ayrshire Sports Academy

Seventeen S5 and S6 pupils have signed up for this course where they will complete an initial 6 courses including, coaching awards and safe guarding. This will be followed by a 6 hour volunteering block in the community.

• Young Ambassador

The Garnock Campus Young Ambassadors will complete their training in September at The Portal. There will be between two and four pupils from every year group who will be tasked with promoting sport and coming up with new ideas for GCC.

• Active Girls

There will be at least six pupils making up the GCC Active Schools committee with two pupils attending a residential. The group will set up more sports and activity opportunities for girls at Garnock.



• Summer of Sport

Active Schools ran 3 full days at Castle Semple that involved water sports and mountain biking. The participants were primary aged and chosen by Gary Moore with support from deputy head teachers to identify a targeted group of children to increase their opportunities during the summer.

• Development of Clubs

The summer of sport money will run a large programme round schools but also develop Judo, Karate, Racket Sports and Fitness clubs within the Garnock Valley.

Garnock Valley Youth Work

Detached Youth Work

Currently, detached youth work has been delivered once a week on a Friday/Saturday across the locality. Other days are included on specific days (for example exam results day and during pop-up events).

As a result of weekly sessions, young people are more aware of the role of the Locality Team and engage well with staff.

This work has seen an increase in engagement with young people across the Garnock Valley and sustainable relationships are being established. Through communication with the locality police, they have noted a reduction in anti-social behaviour.

Through the positive engagement with the community and local businesses, they are aware of the role and are supportive. A local business owner has offered to donate food for the Lochshore Games funday.

Young people have shared their views via the team's youth work survey, giving them a voice in how the locality team's program is shaped. As a result of their positive partnership with local young people, the team worked together in providing sport activities, pop-ups and the GV Youth Forum pop-ups in the park. The team have maintained engagement throughout the summer during these activities and weekly detached youth work shifts.



Youth Synergy

The group concluded their Dynamic Youth Award this summer with a trip to Whitelees Wind Farm in East Kilbride. The group have enjoyed learning about climate change, spreading awareness and helping in the community by litter picking and weeding the garden at Bridgend Community Centre. Members of the group will now look to join the Youth Forum and continue to develop their skills and become more involved with Youth Voice activities. The Garnock Valley Locality Team are now actively going to recruit new young people from the P7/S1 age group to join the group and develop their knowledge and contribution to raising awareness of climate change.

Garnock Valley Youth Work

Garnock Valley Youth Forum

This summer, the youth forum have delivered activity pop ups in Beith and Dalry, which were well attended by local young people. The young people organised and sourced resources and led activities such as rounders, designing a badge and canvas bag and cup stacking. The group also contacted Men's Shed Dalry to assist them to create a Human Fruit Machine frame. Andy from the Shed kindly agreed to help and made the frame which the youth forum then painted. The youth forum donated to the Shed for making this.

Purpose: For Information and Awareness

HSCP Update related to Garnock Valley Locality

- Cardiovascular disease prevention- CHES (Collaboration of Health Equity in Scotland) is processing plans to deliver a cardiovascular disease prevention event in Dalry in October 2026.
- Recovery Support- the Alcohol and Drug Partnership and partners are working to enhance the Kilbirnie Recovery Hub and extend the model to Dalry.

General HSCP update

Children, Families & Justice Services

- Care Leaver Payments- the Scottish Government has introduced a £2,000 payment for eligible young people moving from care into adulthood and independent living. Scottish Government has committed to fully funding local authorities to administer and deliver the payment.
- Child protection communications- following engagement with young people, the Child Protection Committee is developing content for North Ayrshire Youth Services social media channels to promote key child protection messages. A survey for young people aged 11 and over has been launched to identify their preferred platforms and approaches to online engagement.
- Vaccination programmes- eligible young people across Ayrshire have been able to book meningococcal B vaccination appointments from 6 July, ahead of the 2026/27 academic year. The annual school flu programme is also being rolled out across North Ayrshire, with vaccinations scheduled from 14 September to 4 December and parents and carers encouraged to return consent forms promptly to support uptake.

Health & Community Care

- Transfer of Care Programme and Home First Approach- NHS Ayrshire & Arran continues to experience significant system pressures, including high hospital occupancy, delayed discharges, Emergency Department congestion and reliance on non-standard capacity. In response, NHS Ayrshire & Arran, the three HSCPs and Acute Services have developed the Transfer of Care Programme to expand community capacity and redesign discharge pathways around a Home First approach. Following IJB approval in June 2026, implementation is progressing to expand community-based support to enable timely discharge and reduce hospital pressures. North Ayrshire planned investment includes up to 25 additional care-home placements, up to 35 additional Care at Home and reablement packages, and 5 step-down beds at Anam Cara through the discharge to assess pathway. This will

strengthen rehabilitation and recovery support, improve patient flow and help more people return home safely.

- **Unscheduled care improvement-** In June North Ayrshire HSCP received £1.081 million from The Scottish government to support Phase 1 of the Whole System Implementation Plan: £746,000 to strengthen hospital-based multidisciplinary capacity and £335,000 to increase Mental Health Officer capacity. These enhancements have been implemented to support patient flow and discharge planning.
- **Digital housing and independent living-** The Envision: Digital Blueprint for a Smart Home of the Future report provides an evidence-based framework for housing that integrates digital health, adaptable design and low-carbon construction. Housing and HSCP colleagues will explore how learning from the framework can inform future planning and service development to support health, wellbeing, independence and net zero ambitions.
- **Adult Support and Protection-** a staff survey has been launched across HSCP and partner organisations. Findings will inform the Adult Protection Committee's biennial report and future business plan, helping to shape priorities and continued improvement in adult protection arrangements.

Mental Health

- **North Community Learning Disability Team-** the team received the Tean Award at the Scottish Learning Disabilities Nurses Network Awards for their work to reduce health inequalities for people with learning disabilities in North Ayrshire.
- **Alcohol and Drug Partnership-** the North Ayrshire ADP has published its latest newsletter, providing information on recent community activity, available supports and this year's Overdose Awareness Day event.

Planning, Performance and Transformation

- **Beam Notes-** the AI-supported documentation tool previously known as Magic Notes is being rolled out across North Ayrshire HSCP social work services. Training is underway and use has expanded to additional service users from 20 July. The tool is intended to support quicker drafting of records and documentation, reduce administrative time and enable practitioners to focus more on direct engagement and conversations with the people they support.
- **Care at Home Service review-** The HSCP is currently doing a review of the Care at Home service and staff are being invited to dedicated engagement sessions to discuss current service delivery, improvement opportunities and help shape future developments. Separate sessions for frontline and office-based staff will ensure that operational experience and staff feedback inform the review and future planning.

Other

- **Set Aside arrangements-** work continues across Ayrshire to implement statutory Set Aside arrangements for delegated hospital services. This includes developing a joint commissioning plan, strengthening IJB directions to NHS Ayrshire & Arran and agreeing a transparent methodology for fair resource allocation across the three Ayrshire partnerships.
- **IJB voting rights-** from 1 September 2026, third-sector representatives, service users and unpaid carer members will have full IJB voting rights under the Public Bodies (Joint Working) (Scotland) Amendment Order 2025. Recruitment is underway to fill the service user/ unpaid carer representative role.
